# Run-Offs Develop From Last Saturday's Balloting

A very substantial vote turnout of 1662 was marked up for the county in last Saturday Democratic Primary which saw a mixture of sentiments as they failed to select any heavy favorites in such races as Governor, Lt. Governor and Attorney General. J. T. Rutherford did not run as well as he had in previous elections and Gene Hendryx of Alpine replaced him as the big vote-getter in contested races.

Star attraction was the county judges race which saw Bud Fisher move out in front—his usual position—followed by Allen Moore,

Norman Elrod and Joe Guthrie. Fisher and Moore will settle the question in the second primary on June 2. Box 2 in Precinct 2 wrote in W. J. Price to contest with A. J. McDonald in a run-off for Justice of the Peace.

County Democratic Chairman, Kirby Dawkins, said this week that Price's name would go on the June 2 ballot and that Price had paid the regular filing fee of \$150.00, required of candidates in this race.

newspaper, Price failed to pay his filing fee for the first primary when he forgot the deadline date. Mrs. Al Turner, another candidate in the same situation, ran third on a write-in in the box.

County Clerk Nancy Daugherty said this week that 188 absentee ballots were either cast at her office or mailed out for the election. She stated that two of this number failed to be returned before the deadline and that only 1 was disqualified by the canvassing committee. In that instance, the voter had moved from the county between the time he cast his ballot and election day. It had been rumored that as many as 13 absentee ballots were disqualified.

On the horse racing propositions, Box 1 voted 119 in favor of the first proposition; 80 against. Box 2 had 106 for, 56 against. Box 3 was 21 for and 28 against.

On the poll tax question, Box 1 voted 135 in favor of repeal and 68 against. Box 2 had 98 for and 65 against while Box 3 was 36 for, 13 against.

## THE VOTING—

There you have it—some surprises, some as expected and some still up in the air. Texas voters as a whole did not seem in much of a mood for change with most of the incumbents being returned to office. In the 25th Senatorial District, voters gave the O. K. nod to Dorsey Hardeman while his two other main cohorts in promoting the sales tax, Price

Daniel and State Senator Wardlow Lane, were turned out to grass.

Before the voting there was talk that a strong conservative vote would be cast against Rep. J. T. Rutherford but final results show that the closest man to him was a liberal. The two conservative candidates in the race were far down the list.

In the county judge's race, it was somewhat of a surprise to the supporters of Norman Elrod when he failed to make the cut. Allen Moore showed more strength in Rankin that most had given him credit for. Bud Fisher, performing as usual in his ability to get the votes, raked in some 50-odd more votes in McCamey this time than he did in 1958 in the first primary. This race now promises to be a real diddy with Moore expected to pick up a good portion of Elrod's Rankin vote while the battle will rage for the votes cast for Guthrie in McCamey. The difference may well be in the turn-out on June 2.

In Precinct Two JP race, the box again demonstrated that it is well founded on the write-in vote as it moved W. J. Price into a run-off with Arch McDonald.

Back up in the Governor's race, confusion was apparent when almost every candidate in the race received a respectable vote. Price Daniel just beat out Edwin Walker for last place and may have been the one receiving the licks

from Upton Voters for the sales tax. Upton County favored all 3 of the propositions on the ballot—which brings to mind something a local citizen said about putting these propositions on the ballot. His comment: "how come they didn't put the question to the voters about the sales tax?" How did that come about anyway?

A new popular candidate did make his appearance—Mr. Gene Hendryx of Alpine—as he polled the most votes in Upton County of any contested candidate. This position has gone to J. T. Rutherford in the past.

So now we look to June 2 and in between can expect to have some of our favorite tv programs taken over by first one then the other as we get the ear pounded about who's best for what. For my money there's still only one good candidate left in the state races—Preston Smith for Lieutenant Governor. He's a good man and one for which I shall be proud to vote for again on June 2.

There is some talk of conservatives voting for Yarborough in June in order to have a true liberal vs. a conservative Republican in November. Such talk is taking a big chance unless we want more of the New Frontier in Texas for it'll be a cold day anytime Texas elects a Republican Governor.

## ALMOST—

We had another race over the week-end that may have been overlooked by some in the heat of the election. The RHS One-Act play cast was in Austin, doing their stuff for a forth straight state championship title.

But such was not to be. Second was the best they could muster but when you consider that they have earned first in the state for three years in a row, a second-best is certainly not to be sneezed at—in fact—that's mighty good and we can all be right proud of the youngsters. Then, just to prove that they are among the top students in Texas, the debate team stepped up and received the first-place trophy for that division. Lonnie Ferrell was selected as Best Actor in Class A and Pam Simpson got honorable mention on the state all-star cast. Not a bad day's work—not bad at all.

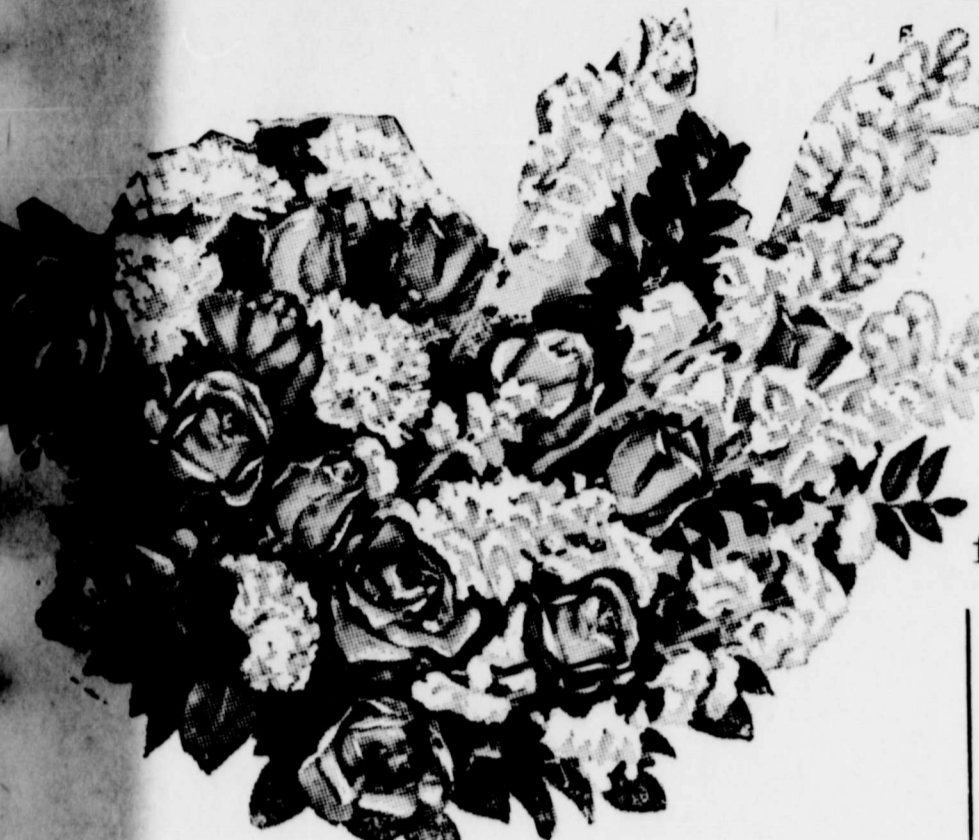

## County Agent Says Screwworm Spreads

County Agricultural Agent Dub Day reports that because of extremely favorable weather conditions for screwworm activity, that screwworms have spread into Central and West Texas, most of the counties in the Edwards Plateau and about half the counties in the Trans-Pecos area.

Day says that plans are being made to expand the sterile screwworm fly release area to include most of the infested area. The majority of the sterile flies being produced will be released in a barrier zone which will encompass the northern edge of the screwworm infested area.

He encourages all livestock producers to inspect all livestock regularly, to treat all wounds promptly, and to collect ten or more worms from deep in the wound and bring them to his office. He points out that the more screwworms that are killed by chemical treatment, the fewer sterile flies will be required to overwhelm the native flies.

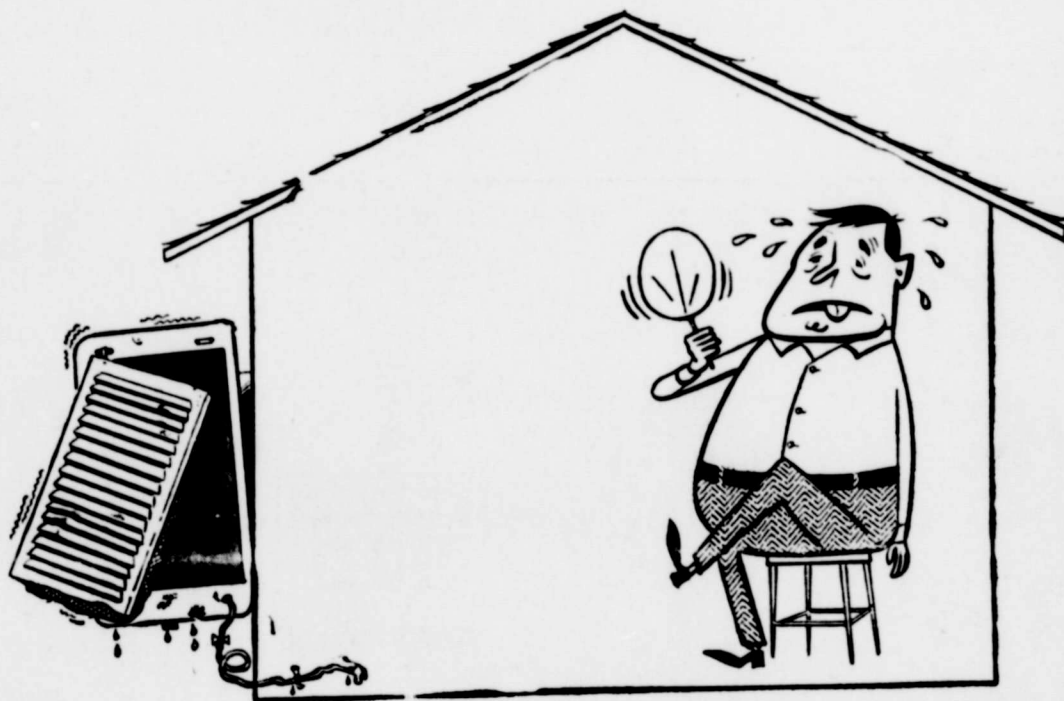
