Representative Louis Anderson has told us that Rankin was one of the few places in the State that caught the sneaker clause in the proposals which are likely to become law. He said that he talked to the sponsorers of the bill and told them about the objections he had received to the proposal and that said sponsorers backed down immediately on the issue and said that they did not intend for the requirement to be manditory as it first was written but that if it was passed it would be permessive.

That is, a school could join with others if it so desired or it could operate independentally.

We'd say that it done a lot of good to write the officals in this instance and we tip our caps to all who took the trouble to do so. A little commenting by a voter still carries a lot of weight.

A bill to combat the \$15,000,000 a year shoplifting racket in Texas will be introduced in the Texas Legislature, Mrs. Myrle Brown, manager of the Credit Bureau of Rankin, said today.

She said sponsors of the legislation would be Senator Robert W. Baker of Houston and Representative Carl C. Conley of Raymond-

Main purpose of the legislation, Mryrle said, is to provide stiffer penalties for habitual offenders. The bill will also permit merchants and their authorized agents to detain suspected shoplifters without fear of subsequent charges of false ar- coffee and cookies. rest or other civil suits.

She said that when shoplifting losses are absorbed by retail outlets they constitute a major item of overhead and to cover such tremendous losses, it is necessary to raise the prices of merchandise sold to the consumer.


