But now comes the crowning blow. A New York court held the past week that students may not even recite a voluntray prayer at mealtime. And the Supreme Court concurred.

Of course, our constitution which provi des freedom of worship also guarantees a person the right to be an athlest. But, we don't think that this handful of athiestic idiots should be allowed to make the rules whereby our nation's generally Christian schools should be governed.

This, according to those athiestic do-gooders, is going too far. Their appeal was upheld in a New York court, and an appeal to the Supreme Court received silence and hence agreement.

Apparently, under our new system of not wanting to offend the athiests, this would be out. These bigots, probably from the same stock of beatnik-type flag-wavers who protest against the United States' involvement in Viet Nam, would make all the rules if the Supreme Court will allow. And perhaps it
