Thirteenth Annual All-Kid Rodeo Kicks Off Here Friday

It's Rodeo Time again in Rankin. Get your hat!
Dub Day says that it looks like this one is going to be a dandy with a bigger parade, more entries and more events offered. Contestants will be trying for a first-place sweep of the All-Kid rodeo with the one gathering in the most points to be nominated as all-around cowboy—or cowgirl—as the case may be, with a brand new hand-made saddle, engraved and with all the trimmings, going to the winner. First place winners in the various events and

divisions will receive engraved belt buckles. The first-place saddle award is now on display at the First State Bank.
PARADE
The opening-day parade will set the pace for the show when it goes on display at 6:00 p.m. Friday. Prizes are being offered for the best float and the best individual and everyone is invited to take part. Many of the performers will be in this parade and it will be led by the Rankin Red Devil Band. In connection with

the band, Director James Mabrey has requested that all band students attend a practice session at the band hall at 7 p.m., Thursday, June 7. The band will also play for both performances of the rodeo.
DANCE
On Friday night, beginning at 9 p.m., a public dance will be held at the Rankin Golf Club with admission being 50-cents per person and music by juke box. Every one is invited to attend this event.
FAST SHOW
Workmen were busy on Wednesday of this week putting up extra seating and preparing the grounds for the rodeo itself which will get underway at 8 o'clock on both Friday and Saturday nights. More improvements have been added to the arena and a good, fast bunch of stock has been secured which will provide top-notch en-

tainment for spectators and some tough competition for the young cowhands. Steer riding, calf roping, barrel races, hair pulling, team tying, pole bending and boot scrambles are a few of the events open to the junior and senior contestants. Also on hand will be a clown to liven up the proceedings a bit.
"Advanced tickets sales have been the best we've ever had at this point," Day said, "and it looks like we're going to have plenty of contestants."
He pointed out that the concession stand would be open during the rodeo and that proceeds from it—as well as the rodeo itself—are used by the local 4-H Club in their program of work which is carried on throughout the year.
Driver Training On At High School
Driver Education scheduled for the summer months in the Rankin Schools, began Monday, June 4 at 9:30 a.m. in the high school building. To date 22 students have registered for the course. The first week will be devoted entirely to classroom instruction and thereafter scheduling individuals for behind the wheel training to meet the requirements of the course.
Beginning this school year, driver education will be taught in the summer months only. Arrangements have been made to offer bus transportation for those coming in from the outlying camp areas for the one week of classroom instruction, and the behind the wheel instruction will be scheduled to meet with pupils in the Rankin city area at the school for their portion of that training and to meet with the pupils from the camp area in Midkiff for their behind the wheel portion of the driver training course.
Mr. Mike Hughes is scheduled to instruct the class this current year.

MEDICARE—

In recent weeks President Kennedy has laid the law down to Congress to pass his "Medicare" program of providing aid to over 65-year-olds and financing thru social security taxes. This means that the wage earner will be the big gun in paying for the entire program.

And what does this program really offer? Little has been said about this other than that it is for "old folks". Which old folks? Everyone—regardless of their ability to pay themselves. What actually does it provide? It provides \$10 per day for hospital room but the patient must pay the first nine days or \$90.00—if he can find a room for that. Doctors fee—nothing. Drugs—nothing.

For all this wonderful care—which a really needy old person could hardly afford—mine and your social security taxes are to go up and up to the point that

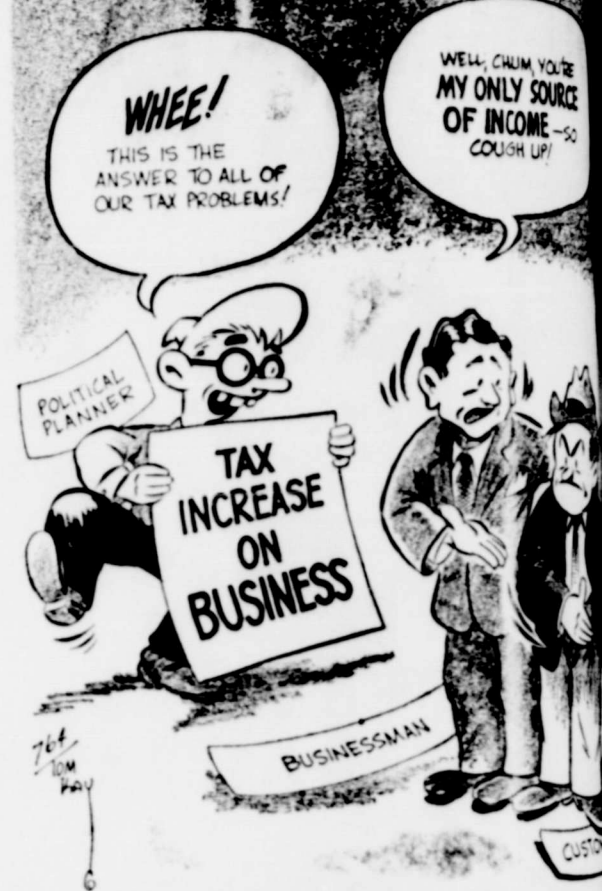
by 1972—if a person made an income of \$9,000, was self employed, married and had two children, would be paying \$1,350 per year in social security taxes—plus his income tax of \$1,174. In other words, social security would be more than income taxes by 1972 under Mr. Kennedy's plan.

Why the big cost for no more than is being offered? Washington bureauism and the usual bite when money passes through the federal government's hands is the answer. Right now in Texas, we provide medical care for those in need—not just everyone—of \$10 per day for hospital up to 15 days with extension possible by doctor's authorization. \$3.00 per day is provided for a doctor; emergency care provided at your choice of hospital and doctor; and allowances for drugs—all of which we are able to pay for with our present tax load.

With a situation like this one wonders why Mr. Kennedy is so determined to pass on to the taxpayers an additional load that will actually provide less for the individual. One wonders that is, until he stops and considers the pronouncements of the Kennedy administration. Not long ago, one of the top men in the administration wrote a book in which he said that the American people have too much money to spend—that this money ought to be taken from them and distributed by the federal government. To date, Mr. Kennedy has said nothing to indicate that he disapproves of this idea. It is a strange thing about modern history but each and every dictator of the past recent years has set down in writing his aims and ambitions—which the people he subjected chose to ignore until it was too late.

OVERWEIGHT—

Since we need to know what is normal and good before trying a variation of it, we have been discussing the four food divisions and how much of what the normal healthy person needs.

Now let's take a look at overweight and then we'll talk about what to do about it. We'll skip the problems of overweight, the main one of which is a shorter life expectancy. Instead, let us look at some of the booby traps.

Here are some of the booby traps to look out for. It's natural to gain weight as one grows older; overweight runs in the family; glands function improperly; exercising will cause weight loss; baths of various kinds are a quick way to reduce; potatoes are fattening; food used more ef-

fectively; and it's easy to take off extra pounds. Ever used one of them? By and large they are false although a few may have a grain of truth for a few people.

What about some of the ready made diets? They recommend the same food and same calories for everyone; the get-thin-quick diets are often too low in calories; (We began with an 18-day diet, then 10-day, then 7, and now a 2-day one!); weight rapidly regained; poor nutrition.

Well, all the ready made diets on sale accomplish one good purpose anyway—they make a lot of money for their producers! There is only one basic principle to follow to reduce weight. Eat slightly less food than the body needs to carry out all its activities. In that way it will have to call on the store of fat to provide the rest of the energy needed and weight loss will occur. It isn't always easy and it isn't a two or a seven-day affair—but it will get the job done and keep it done. We'll give you the diet pattern next week.

Screwworm Battle Rages Over Texas

"Though we are just getting started, I believe we are now on the road toward eradication of the screwworm in the Southwest." This statement by R. L. Murphree, DeWitt county, expresses the feeling of officials of the Animal Disease Eradication Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Animal Health Commission and Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation.

"I have only one screwworm case up to mid-year," Murphree continued. "Normally I would have had 15 or 20 cases. Though part of this may be due to the weather freeze, I have found several blows or egg masses which have not hatched. They have just dried up and indicate the release of sterile flies in the area is helping now."

Gillespie County Ranchman C. Hardin, Willow Springs, described how he found a baby calf with its navel covered with screwworm eggs. It was not doctored but the eggs did not hatch. This section has been a hot spot for screwworms in the county, according to County Agent C. A. Stone.

USDA officials explain the apparent leveling off of screwworm cases in many counties during the past week is just a preview of results that will be obtained once the new 75-million-per-week sterile fly production plant at Mission goes into operation. Production has been increased to almost 30 million flies per week at the temporary facilities at Kerrville, but this has not been sufficient to do the job.

Progress of construction at the Mission plant is another reason for the favorable outlook, the officials explained. Work is ahead of schedule, and the plant should be completed by mid-June. Fly production will be underway by July 1.

Eventual eradication of this costly livestock pest will come from a combination of the release of sterile flies and work by livestock owners. Stockmen should adhere closely to good screwworm man-

agement practices to protect their herds and help reduce screwworm population in order that maximum results can be obtained from the sterile fly releases.

"We hope that no one had the idea that there would be no screwworms in Texas this first year," commented Claude McCan, Victoria county ranchman and a member of the board of trustees of the SWAHRP. "Although we have had fewer cases than in the past in many areas, it is a question of each individual stockman staying with the fight."

McCan added that they had just dehorned and castrated the third round and have had only two screwworm cases. Normally, at

this time of the year, they expect 100 to 150 cases. "Since Victoria county is the real screwworm country," he said, "you could normally expect almost 100 percent infestation when working or dropping calves at this time of the year."

Every case of screwworms put out of commission now prevents thousands of cases three to five weeks later. In turn, this helps make more effective use of the limited supply of available flies and will speed up eradication, explained the officials.

Officials stressed that stockmen should now follow a regular preventive spray program using Co-Ral or Korlan, following closely the instructions on the labels. These sprays give protection for two to three weeks.

Cattlemen in Texas are due praise for the support already given but officials of the cooperating agencies stressed that no one should let up in his responsibilities to the program now.

These responsibilities include the

regular spray program, close and frequent observation of all animals, pre-treatment of all wounds before they become infested with screwworms, early and intensive treatment of screwworm infested animals and frequent retreatment. Also the collection of 10 worms

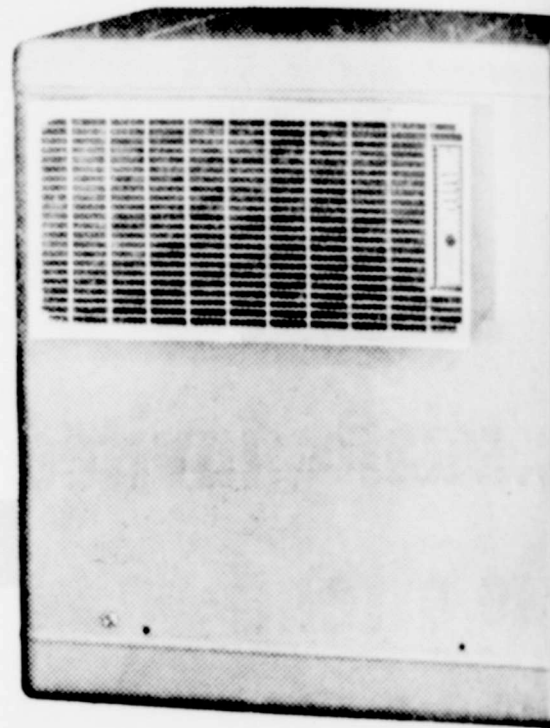

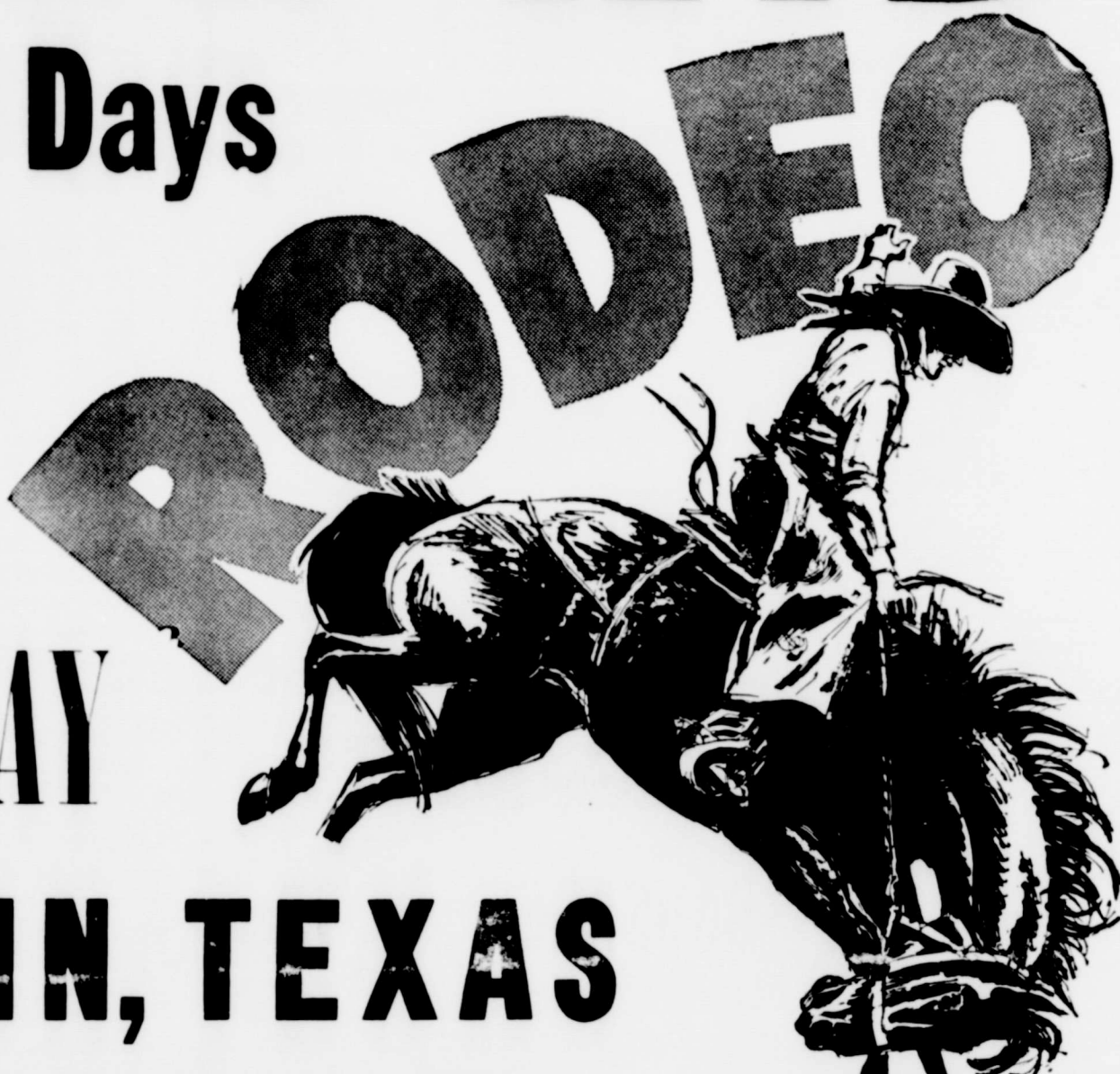
