#### SENATOR RUTHERFORD MAKES POLICY SPEECH

State Senator J. T. Rutherford, seeking to represent West Texas from the 16th Congressional District, has turned on the heavy ar-

In El Paso late last week Rutherford blasted at the incumbent as a "'part-time Congressman" and pledged himself to be an "active, full-time Congressman for West Texas" if elected July 24.

"I do not intend to enter into personalities or personal life at any time during this campaign," Rutherford said in several public appearances and to newsmen, "but I feel like a man's public record belongs to the people and should be reviewed for the interest of all."

"When you get right down to it," the 34-year-old ex-Marine said, "a Congressman is a hired hand for the public. He is hired to represent the voters of the 16th Congressional District and he cannot do it by being absent.'

Rutherford told audiences his opponent "took an eight-week pleasure-trip to Paris, starting when Congress was in session' and asked for his opponent to explain this and other absences from his job in Washington.

According to the record, Rep. Regan left Washington on July 1. 1952, and sailed from New York July 3. He described his trip as "non-official."

During this trip, Rutherford says he has found from the record, the House of Representatives was busily working. The House had introduced 168 public bills and resolutions and the House passed more than 750 bills and resolutions calling for policy changes, taxation and appropriations. "But West Texas had no voice or vote as our Congressman-hired to represent you. me and our friends and neighbors-was seeing the sights," Rutherford stated.

Rutherford said that a check at the library revealed the present Congressman "had the poorest attendance record of any Congressman from Texas."

Then, he continued: "That i one reason why I say our chair in Washington is vacant and cobwebs have grown over it."

The Senator pointed out that his own record "is a matter of public knowledge, as I mailed from Austin, which were pu lished through the courtesy of many West Texas newspapers." Rutherford promised voters to "continue to report to West Texans, to serve them to the best of my ability and to serve them on a full-time basis," if sent to Washington.




