

## Candidates For Chieftain Team Begin Working Out

One of the more interesting parts of our trip to El Paso last weekend for the West Texas Press Association convention was a guided bus tour of El Paso's sister city across the border, Juarez.

The trip afforded us our first visit to Juarez, which is the largest Mexican city on the U. S.-Mexico border. We had read a lot about Juarez, and of course, heard quite a bit about the city, so had formed several opinions about it ahead of time.

Actually many of the things we saw on our pre-planned tour were pleasant surprises.

We had always heard that the border towns don't give you a true perspective of Mexico; that to know what Mexico is really like you have to go farther into its interior, such as to Mexico City, etc.

This is probably right. However, the bus tour took us farther into Juarez than most U. S. visitors get, we would guess, and we saw some of the nicer things in that city of 400,000 people.

Also, we had a native Mexican guide, and he should be president of the Juarez Chamber of Commerce if they have one, because he was a master at pointing up the "brighter side" of his home town.

Mexico is celebrating the anniversary this year of its victory over France 100 years ago. The guide pointed out an attractive statue of Abraham Lincoln, who won a place in the hearts of Mexicans for his assistance during the war.

Lincoln saw to it that the Mexicans were given repeating rifles, something that helped them turn the tide.

Also, the guide pointed out, when the United States went to war with Mexico, Lincoln was the only senator to vote against declaration of war against our neighbor to the south.

Lincoln's statue is located in an area containing some of the most modern and beautiful buildings we have ever seen anywhere.

We were privileged to leave our buses and tour one of these buildings, an art center. There, some of the best examples of Mexican art were on display. The building also was a shining example of Mexican architecture.

Since we don't travel much, there are a lot of places we haven't seen. But one thing for sure -- we don't have anything as elaborate in this part of the country as the place we visited in Juarez.

Of course, there is bound to be the "other side" of the story. However, our guide was very careful to emphasize that Mexico is working hard to raise its educational, moral and economical standards.

They are concentrating on the educational part, which is probably the most important, and have a program going which could go a long way in improving their standards in education.

One of the things we hated to hear, though, was that the country is turning to socialized medicine, or "social security hospitals" as the guide referred to them.

"Most of our people don't make big salaries. But they have big families. They have to have an opportunity for adequate hospital facilities," the guide explained in the typical rationalization for any socialized service.

While he was explaining the "social security hospitals," he said they were similar to programs in England, and paused while thinking of another example. One of our newspaper associates from the back of the bus quipped "...and the United States."

If you haven't already bought your season tickets to see the home games of the Friona Chieftains, you'd better hurry. By 10 a. m. ## Friona Star Honored In WT Press Contests

For the third straight year, the Friona Star has been judged a prize-winner in the West Texas Press Association's "Better Newspapers" contest.

At the association's annual convention at El Paso last weekend, the Star was awarded first place in the "general excellence" division. It marked the third time the Star has won this coveted award in as many tries for the honor.

Newspapers who win the "general excellence" award may not enter the same division in succeeding years. The Star had won the award in 1961, 1963, and now for 1965.

In another contest division, the regular page-one column, "Star Lites," written by Editor Bill Ellis, received a third-place award from among the 19 entries representing newspapers of all sizes in the West Texas area.

The awards brought to five the number of such honors won by the local newspaper in state

and regional press association contests this year. Earlier, the Star won awards for news pictures (first) in the Panhandle Press Assn. contests; and had awards for appearance third and news writing (third) in the Texas Press Association contests.

Last year in the West Texas Press Assn. contests, the Star received the first-place plaque for editorials.

Out-of-state judges, commenting on the Star's winning entries stated:

"The Friona Star is an attractive newspaper. We particularly like the way the editor uses his front-page column. Also commendable are the Star's use of pictures, and the way its stories are placed. It makes good use of headline type."

The judge went on to say that points which helped the Star places first included its departmentalization of news in-

## Classrooms To Be Ready For Opening Of School

All regular classrooms are to be finished at the new high school building in time for the opening of school August 30, Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr stated this week.

Certain parts of the high school complex, such as the auditorium, cafeteria and gymnasium, will not be ready for the opening of school, but will be completed as soon as possible after the opening of school.

Until the cafeteria is completed, sack lunches and milk will be transported daily to the high school from the grade school cafeteria. High school students may go home for lunch or bring their lunch to school as they desire, but the same policies will prevail as in the past in regard to driving cars to school. Students will not be permitted to leave in their cars during the noon hour.

Lunch prices will be the same as in previous years, 30 cents for grade school and junior high students, and 35 cents for high school students.

Most of the moving of desks and other items from the old high school building to the new building has been completed.

Considerable remodeling has been done at the old high school building, which will henceforth be known as the Junior High School building, housing the seventh, eighth and ninth grades.

Other changes of housing will be brought about by the completion of the new High School Building and the demolition of the old two-story building.

Two persons from Friona are among the more than 250 candidates expecting to receive degrees at West Texas State University's summer convocation Aug. 26.

They are Robert W. Taylor, candidate for the Master of Education degree, and Kay Struve Ray, who is seeking the Bachelor of Arts degree.

The convocation program will be at 8 p.m. in the Fieldhouse, and speaker will be Dr. Silas D. Snow, president of Arkansas State Teachers College, WTSU President and Mrs. James P. Cornette will honor graduating students and their families at a reception Aug. 24, from 8 until 10 p.m.

Grades one and two will occupy the Primary Building. Grades three and four will occupy the Grade School Building, formerly the Junior High

School. Principal J. T. Gee will continue to have his office in the Primary Building. Robert W. Taylor will serve as assistant principal and his

office will be in the Grade School Building.

Principal Tom Jarboe will establish a new office at the junior high school building. John R. Cook, high school principal, will have his office in the new building.

The administrative area of the new high school building will also house the superintendent's office, tax collector's office, counselor's office and testing room.

The school nurse's office will continue to be located in the Primary Building. Hot water and additional facilities are being added to the nurse's department. New restroom facilities also will be available in the primary building.

In the Junior High Building, four classrooms have been developed in the former vocational agriculture and homemaking departments. The homemaking kitchen also has been remodeled, and homemaking for eighth grade girls will be offered this year. A sewing room will be available in addition to the kitchen.

Pupils who are enrolling in Friona for the first time in grades one through four are encouraged to report with a parent to Mr. Gee's office in the Primary Building on August 23, 24 or 25 for pre-enrollment information.

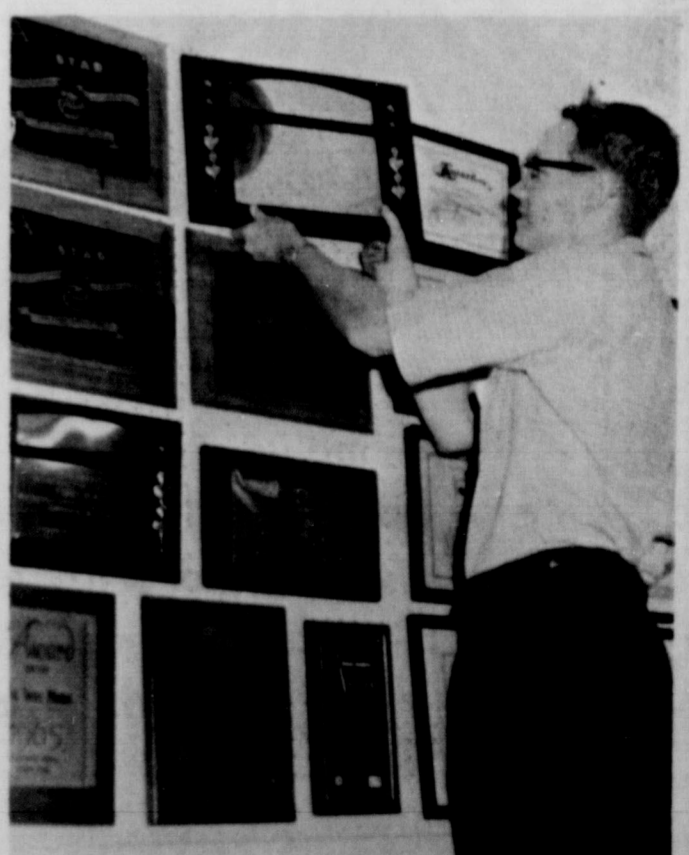
Pupils in grade five for the first time should report to Mr. Jarboe's office in the Junior High Building on the same dates in the afternoon.

## Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capital

AUSTIN, -- Federal authorities have brought suit here to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Texas elections. Suit was filed under the new voting rights act.

If they are successful in getting an early hearing, a special session of the Legislature may be necessary to enact a valid voter registration statute. Texas' poll tax is the only existing form of registration for state and local elections. However, there is a procedure for obtaining "free" poll taxes to vote in federal elections. Observers feel near chaos would result at the polls next year if a final ruling is handed down in favor of the federal suit, without prior enactment of registration procedures.

Although the U.S. Attorney General maintains the tax is not to raise revenue for the state, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert estimates over \$5,000,000 income for the next biennium from that source. That's \$5,000,000 the state treasury won't get if the poll tax is repealed. Reliable estimates so far see the biennium ending with government in the black by only \$1,300,000 to \$4,200,000 including income from all existing levies.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has announced he will oppose the federal suit to invalidate the poll tax and to enjoin state and local officials from enforcing its requirements for any general, special or primary elections.

Suit seeks to direct Travis County Tax Collector Fritz Robinson and his employees to compile and certify local voter lists "without regard to payment of the poll tax or any other tax."

**APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED** -- Gov. John Connally named five public members to the new Legislative Study Committee on Multiple Use and Pollution of All Waters of Texas.

They are Dr. Carl J. Lind Jr., Stone Wells, and Charles Sowell, all of Houston, John Clegg of Port Lavaca and Bill Senter of Abilene. Legislative members selected earlier are Sens. Culp Krueger of Ft. Campo, Criss Cole of Houston and Charles Herring of Austin and

Reps. Gus Mutscher of Brenham, John Mobley of Kilgore and Dean Neugent of Texas City.

Charles W. Lindsey was the Governor's choice for judge of the new Criminal District Court #3 of Tarrant County.

Connally picked Lester Prokopf, Houston builder and lumber executive, to succeed Judge Robert L. Lowry of Houston as a member of Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith appointed Sens. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin, D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur and A.R. Schwartz of Galveston to a committee to study possible development of a state park on Pleasure Island near Port Arthur.

Smith named Sens. Jim Bates of Edinburg and Herring to a panel to negotiate for the return of a flag captured by Mexican forces at the Alamo. Governor Connally has stated he prefers to leave the negotiations in the hands of the U.S. State Department and will name no members of the state committee himself.

**BOUNDARY DISPUTE AIDED** -- First meeting of negotiating committees from Texas and Louisiana reached no firm conclusions in their effort to settle a long-standing boundary dispute between the states.

Room was seen for arbitration of the dividing line in the Sabine River ship channel at the Gulf jetties. But the river boundary question seems likely to end up in federal courts.

At stake in the dispute are valuable mineral rights along the river, as well as control of fishing and future barge traffic.

Texas contends the middle of the Sabine should be the boundary between the states. Louisiana claims the line was extended to the west bank of the river by the 1803 Louisiana Purchase.

Negotiators agreed to keep trying -- perhaps to study possible extension of a federal boundary running between jetties bordering the channel -- and to exchange briefs in future meetings.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler presided at the initial conference. High State officials

and legislators from both states were present.

**ENROLLMENT TO SOAR** -- Texas Commission on Higher Education forecasts that college and university enrollments in Texas will zoom from 280,106 to nearly 400,000 by 1971.

Nearly all Texas schools report they are short on space for their present students. Predicted increases will affect everyone of the existing state-supported institutions, Commission believes.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** -- In recent official opinions, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that:

A valid surface lease on land being purchased under the state veteran's land program cannot be given in excess of 10 years.

First assistants and chief deputies in state departments are entitled to reimbursement for actual meals, lodging and incidental expenses while traveling on official business inside or outside the state.

Employees of the State Highway Department who drill or supervise drilling of an occasional water well on land owned by the state do not have to be

## Shrine Club Sponsors Circus At Hereford

If tickets are purchased for the circus and the buyer is unable to attend one of the Hereford performances, the tickets will be honored at either Borger on August 24, Amarillo August 26, 27 and 28 or Lubbock August 30 and 31. The same show will be presented at these cities.

The Hereford performances are scheduled for 2 p. m. and 8 p. m. at the Hereford football stadium next Wednesday.

Featured will be "Herman, the world's only trained Hippo," as well as the "vanishing elephant," and "Keller's Jungle Killers."

The Oasis Shrine Club sponsors the crippled children's

clinic each year at Hereford, with the assistance of members of the Hereford Lions Club and Amarillo's Khiva Temple.

The clinic has been held for the past 10 years, and the Shriners have been urged by area doctors to continue sponsorship of the event. Specialists in a variety of fields come from miles to examine crippling defects in youngsters who come from a four and sometimes five state area.

A total of 143 children came from the 10th clinic last May.

Some 60 per cent were there for the first time. The other 40 per cent were returning for "back-up" examinations.

A round table discussion in the afternoon following the clinic by participating doctors is held annually. Physicians said this year that the clinic was a grand thing, and that they had found several major and minor cases that could be helped.

Examining did not end until about 5:30 p. m. Some of the doctors saw over 40 patients.

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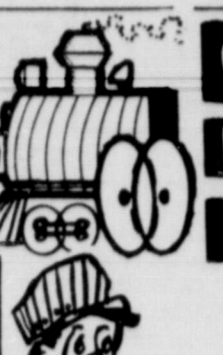

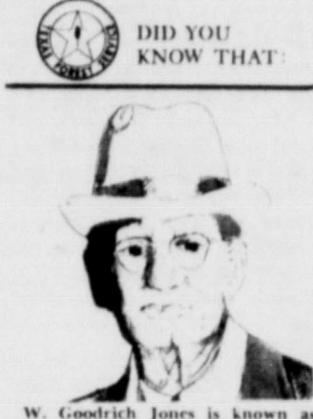

Now's the time to take a thorough, realistic look ahead to the fall of 1966, says Patsy Reynolds, specialist in family life education with the Texas A&M University Extension Service.

"Parents and school counselors should help students take a look at their education or career plans early this fall. They need to complete their plans for college, business school, or other advanced preparation to earn a living. Applications should be submitted by November or December -- yet many families do not realize this when their first child prepares to enter college," Miss Reynolds says.

Students who plan to apply for scholarships should keep this early deadline in mind, too. Many scholarships have a February 1 deadline for application. "This means that the young person must already be admitted to the college and then file the application by February," the specialist adds.

She advises young people to talk to school counselors and write to the colleges or business schools in which they are interested.

A decision on higher education should be reached soon, and it may require some serious thinking before final plans can be made, Miss Reynolds says.







### ECONOMICAL SUMMER MEALS - Can be very nutritious

Summer lunches for children can be economical and easy if you plan ahead and let the youngsters serve themselves. What is a good lunch? It includes meat, cheese, eggs, fish or some other protein food; vegetables or fruit; bread and milk. Every calorie is "loaded with good nutrition."

#### HELPFUL TIPS FOR SHOPPING:

Watch for sales on tuna. Grated tuna is less expensive than chunk and fine for sandwiches.

Best bargain in peanut butter is often the three-pound container.

Processed Cheese is often less expensive than natural cheese.

Broilers are plentiful and an ideal protein.

Here is a good start for a good nutritious lunch:

Tuna fish sandwiches can be very delicious with crisp carrot strips, a banana or peach and chocolate milk.

For a budget pleasing chocolate milk try this:

Sift 1 lb. of instant dry milk 1 cup sugar, 3/4 cup cocoa and 1/4 teaspoon salt together three times and store in a glass jar or metal container. To prepare a chocolate milk, measure 1-1/3 cups mix and stir in enough water to make a paste. Add a quart of boiling water. Cool and then chill in refrigerator.

Another nutritious yet economical menu consists of: Sliced cheese, pickle and lettuce sandwich, a tomato wedge, milk and peanut butter candy. To make Peanut Butter Candy: You'll need 1 cup of peanut butter, 1 cup corn syrup or honey; 1-1/4 cups each non-fat dry milk and confectioner's sugar and 1/2 cup crushed cereal crumbs, chopped nuts or coconut.

Have peanut butter and honey at room temperature; combine and beat in nonfat dry milk until smooth. Add confectioner's sugar a little at a time until mixture has the consistency of putty. Shape into four long pieces. Roll pieces of candy in crumbs, nuts or coconut until well covered. Refrigerate until ready to use. Slice just before serving.

During the regular business it was decided that the group would take several antique cars, horse carts and a mule-driven chuck wagon to the Bull Town Parade in Bovina this Friday.

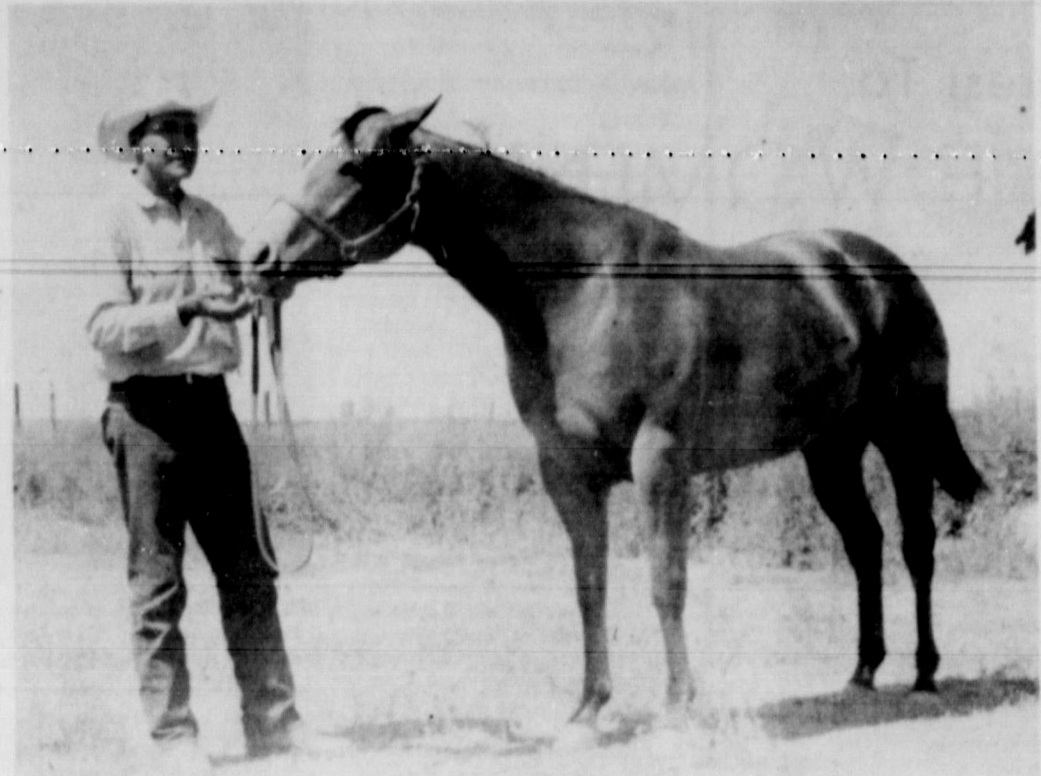

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not

receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Sec. 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allocated to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10¢) tax levy for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period:

North Texas State University at Denton
Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont
Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville
Texas Woman's University at Denton
Texas Southern University at Houston
Midwestern University at Wichita Falls
University of Houston at Houston
Pan American College at Edinburg
East Texas State College at Commerce
Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville
Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos
West Texas State University at Canyon

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches
Sul Ross State College at Austin
Angelo State College at San Angelo

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10¢) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

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### On The Farm In Parmer County

Each year animals are lost after grazing on sorghums, sudangrass, sorghum hybrids or Johnson grass. The cause may be prussic acid poisoning.

These grasses contain a glycoside which may break down into prussic acid in the digestive tract of the animal. The poisonous material is most likely to be present in young, immature stands, or second growth following periods of drought or mechanical harvesting. There is also danger in the fall, following the first frost.

Cattle are more susceptible to the poison than sheep or goats. Horses and swine are rarely injured. An affected animal may stagger and act sleepy before suddenly dropping dead. Severe muscular twitching sometimes occurs. Death results from suffocation, since the poison prevents the exchange of oxygen from the blood to the tissue.

A drench of molasses diluted with water may help a poisoned animal, but a veterinarian should be called at once to give additional treatment. To prevent prussic acid poisoning, do not graze regrowth that has been stopped by lack of moisture, frosted pastures, or regrowth after a frost.

Forage containing prussic acid can be fed safely if it is cut and allowed to cure completely in the field, or if it is put up as silage and not fed for several months. Mature plants with few suckers and not fed for several months. Mature plants with few suckers are seldom dangerous if growth has been normal. Grain sorghum or Sudan stubble regrowth grazed in late fall can be dangerous. A good way to check grazing safety is to turn one or two low grade animals into the field and watch them for a day or two. Be sure water is available to them, or the symptoms may be delayed. If the test animals remain healthy, its probably safe to turn the main herd into the pasture.

**BIRD DAMAGE**  
Several people have remarked about the damage birds were causing on their sorghum. This is one of those problems that is hard to control.

About the only thing we know of is to scare them away by using a box or two of shot gun shells and maybe put up some type of scarecrow. This will not really control them but merely run them off on someone else.

**SILAGE TIPS**  
Sharp knives and properly adjusted forage harvester mean a saving in time and fuel when harvesting silage. Increased silo capacity and better silage at feeding time.

For quality silage at feeding time, you need a quality forage crop at the proper stage of maturity at harvest time. The crop should be harvested to give short, uniformly cut silage. Sharp knives and shear bars

adjusted to the proper clearance aid in producing uniform cut silage with minimum power requirements. Most of the power is used in the chopping process. If knives are dull or the shear bar-to-knife spacing is incorrect, you are throwing away power. Forage will be torn apart rather than cut. This eats up power and results in coarse, non-uniform silage that is difficult to pack. The end product is lower, quality silage of poor palatability.

A length of cut from one-fourth to three-eighths inch is desirable. It's a good idea to check your operator's manual for information on adjustment and operation of your particular forage harvester.

**4-H CALF PROJECTS**  
The deadline for getting 4-H Show calf projects on feed is real close. Any 4-H'ers wanting to feed calves should notify the County Agent's office immediately. Calves must be located and placed on feed this month. Please let the County Agent know if you expect to feed and show a calf this year.

**COTTON IRRIGATION**  
Now is the time to stop watering your cotton. We believe farmers will make more net profit off their cotton crop by cutting the water off by August 20 here in Parmer County.

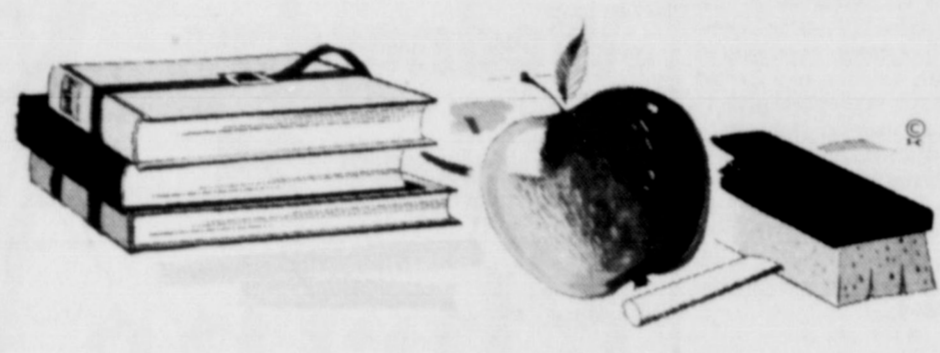
Over the years research has proved this water cut-off date the most profitable.

**WHEAT FERTILITY**  
The application of sufficient fertilizer, in proper balance to correct soil deficiencies, is now accepted as one of the most profitable single practices.

Soils vary greatly in their ability to supply nitrogen and phosphorus. The soil test remains the best single guide for determining the amount and grade of fertilizer needed. Remember that 50 bu. of wheat grain alone contains about 50 lbs. of N and 25 lbs. of P2O5. Forage removed by grazing can contain 20% protein of about 3% actual nitrogen on a dry weight basis.

Data from research conducted on the Pullman soils indicates time of nitrogen application is not a major factor where wheat is being grown for grain only. Yields were about the same when nitrogen was applied preplant, in split applications, or as a topdress in February. However, where grazing is to be practiced it is important to apply all or part of the nitrogen as a preplant to stimulate early growth. The nitrogen can be conveniently applied anytime before listing. If solid or liquid forms are used, they should not be left on the surface for long periods.

If the soil test indicates a deficiency of phosphorus, the phosphate should be applied in such a manner that it will remain in moist soil--in reach of permanent roots.
