## Summer Water Rates May Extend to Oct.

Although it is said that there is no prospect of a water shortage in Rankin, the next 30 days—if no rain falls—is expected to be one of the heaviest in water usage for the summer.

Summer irrigation rates for residential users are to be continued for a few days, according to City officials. If it begins raining on a less regular basis, the rates might be discontinued earlier as the situation now does not appear likely to be discontinued.

Reduced rates for residential users—no business connections—were started in part of the summer and demand on the water has been in evidence since the first time since the installation of the new water system about 1953, the old city of Rankin has been limited to use.

## Oil Continues As Factor In Rankin Area Economy

Surveys completed a few months ago by the Credit Bureau of Rankin for the benefit of the Rankin Merchants' Development Association and other interested individuals show that Rankin area now has an oil products payroll of some \$1,823,400.00 per year. The survey was taken on companies such as Halliburton, Western, Union Texas Petroleum, Phillips, Permian Pipe Line, the old Plymouth Oil Co., and El Paso Natural. It indicated that, among the

seven largest companies operating in the area, a monthly payroll of \$149,000.00 go to 310 employees.

Largest employer is El Paso Natural with 75 employees and a \$40,000-per-month payroll, followed by the Halliburton Company with a payroll of \$34,200 to 57 employees. Phillips Petroleum has 70 employees but their payroll comes to only \$31,500 per month. On a yearly basis, El Paso has \$480,000, Halliburton \$410,400, and Phillips \$378,000.00.

Aside from the oil company income, Rankin's next largest employer would likely be the Rankin Independent School District, followed by Upton County and then the some 55-66 individual firms and business houses. No estimate on this payroll figure has yet been compiled but is estimated to be fully as large as that of the oil industry.

## Is Production

### Up or Down ?

In oil exploration and production, there is still considerable activity in and near Rankin. Actual production and valuation vary according to different statistics but the Petroleum Review, published in Houston by Phifer Petroleum Publications gives some interesting figures on the Rankin area and Upton County.

In the Blue Danube field, the original discovery well, completed on August 24, 1961, produced 23,707 barrels of oil between that time and January 1, 1962 from the Strawn formation. At the same time, it supplied 4,911 barrels in the Ellenburger from October 24, 1961 to the first of the year.

In the Bloxom (Fusselman) area, near Rankin, the original discovery well was completed on October 11, 1961 and produced by the first of January, 50,131 million cubic feet of gas and 8,614 barrels of oil.

Production in the Pegasus Field (Sprayberry), of prime importance to Rankin Schools, showed 71 wells in operation in 1961 as compared to 61 in 1960 with a total production of 563,299 barrels. In the Ellenburger formation of this field, 114 wells produced some 3,375,644 in 1961 as compared to 2,431,540 from 100 wells in 1960.

And still the activity goes on. As of Wednesday morning, the offset from the Blue Danube well was at approximately 9,000 feet with testing to begin at about the 9300-ft mark. Other locations are said to have been staked in this immediate area but no definite drilling plans have been announced, causing those close to the situation to believe that the outcome of the present offset will determine to a large extent how much further activity in the oil development near Rankin can be expected to expand.

Credit is also extended on these rates but those who pay cash get a much bigger smile with the deal.

## Hearing on 1963 County Budget Will be Aug. 16

Notice has been given in this issue of The News that Upton County will hold a public hearing on the 1963 budget on Thursday, August 16. Time will be at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom of the Courthouse.

Any taxpayer of Upton County is welcome to attend and participate in this hearing.

In 1961, the last completed fiscal year for Upton County, budgeted expenditures amounted to

\$1,153,577.86. The current year's expenditures will run somewhat under this figure due to a lower tax rate resulting from the retirement of certain road bonds owed by the county and a loss of valuation.

Although not yet completed, the proposed 1963 budget which is to be considered at the August 16 hearing, is expected to be still a little less than even the current one.

## Bargain Rates On For Subscriptions

The annual August Bargain Rates on subscriptions to The Rankin News were announced this week by the editor. This event has, in the past, seen almost 95 percent of the subscribers to the local newspaper pay their annual dues.

Subscription rates will remain the same as in the past with the regular Upton County subscription of \$2.75 going for \$2.25 and the out-of-county \$3.00 subscription being offered for \$2.50. Regular newsstand prices are 10-cents per copy.

For those who want to live dangerously and take a chance on a long shot, a special flat \$2 rate is offered for payment of two or more years at a time on Upton County Subs. This rate is \$2.25 for out-of-county. The special offer also applies for the payment of two or more subscriptions such as subscribing for a student away from home at college or sending the paper to Aunt Bess.

## Scout Camping Cancelled for Year

Rankin Girl Scout Day will not be held this year, it has been announced, due to the unavailability of adult leaders.

## THE AMENDMENTS—

That worthy group of elected officials that make up the Texas Legislature—or that made up the last one that was in session—has, among other things, proposed to amend the Texas constitution some fourteen times. These amendments will all be printed on the November General Election ballot—provided there's a press in the county big enough—and you and I will pass judgment on their merit.

In all, these fourteen amendments contain some 12,852 words in their short form. I guess. Beginning with this week, they are to be published for four weeks in August in each county in Texas.

Now the cost of this publication in Upton County is going to run something like \$1,300.00 and is probably about as cheap a rate as any county in the state. Figured on this basis, the State of Texas will be out around \$330,000.00 in publication fees—if they publish as stated above.

Although this is a record number of proposed amendments as far as I can remember, it goes on every two years and at this rate, is going to cost Texas taxpayers a fair sum of money over the years ahead. Now whether it's a wise thing to try and rewrite the constitution of Texas or just keep on patching it every two years is open to debate but I can think of almost a half-million dollar reason for doing something about paying out that kind of money every time some local area wants a special amendment—such as a number of these will be.

## PROPAGANDA PERHAPS—

The U.S. Armed Forces have for some years, put on a pretty strong program of trying to indoctrinate their personnel about the dangers of communism, and to build up a strong sense of loyalty to the United States—all in order to withstand the "brain-wash" sort of thing dished out to prisoners by the Chinese dur-

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

the Constitution of Texas, and the "Bill of Rights" shall not in any manner, affected, amended, paired, suspended, amended or repealed hereby."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions"; and  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact laws not inconsistent with this section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

are now being released  
in a 60,000 square mile area  
plus a 7,000 square mile  
area in Southern New Mexico.  
Below a line that runs  
from Rio northeast to Cole-

man, east to Comanche and to  
Port O'Connor on the southeast.

"Producer funds are being used  
for eradication of this pest that  
has cost Texas producers \$100  
a year and not for a temporary  
control program," Elrod pointed  
out. "In order to free Texas of  
screwworm, cold weather must do  
the job outside of the overwinter-  
ing area of Texas and a concen-  
trated release of sterile flies must  
do the job within the overwinter-  
ing area, completed with artificial  
barrier made up of sterile  
fly release astride the U.S.-Mexi-  
can Border, and control of animal  
movement."

"Once screwworms have been e-  
radicated from the overwintering  
area and the winter kills them  
back below this line, there will  
be no spread into Upton county,"  
he added. "Eradication will come  
cheaper and quicker through this  
plan of operation."

"Our livestock producers are  
already dollars ahead because of  
their contributions made it possi-  
ble to get the program under-

way last spring and to complete  
the production plant at Mission  
ahead of schedule," Norman com-  
mented.

However, cold weather will dic-  
tate the size of the release area,  
but officials of the program, which  
includes the Texas Animal Health  
Commission and the USDA's Animal  
Disease Eradication Division,  
believe that eradication can be  
achieved best by concentrating  
the release of flies within the  
overwintering area. Then it may  
be possible to extend the release  
area.

In the months ahead, it is even  
more important that producers in  
Upton county follow the general  
screwworm management practices.  
This includes a regular spray pro-  
gram, close and frequent obser-  
vation of all animals, pre-treat-  
ment of all wounds before they  
become infested with screwworms,  
early and intensive treatment of  
screwworm infested animals and  
frequent retreatment. Producers  
also should continue to collect 10  
worms from each wound for po-

sitive identification. These should  
be delivered to the county agent,  
vocational agriculture teacher or  
livestock inspector, or mailed di-  
rect to Box 969, Mission.

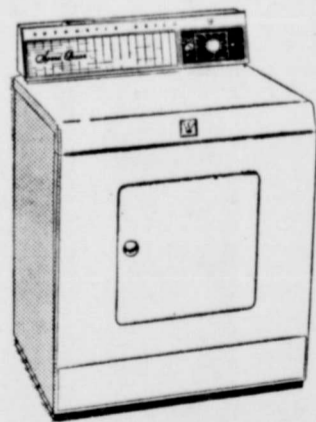

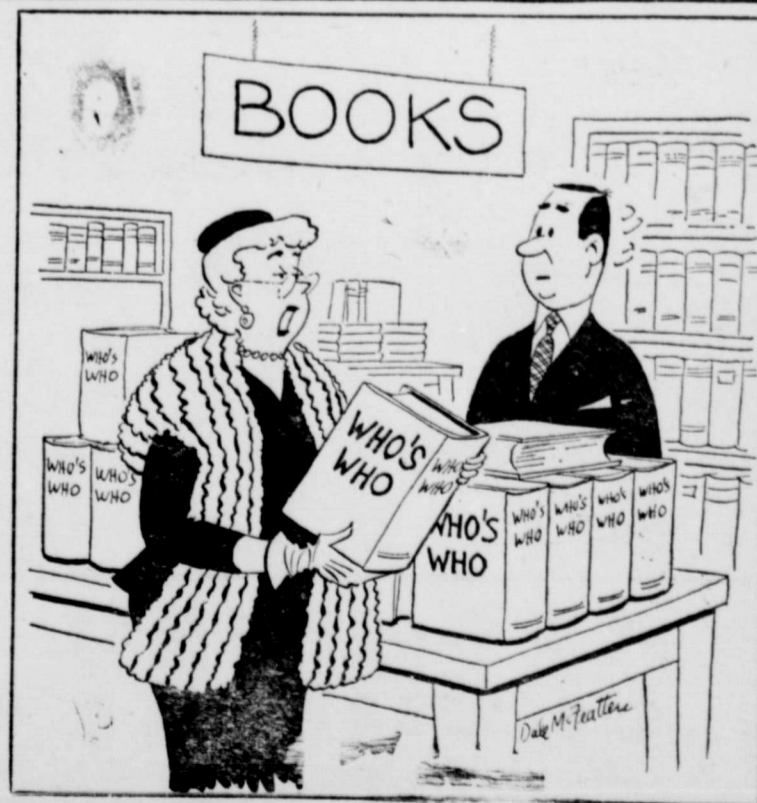
