## EXPANDS SERVICES TO NEW NEEDS

Rankin has already spent some \$12,000 on extending the gas, water and sewer lines to meet the increasing demands now being placed on these installations. Work began in June and still will see the installation of gas and water to several locations outside the city limits. Six blocks of new water and gas lines are presently being installed on the west side of the city with a considerable amount of difficulty encountered by workmen in the rocky hillsides.

### CONSUMPTION UP

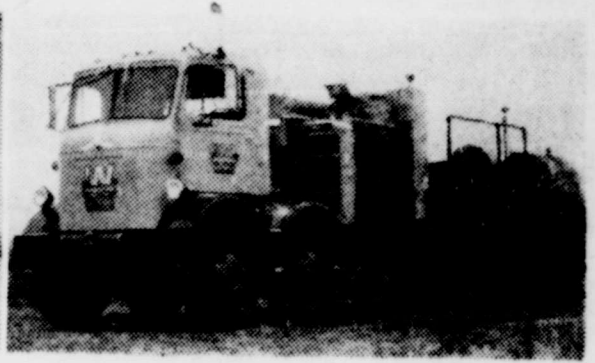

## Telephone Company Hires Extra Help For Rankin Work

In a telephone conversation last Tuesday morning with Floyd Reed, district manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, the Rankin News learned that Rankin now has a serviceman assigned exclusively to this area.

In making the announcement—a project that has long been the desire of many folks in Rankin—Reed stated that he fully realized the situation as it had existed in Rankin and that it was his and the company's desire to do everything possible to improve and expand service here as rapidly as they could.

One of the first tasks assigned the new Rankin serviceman, according to Reed, is the checking of all telephone lines and cables in the area for any small breaks. In making this check, the serviceman is using one of the latest inventions made for this purpose. By pumping a gas into the cable or line, it is possible to carry the machine along the line and every place there is even the very smallest break, it can be detected. In this way breaks can be discovered that could not be seen with the eye and would only give trouble when it rained.

Reed further stated that for the time being, the serviceman would be stationed in McCamey but would be responsible for answering any Rankin service requests as quickly as possible.

"It is our desire to give Rankin the best service and telephone system possible," Reed said, "and we are making every effort to do so."

### NEW EQUIPMENT TO BE INSTALLED

In addition to the new servicing policy, the company expects to enlarge the capacity of the central office in Rankin to take care of more telephones. It is expected that this work will be completed in about 60 days.

"We would consider it a personal favor to have every Rankin family visit us this Sunday evening," Bill Seabolt, manager of the Western Company in Rankin said this week.

Occasion for the invitation will be an open house affair and bar-b-que from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. Sunday, August 19, at the new station on the Midland Highway. Along with the bar-b-que will go all the trimmings, soft drinks and ice cream and a friendly welcome and get-acquainted event with Western

personnel and their families on hand to meet the visitors and show them around.

On display at the open house will be the shops and office buildings of the installation along with their latest piece of equipment, a huge "Fracmaster." Other equipment which may be inspected is the Rocket J-II perforator, Gammatron Logging equipment, and acidizing, fracturing and perforating machinery.

One of the highlights of the evening will be an actual demonstration of the Rocket J-II perforator in which a rocket will be set off in a length of pipe to demonstrate its perforating abilities.

"We have been looking forward to holding this event and want all the folks to know that they are welcome to attend," Seabolt said.

Would you buy food while blindfolded? Labels were meant to insure your safety and to help you get what you want.

Labels on foods which leave their home state for sale must have the following information:

1. The name of the product and the variety or style when applicable.
2. The name and address of the manufacturer, packer or shipper.
3. An accurate statement of the quantity.
4. A list of the common or usual name of each ingredient, when two or more foods go into an unstand-

ardized product. The order of listing indicates the relative amount of each food. The food present in largest quantity comes first.

5. Enough facts to fully inform the purchaser concerning foods for special dietary purposes.

6. A statement of the use of artificial flavoring, artificial coloring, imitations, or chemical preservatives.

An indication and explanation of substandard quality or substandard fill of container. Such food must be wholesome, although it may not measure up to prescribed minimums in a stated way.

This information can help you decide on the foods which will be most satisfactory for your family. Read the label carefully. Choose the food best suited to your purpose

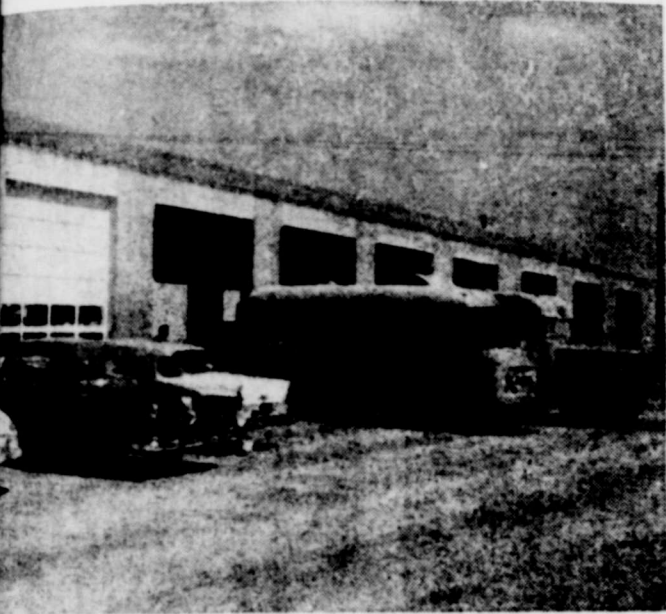

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9** proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction therefor may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside, unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly accorded the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Sections 17 and 18, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning and repealing Chapter 330, Acts, Regular Session, Fifty-third Legislature, and proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the improved support of the University of Texas and the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas from a source other than tax revenue by providing for the broader investment of the Permanent University Fund in corporate bonds and stocks under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 17 and 18 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the State ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7%) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article 3, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a State ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2%) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the acquisition, construction and initial equipping of buildings, or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning; and the governing board of each of such institutions of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise not later than September 1, 1968, and September 1, 1978, respectively; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to a period of twenty (20) years from the effective date of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five Cent (5%) tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds or notes hereby authorized; provided, further, that the State tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, Arlington State College, Tarleton State College, and Prairie View A. and M. College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval; and for the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the University of Texas System, including the Main University of Texas at Austin, the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, the University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston, Texas Western College of the University of Texas at El Paso, the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, the University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, the University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of the University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, the Main University of Texas at Austin, the University of Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and the University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not, after the effective date of this Amendment, receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for

which said Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This amendment shall be self-enacting; provided, however, it shall not become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede or repeal the former provisions of this Section, but shall become so operative and effective on January 1, 1958; provided, further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any State institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this amendment, but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as heretofore allocated to any such institution under this Section, nor shall the provisions of this amendment affect in any way the prior allocation of the revenue for the ten-year period beginning January 1, 1948, as heretofore authorized by the provisions of Section 17 of Article VII of this Constitution as adopted August 23, 1947, Chapter 330, Acts, Regular Session, Fifty-third Legislature, as amended, but the principal and interest due on any obligations incurred by the governing boards of Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont and of Texas Southern University at Houston under the provisions of said Chapter 330 prior to its repeal shall be paid from the allocations to Lamar State College of Technology and Texas Southern University from the funds raised by the Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax levied as provided in this Section, and the annual allocations to these institutions under this Section shall be first devoted to current requirements for meeting such obligations in accordance with their terms.

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, Arlington State College, Tarleton State College, and Prairie View A. and M. College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval; and for the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the University of Texas System, including the Main University of Texas at Austin, the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, the University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston, Texas Western College of the University of Texas at El Paso, the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, the University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, the University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of the University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, the Main University of Texas at Austin, the University of Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and the University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not, after the effective date of this Amendment, receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for

constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any Revenue funds.

"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and the University of Texas in the income of the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 330 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the Forty-second Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing payment of the principal and interest on bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such securities as shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This amendment shall become effective on January 1, 1958; provided, however, nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore incurred by the issuance of any outstanding bonds or notes under this section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this amendment but any such outstanding bonds or notes shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with their terms and conditions.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant to this amendment shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This amendment shall become effective on January 1, 1958; provided, however, nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore incurred by the issuance of any outstanding bonds or notes under this section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this amendment but any such outstanding bonds or notes shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with their terms and conditions.

Sec. 2. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new Section to be designated as Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund be invested in first lien real estate mortgage securities guaranteed in whole or in part by the United States Government or any agency thereof, and in such corporation bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem proper investments for said fund, and interest and dividends accruing from securities listed in Section 11 and Section 11a, except the portion thereof appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes hereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish purposes declared in Section 18 of Article VII of this Constitution. In making and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then existing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own private affairs in regard to speculation, and in the investment of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital; provided, however, that not more than five per cent (5%) of said fund shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks and bonds, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of voting stock of any one corporation be owned; and provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States who have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately preceding the date of purchase and which are not bank stocks and insurance stocks, and upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for the disclosure of all details concerning investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized under this Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 17 and 18 thereof, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning; and adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the improved support of the University of Texas System and the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System by authorizing the investment of the Permanent University Fund in corporate bonds and stocks under certain conditions and limitations."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 17 and 18 thereof, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning; and adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the improved support of the University of Texas System and the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System by authorizing the investment of the Permanent University Fund in corporate bonds and stocks under certain conditions and limitations."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 13, 1956

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33** proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and not residents of the State of Texas, who are receiving aid for the permanently and totally disabled may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, or be resident in any completely State supported institution; providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals; providing that the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds and may never exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; providing that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year, providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-b which shall read as follows:

Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by general laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and not residents of the State of Texas, who are receiving aid for the permanently and totally disabled may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, or be resident in any completely State supported institution; providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals; providing that the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds and may never exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; providing that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year, providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and election.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period, the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, based on the average long session full-time student equivalent enrollment (fifteen (15) semester credit hours shall constitute one full-time student) for the preceding five-year period of time, shall re-allocate, to the above designated institutions of higher learning then in existence, all funds to be derived from said Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period; and all such designated institutions of higher learning which participate in the allocation or re-allocation of such funds shall not thereafter receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for

which said Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This amendment shall be self-enacting; provided, however, it shall not become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede or repeal the former provisions of this Section, but shall become so operative and effective on January 1, 1958; provided, further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any State institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this amendment, but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as heretofore allocated to any such institution under this Section, nor shall the provisions of this amendment affect in any way the prior allocation of the revenue for the ten-year period beginning January 1, 1948, as heretofore authorized by the provisions of Section 17 of Article VII of this Constitution as adopted August 23, 1947, Chapter 330, Acts, Regular Session, Fifty-third Legislature, as amended, but the principal and interest due on any obligations incurred by the governing boards of Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont and of Texas Southern University at Houston under the provisions of said Chapter 330 prior to its repeal shall be paid from the allocations to Lamar State College of Technology and Texas Southern University from the funds raised by the Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax levied as provided in this Section, and the annual allocations to these institutions under this Section shall be first devoted to current requirements for meeting such obligations in accordance with their terms.

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, Arlington State College, Tarleton State College, and Prairie View A. and M. College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval; and for the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the University of Texas System, including the Main University of Texas at Austin, the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, the University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston, Texas Western College of the University of Texas at El Paso, the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, the University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, the University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of the University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, the Main University of Texas at Austin, the University of Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and the University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not, after the effective date of this Amendment, receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for

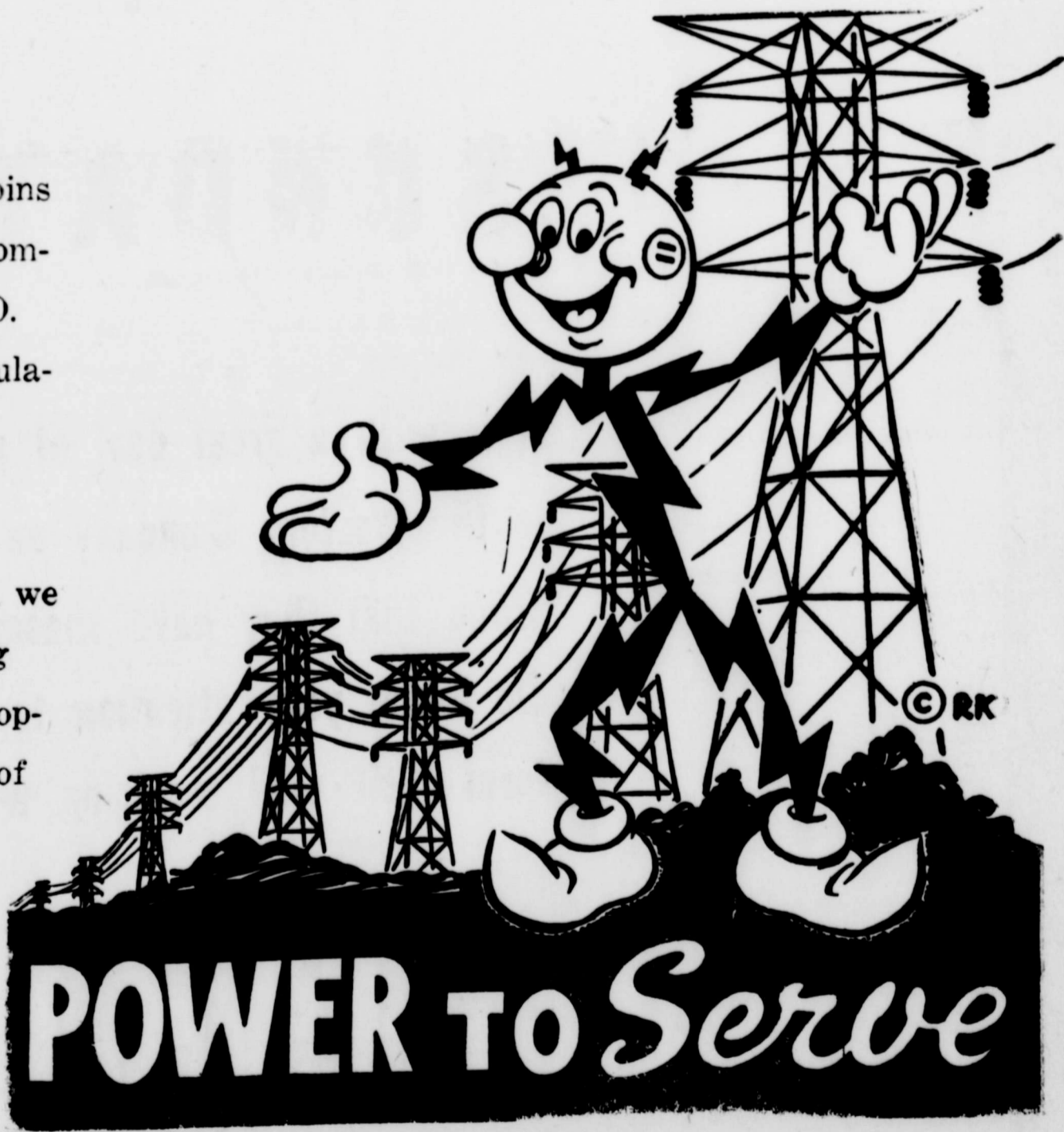

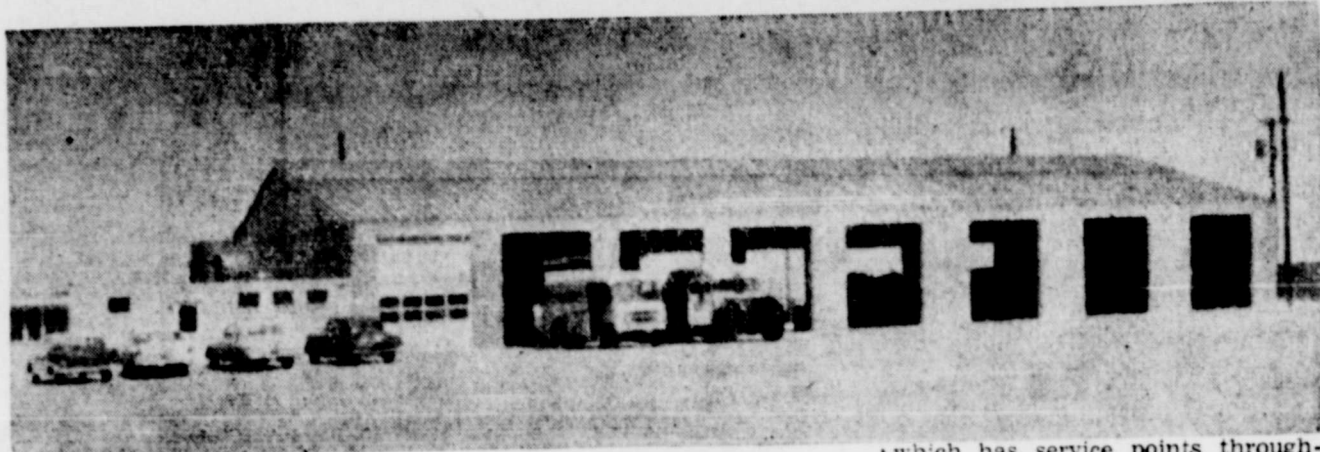

### Flexibility given As Secret To Good Range Management Work

According to Dan Webster, flexibility may be defined as follows: "responsive to, or readily adjustable to change in condition." Flexible stocking defined means the

number of livestock are adjusted in response to changing climatic and range conditions. Climatic conditions which include rainfall, temperature, wind, or the combination of the three will directly determine the grass production of our ranges. Only by adjusting our livestock operation to climatic condi-

tions can we obtain the maximum production of our ranges.

Before man upset the balance of nature, the wild game led a migratory life and followed the available food supply and water. When an area was grazed heavily, the animals moved to a more productive area. The mountain elk still summer in the high alpine meadows and winter in the foot hills and flats. Not only did nature control the movement of the wild game, but the numbers were controlled by starvation, disease, and predatory animals. In times of severe drought the wild animals either migrated or starved, and few returned until the country was lush with grass again. Thus by severe methods, nature kept wildlife numbers flexible with range production.

Man has learned many lessons by watching nature. Flexible stocking has been carried on by nature since the dawn of history. We would do very well to stop and consider nature's methods, as this whole country was covered with tall, vigorous grass, when man first rode into it. There are few cases on record where

man has been able to improve over nature.

Flexible stocking can be carried on in many ways. However, through experience, ranchers have found that it can best be accomplished by maintaining part of the stocking rate in a breeding herd, and part in dry animals such as lambs or steers. These dry animals can be marketed quickly if conditions warrant a decrease in livestock numbers. Some have obtained good results by running lambs or steers in the winter and using complete deferrment in the summer; this method is especially effective in improving the condition of deteriorated ranges.

Considered from the economic point of view, flexible stocking rates can reduce feed bills and produce heavy, higher quality lambs and calves. Flexible stocking is recognized in the Middle Concho Soil Conservation District program plan of work as one of the major needs of the district because of the erratic rainfall. Flexible stocking is the basis of all range improvement and maintenance. It is the only alternative man has until that day should arrive when man can control the climate.

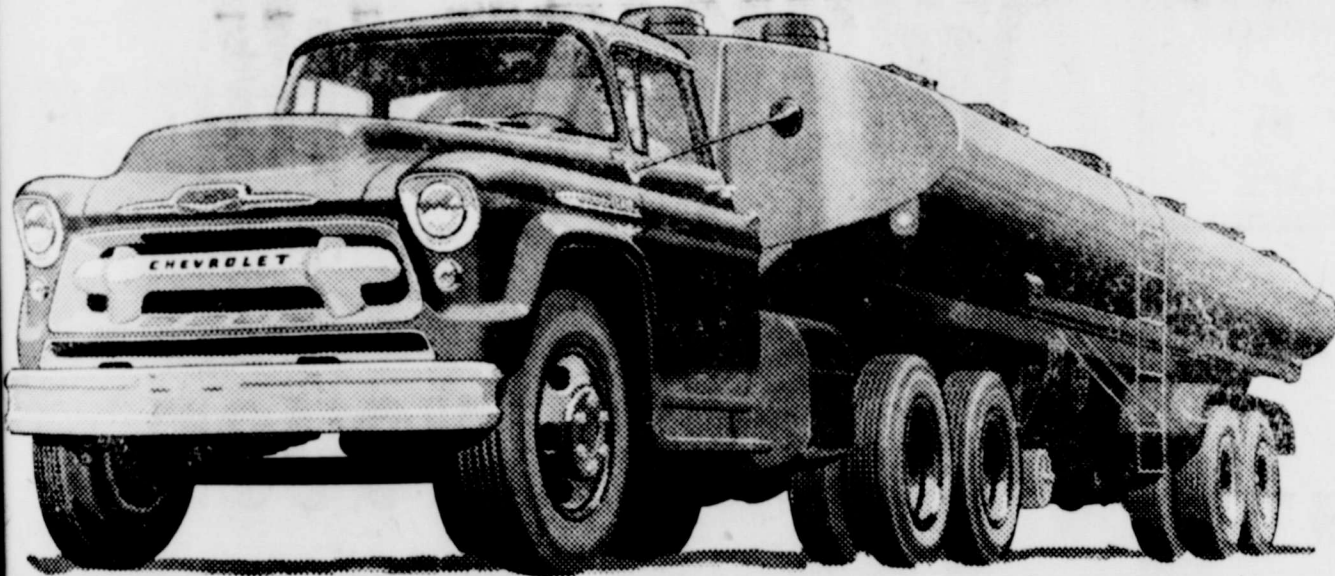

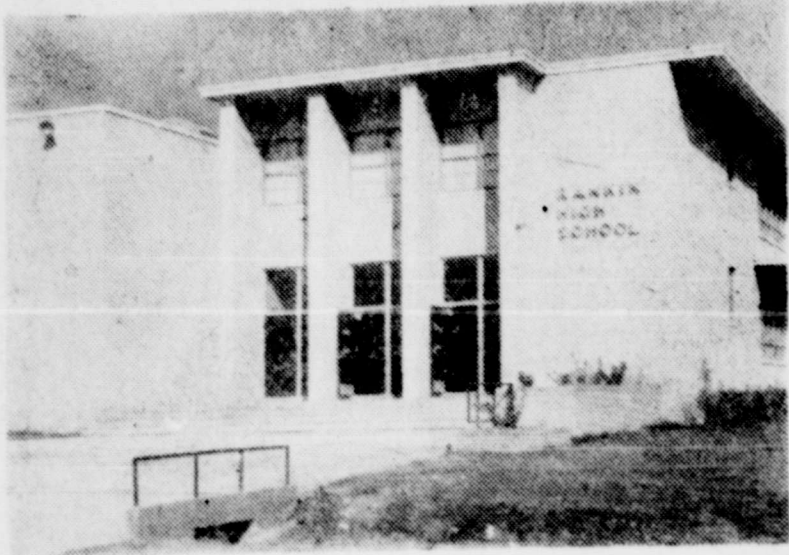

### School Enrollment Expected To Climb

Enrollment in Rankin schools is expected to climb to a new high this year after showing a slight decline in the early part of the past school season.

In the 1954-55 term, an all-time high of 540 was reached for all grades enrolled. This high was lowered by some 63 students in the 1955-56 term when only 477 were enrolled at the beginning of the term. However, in contrast to past years, enrollment in the local schools continued to climb and at the end of the term, the largest number of students on record were attending high school.

School officials have pointed out that, ordinarily, enrollment is highest at the beginning of a term and usually drops off as the year progresses.

#### IMPROVEMENTS MADE

With the coming season and the record enrollment anticipated, considerable work has been going on

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during the summer in making ready the three school buildings and other facilities to accommodate the new students. Repairs and improvements to grounds have been completed on almost every building.

At the present time, Supt. Joe Scrivner is reporting a scarcity of qualified teachers and with the opening of school drawing near, the search for added personnel is being intensified. Principal cause for the lack of teachers, according to Scrivner, is the fact that some of the neighboring states have raised their base pay for school teachers and are attracting many Texas instructors to take out-of-state jobs.

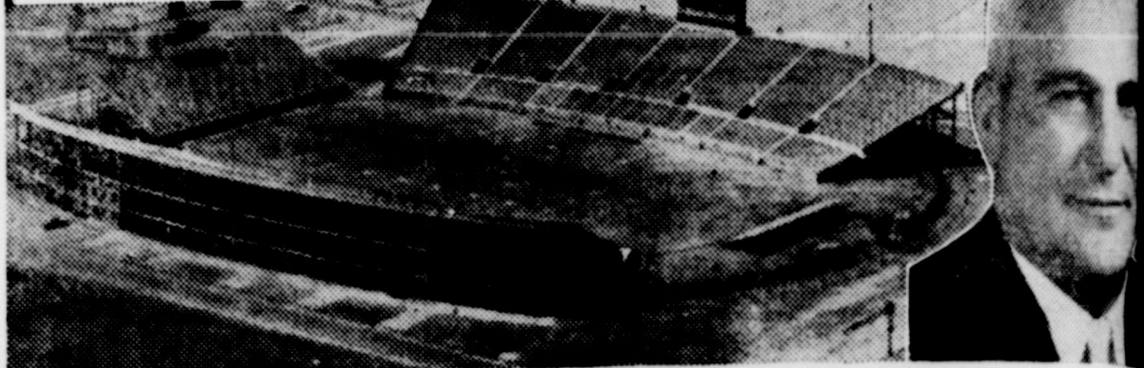
