Supreme Court decisions regarding prayer in the public schools have reached a new low, as far as we are personally concerned.

But now comes the crowning blow. A New York court held the past week that students may not even recite a voluntary prayer at mealtime. And the Supreme Court concurred.

Of course, our constitution which provides freedom of worship also guarantees a person the right to be an atheist. But, we don't think that this handful of atheistic idiots should be allowed to make the rules whereby our nation's generally Christian schools should be governed.

These bigots, probably from the same stock of beatnik-type flag-wavers who protest against the United States' involvement in Viet Nam, would make all the rules if the Supreme Court will allow. And perhaps it will.

We overheard a conversation the other day which also incited our wrath.

A Friona mother was telling another how the Christmas story was being made more real to her youngster by the child's teacher bring the Biblical account into focus.

The listener retorted that this very act in a Northern school had been protested, and had been held unconstitutional to bring Christ into the classroom discussion.

Can this be America that we are talking about. If one did not know better, he would think that the communists had taken over and he was hearing accounts of how Americans were being forced to curb their religious teachings.

But no, communist has not in actuality taken over America; although it may not be hard, if America continues down the path that it has been on for the past few years.

The secret to defeating a country is moral decay and if America continues to let these leftist protesters write the rules regarding our schools, it will not be long until the communists will have things just as they want them.

America may be a land where freedom of worship as well as "freedom from worship" is guaranteed, but it is also a land where majority rules, and we believe it is time that these small bigoted minorities were given a good strong backhand or a kick in the seat of the pants.

After all, if some people like the communistic "no God" outlook, let them move to Russia and seek citizenship.

Friona High School basketball teams enter what may be their toughest tournament of the season starting today in Tulia.

For the second straight week, Friona has drawn the Littlefield Wildcats in their tournament opener. Friona downed

the class AAA outfit, 44-37 in the first round of the Springlake tournament.

The Squaws really face a stern test in their first game, having drawn Springlake, one of the strongest girls teams on the High Plains this year. Game time is 6:30 p.m. The Chiefs

and Littlefield meet at 5 p.m. Coach James Anglin points out that there are several good teams in the boys' division, including the Canyon team, which took a one-point win over Frionada - Tulia and Floydada, and Amarillo Carver. Other boys teams are from Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Tulia and Floydada.

Other teams in the girls' division are Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Happy, Tulia, Floydada and Canyon.

The Squaws will meet the winner or loser of the Floydada - Canyon game in the tournament's second round, depending on whether they win or lose

their opener, and the Chiefs meet the winner or loser of the Floydada - Tulia game in the second round.

The Chiefs, fresh from winning the Springlake meet, will carry a nice 8-2 season record into the tournament. The Squaws will take an 8-3 season mark into action.

## HARVEST INTERRUPTED

# First Snow Heralds Approach Of Winter

Friona residents, who were being "spilled" by one of the nicest fall seasons in the area's history, got the first taste of winter this week, as the first snow of the season fell Tuesday night.

Two inches of the white stuff were measured at Friona's City Hall, which yielded .08 inches of moisture content.

The snow interrupted the area's cotton harvest, and threw a monkey-wrench into hopes of

having the cotton all harvested by Christmas. Many thought the prospects were good had the weather held out another 10 days.

The harvest had been interrupted last Friday by a shower which left .17 inches of moisture behind, the first appreciable moisture in Friona in many weeks. Farmers then were kept out of their fields until Monday, and had two more days of harvesting before the snow clouds moved in Tuesday night.

It is the consensus that the current cotton crop is about two-thirds out. Sugar beet farmers, meanwhile, are all but finished on the 1965 crop.

## Postmaster Urges Windup In Mailing

It is urgent that any remaining Christmas mail be sent out over the weekend, Postmaster Wright Williams stressed today.

The Postmaster said that across the nation every piece of Christmas mail that can possibly be delivered will reach its destination on time. However, at this time of the year, the strain on transportation facilities and the unpredictability of weather can mean unexpected delays.

Williams suggested that mailers consider the use of air mail and special delivery, especially for out of town mail.

He noted that holiday schedules will be in effect on Saturday and Sunday, December 25 and 26. Although Christmas falls on a Saturday and many business firms will be letting their employees off Friday, a sufficient number of postal workers will remain on duty to see that all Christmas mail entering post offices in time for delivery will reach its destination.

The Friona Postmaster thanked all his customers for their excellent cooperation so far.

"We noted that the use of ZIP Code has increased significantly over last year and that most people mailed early," Williams said. "It really helps us when people mail early, as it spreads

our work out," the postmaster added.

Williams estimated that the "peak" day for local mailing would probably come Friday or Saturday for outgoing mail, with Monday of next week the estimated day for the peak of incoming mail.

## Tech's Wilson Leads Record-Smashing Year

Texas Tech's Tom Wilson more than doubled the Red Raiders' passing yardage record in leading his Gator Bowl-Bound teammates in their massive assault on the school's season marks.

Wilson, 160-pound senior from Corsicana, accounted for 2119 yards of aerial yardage. The old mark was 954, set in 1947 by quarterback Freddie Brown.

Wilson's name also appears under the following season mark headings in the record book af-

ter guiding the Raiders to an 8-2 mark and a berth in the Gator Bowl opposite Georgia Tech Dec. 31:

Total offense -- 2050 (old mark 1027, Jerry Johnson, 1952)

Passes attempted -- 283 (old mark 119, Wilson, 1964)

Passes completed -- 172 (old mark 65, Wilson, 1964)

Donny Anderson, everyone's All-America halfback, set his

**Chiefs Are Champs In Springlake Meet**

The Friona Chieftains brought home the championship trophy, and the Squaws won the third-place trophy in the annual Springlake tournament last weekend.

The Chiefs, who had not won a basketball tournament in the five years before James Anglin became their coach, captured their third such championship in the past two years.

Friona's boys took wins over two class AAA teams, Littlefield and Muleshoe, and the host Springlake in winning their second trophy of the year. The Chiefs were runners-up the previous weekend at West Texas State.

The Squaws ran into a surprisingly-tough Frenship team in the semi-finals, falling 59-51, and had to settle for third place for the second straight week.

The Chiefs weren't pressed too much in taking the championship, and extending their season record to 7-1. The squad got off and running against Littlefield, holding a 16-5 lead over the Wildcats after a quarter and leading 30-16 at half-time.

After having Littlefield doubled at 32-16, the Chieftain offense hit a snag, and couldn't score for a while, and Littlefield pulled within five points of Friona. However, the team righted itself to win by seven points, 44-37.

Against Springlake, the outcome of the game was in doubt only during the opening quarter, which saw Friona leading 12-8. By halftime it was 30-16, and the Chiefs beat the host team going away, 59-33, with reserves seeing a lot of action.

Muleshoe, which had played the team close in losing 60-55 here December 2, was the opponent in the finals. Friona started out ahead and gradually built up its lead. It was 21-17 at halftime, and the Chiefs took a 35-23 lead into the final quarter.

The final margin was eleven points, 54-43. The Squaws had little trouble whipping Nazareth in their opening game, 64-49. Janet Rushing's 32 points paced a torrid 58 per cent shooting spree by Friona.

In Frenship, the team met a squad which had some deadly outside shooters who proved unstopable that particular day. Frenship grabbed a 10-point lead, 22-12 after a quarter, and although Friona outscored them 39-37 during the remainder of the game, they simply couldn't catch up.

Happy was outmanned in the match for third place. Friona reared to a 23-2 lead after a quarter. With reserves playing the second quarter for Friona, Happy was able to pull up to a 30-19 score. Starters returned in the third quarter, outscoring Happy 14-5, to send Friona into the final quarter with a 44-24 lead.

Three Squaws, forwards Janet Rushing, and Cindy Ingram and guard Frieda Floyd, were named to the all-tournament. Two Chieftains made it, Bobby Jordan and Travis Graves.

The Chieftain - Mule battle was close most of the way, with Muleshoe holding 11-10, 25-18 and 36-30 quarter leads. The

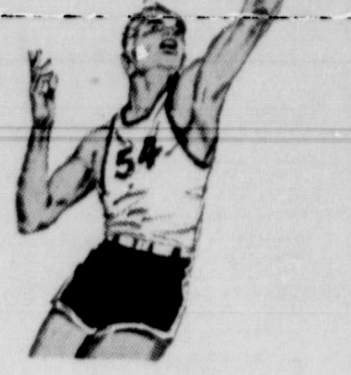
Mules shot the Chiefs out of the saddle with a 21-point fourth quarter, taking advantage of numerous fouls called on the Frionans.

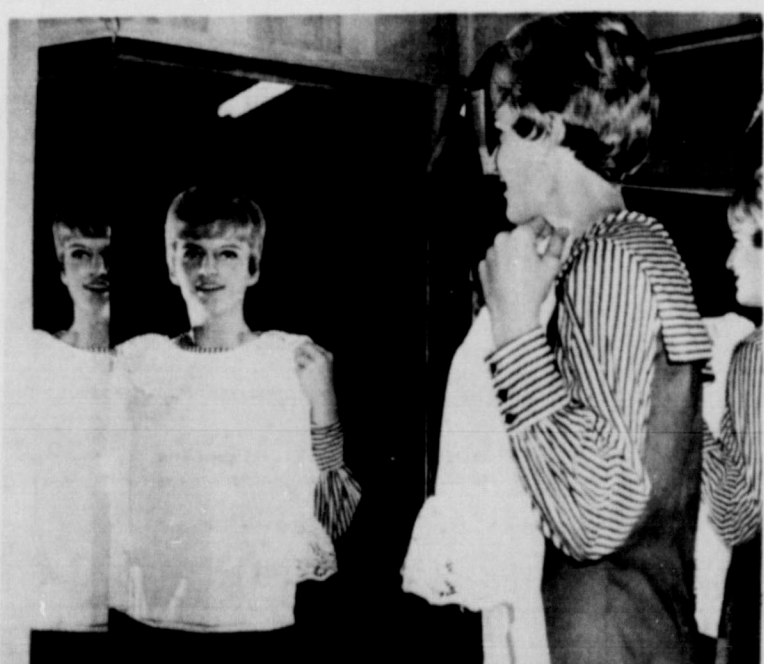

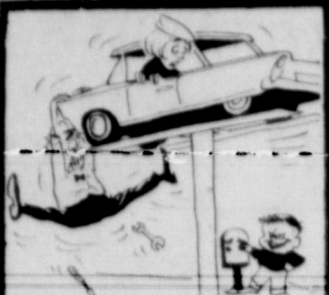

The second one is for sugar Cookies, which are favorites at our house. This recipe is very simple to use and the cookies can be easily rolled or sliced after the dough has been chilled.

**SUGAR COOKIES**  
 2 cups sifted flour  
 1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/3 cup salad oil  
 3/4 cup sugar  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 egg plus milk to make 1/3 cup.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt into bowl. Add salad oil, blend well with fork or pastry blender. Mixture will appear dry. Beat sugar, vanilla and egg-milk mixture together until very light and fluffy. Stir into flour mixture.

Chill about one hour. Roll out on a floured board or cloth. Cut as desired. Before baking, place nuts on cookies or sprinkle with colored sugar.

For other cookies, arrange candied cherries on a circle of dough; fold over dough to meet center and press to seal. Bake in a 400 degree oven about nine minutes. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.

Another cake recipe that is super is called

**SCOTCH CAKE**  
 Melt 2 sticks oleo. Add four tablespoons cocoa, 1 cup water, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon soda and 1/2 cup buttermilk. Pour over 2 cups flour and 2 cups sugar which have previously been sifted together. Mix well. Bake in loaf pan 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

### TIPS ON HOLIDAY FOOD PREPARATION

Here's a word of caution regarding holiday food preparation, on how to safely prepare favorite foods.

Take the much loved dressing or stuffings for that turkey. This holiday treat usually contains bread crumbs, seasonings, chicken broth, fat, perhaps an egg or two, and sometimes chestnuts and meats. Chances of bacterial growth are great, because the small pieces of food are handled often when the stuffing is prepared.

Stuff the turkey just before roasting it and combine the ingredients just before cooking time. If pork is to be added to the stuffing, such as sausage, be sure it is thoroughly cooked.

You should never partially cook a bird ahead of time. If you do, the stuffing will only be warm by the time the bird is ready to be eaten. If the stuffing is not thoroughly cooked, bacterial growth will form.

You must be careful to thoroughly cook all holiday foods. In five hours, there can be enough toxin to cause illness. In seven hours, at room temperature, the possibility of poisoning is even greater.

Have a safe, pleasant holiday. Don't let undercooked food spoil it.

This is hunting season and many will be bringing in game. We have a very good bulletin entitled "Wild Game - Care Cooking." Come by the Extension office on 2nd floor of courthouse and pick up a copy free or write or call 481-3619 and a copy will be mailed to you.

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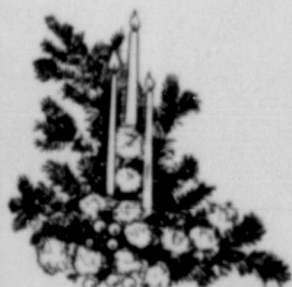
