IN COUNTY TAXES
By way of explination to county property owners who have made in quiries about new tax values on some of their property appearing on statements received for the current billing. County officia!s said this week that there has been no general increase in county taxes, The tax rate is to remain the same as it was last year
E County Tax Assessor-Collector H E. "Gene" Eckols explained this week that any figures appearing in the right hand column of the state men's mailed out is only a tenta-
tive figure. "This figure, whether higher or lower, will have no bearing whatraised or lowered by the Board of Equalization," Eckols has said. "In case this is done, you will be given
notice to appear before the board. If you don't get a notice, your values will be the same as last year."

It is the duties of the Tax Assessor to fix values on property for thaxation purposes by the County In this line, he is supposed to make
adjustmen's in values from time to time as they may change. This would apply in the case of a vacant lot that had a house built or moved onto it within the tax year. Certain other improvements woul also add to the value of the prop-
erty and adjustments to equalize the tax burden would become neces sary.
BOARD SETS TAXES
County taxing policies are to deermine the approximate resal value ot property and to then take ing purposes. County taxes are al so equalized as nearly as possible on value with those taken by the tw cities of Rankin and McCamey. Officials have also pointed out that any new tax values as the appear on the statements are not necessarily the final values that will be set on the propenty. Shoplifting Proposal Would Aid Merchants
A bill to combat the $\$ 15,000,000$ a year shoplifting racket in Texas will be introduced in the Texas Legislature, Mrs. Myrle Brown, manager of the Credit Bureau of Skin, sald today
She said sponsors of the legislation would be Senator Rabert $W$ Baker of Houston and Representative Carl C. Conley of Raymondville.
Main purpose of the legislation, Mryrle said, is to provide stiffer penalties for habitual offenders. The bill will also permit merchants and their authorized agents to detain suspected shoplifters without fea of subsequent charges of false arrest or other civil suits
She said that when shoplifting losses are absorbed by retail outlets they constitute a major item of overhead and to cover such tremendous losses, it is necessary to raise the prices of merchandise sold to the consumer
It has been estimated that shoplifting costs the average buyer at least $\$ 2.50$ each year in most cities and year.
