FRIONA WEATHER

Up until Thursday night of last week, the weather locally had been for two weeks or longer, just as fine autumn weather as one could wish to enjoy, but on that night the wind switched to the north and the temperature began sliding downward and by morning it was really cold—not freezing, however—and raining some.

Rain fell throughout Friday in rather copious showers, and during the night and a part of the day Saturday, to the extent that the entire Friona territory was soaked with an estimated fall of from three and a half to four and a half inches.

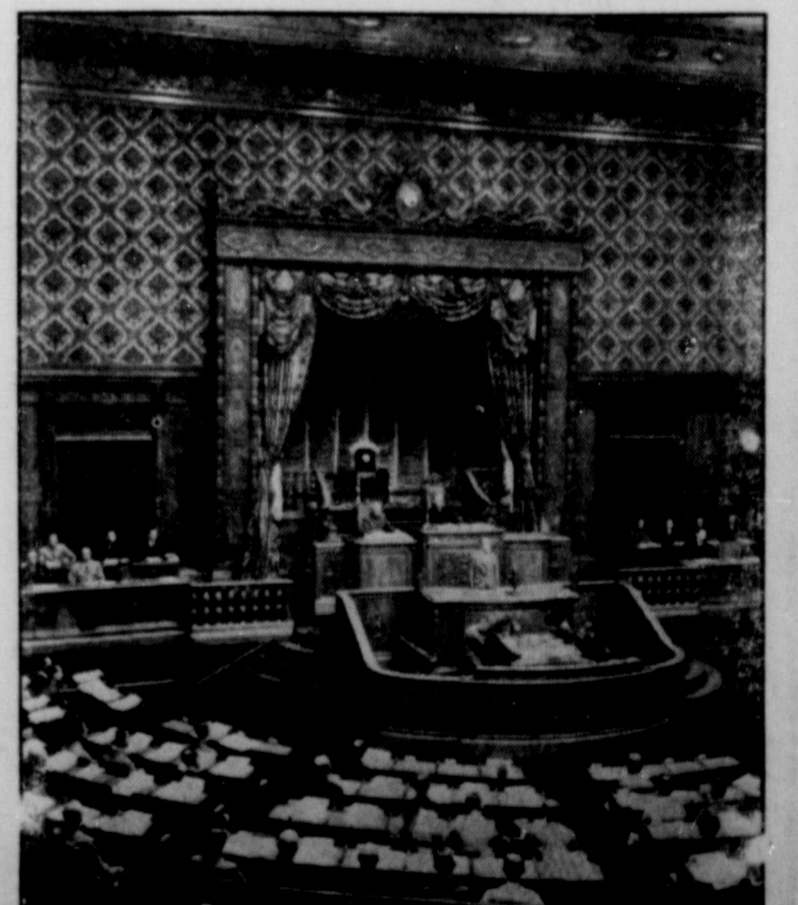

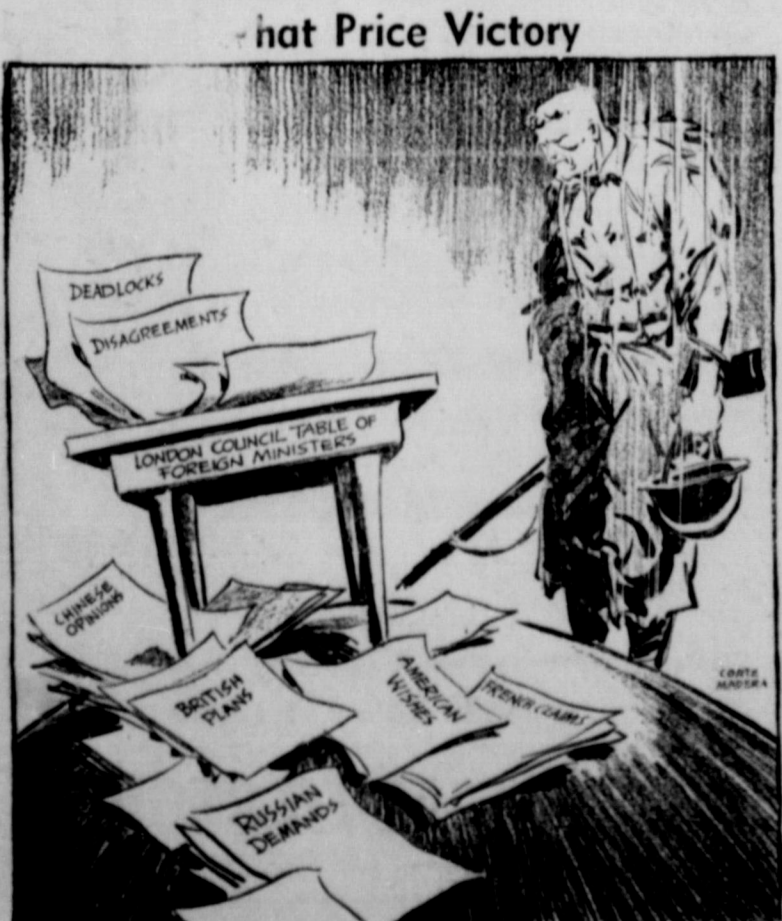

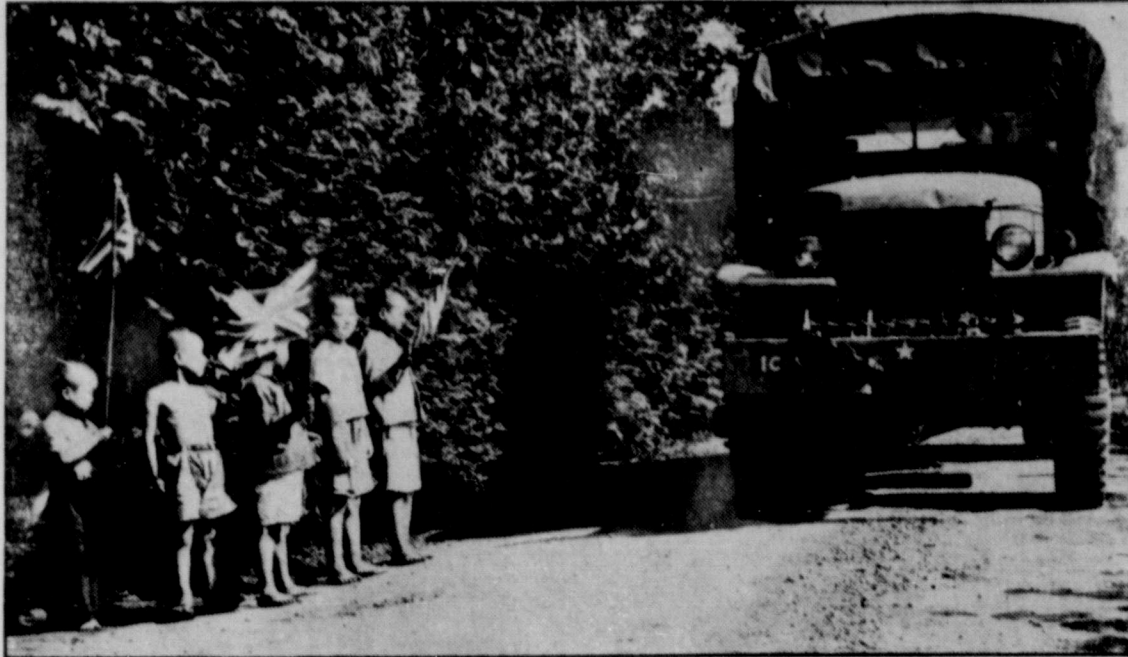

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

The Home Is Our School for Teaching Righteous Living

The International Sunday School Lesson for Oct. 14
Scripture: Deuteronomy 6:4-9; Luke 2:51-52; Ephesians 5:22, 25; 6:1-4

THE world has been experiencing what happens when the state becomes of more importance than the home or the church.

In Germany and in Japan the totalitarian state usurped the rights of home and parents. Blind obedience to the state, symbolized in the dictatorial decrees of Fuhrer and Emperor, so outweighed every other consideration of loyalty to home and parents, kindness, and the sense of right, that every normal, healthy childhood thought and emotion became dominated and corrupted under the perverting power of the totalitarian idea, with an aggressive and ruthless state as its embodiment.

More important even than the school, or even the church, is the home; for the influence of the school, or of the church, will be of little avail if the teaching of school and church is not exemplified and supported in the home.

We all know this, or we acknowledge it, when we think about it; yet the home situation in our land—in every land for that matter—constitutes one of the greatest perils and problems of our time. It is appalling, for instance, to think of the number of children who grow to manhood with no real home-life at all, in broken homes where parents are divorced or separated, where there is no environment of love and nurture, such as every child ought to have. It is appalling, moreover, to realize the number of homes in which parents are neither divorced or separated, but where they might as well be so far as healthy and happy home-life is concerned. What a heritage for a child who grows up in the midst of home antagonisms and strife!

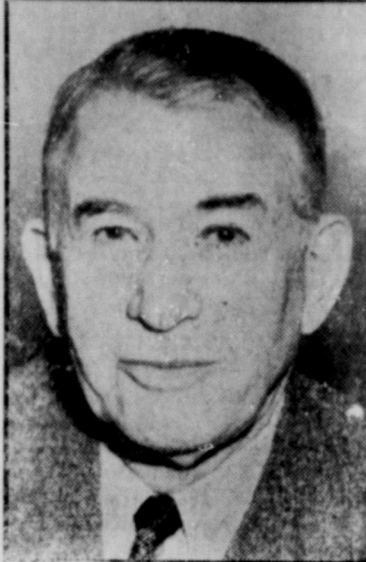

War Trophy Guns Must Be Registered

In behalf of public safety, Joseph D. Nunan, Jr., commissioner of internal revenue, today appealed to all members and veterans of the armed forces and their families to register and safeguard all machine guns and similar automatic weapons which have been brought into the country as war trophies.

Registration of such weapons with the nearest office of any investigator in charge, Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, is mandatory under terms of the National Firearms Act of 1934. However, the department of Internal Revenue has not sought rigid enforcement of the act in this case, until recent months when several instances have been reported of criminals stealing war trophy guns and using the weapons for criminal purposes.

Therefore, the department is urging the registration of any firearms of automatic type—such as machine pistols, machine guns, submachine guns, or any type gun from which a number of shots or bullets may be discharged with one continuous pull of the trigger.

"I urge all servicemen, veterans and their families to communicate at once with the nearest office of any investigator in charge, Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, or to write to me in Washington," Commissioner Nunan said. "A representative of the Bureau will call and assist them with the registration without charge.

"At the same time I urge possessors of these weapons to accept the assistance of the Bureau representative in rendering the guns permanently inoperative. This will not affect their souvenir value, but will prevent accidents and help keep the weapon out of the hands of the criminal element.

"Furthermore, as long as the weapon is serviceable, the law requires payment of the \$200

"I earnestly hope that service families will understand that these cautions are being issued for their protection—protection not only against the consequences of possessing deadly weapons, but also protection against violations of the National Firearms Act, which provides penalties up to five years in prison and a \$2,000 fine for each violation. Careful compliance with this law will, on the other hand, permit safe enjoyment of the war trophies of the type mentioned."

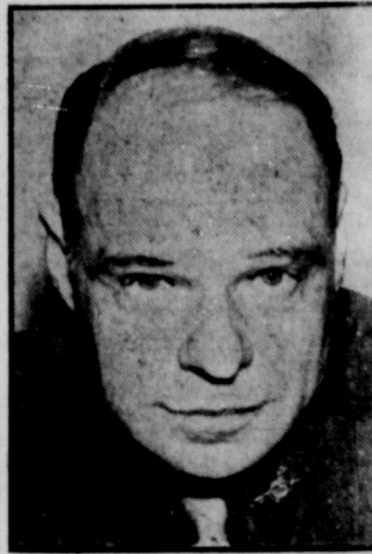
