## New Phone Books Mailed to Rankin

Rankin's new telephone directory was mailed to customers on August 15. Harold Johnson, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, announced.

According to Johnson, this year's directory includes 8 "white" or alphabetical pages, with almost 450 listings. There are 16 classified or "yellow" pages in the new book.

Approximately 1,200 directories were printed this year. Johnson explained that not all of these copies will be mailed out at this time, but they will be used before the 1963 directory is published.

Johnson pointed out that many telephone directories used in pay telephone booths and other public places "wear out" from constant use and that these must be replaced periodically. He also said the telephone company receives requests from people living out of town for copies of the telephone book.

He cautioned telephone users to check their old directories thoroughly before consigning them to the wastebasket. "People often keep important papers, out of town telephone number lists, and even pictures, in a telephone book," he said. "Then when the new directory is received they throw the old one away before making sure that any keepsakes or important papers are removed. Then later they realize their mistakes but it is too late."

## First "Little Monaco" Termed As Big Success

Sunday's Go-Kart run—the first "Little Monaco"—was a number of surprises to a number of folk.

The turnout of karters and spectators was more than had been expected and one local business reported the biggest day he had since coming to Rankin. A lot of people who had never seen a race or who had never seen the running on the track out by the Rodeo were only mildly interested and amazed and thrilled at the excitement and suspense that was generated by the drivers on the highest track in the nation.

The participants themselves were very pleased with the race provided by the course and most termed it the most challenging they had ever seen.

It might be said that the race has great possibilities and everyone was surprised and

somewhat pleased with the results—everyone, that is, except the Poor Boys' Kart Club of Rankin, sponsoring hosts of the race. They only added a little to their name—they lost money.

Entries were on hand from such places as Roswell, New Mexico, Amarillo, Lubbock, Stephenville, Corpus Christi and other far-flung cities and most all expressed a desire to return should the race be held again next year—and it is already being planned. A couple of accidents marred the event with one driver being put in the hospital with some broken ribs and another suffering a cracked arm bone. A number of kart engines, chains, sprockets, etc. were also victims of the hilly, twisting Little Monaco but most all of the karters seemed to feel the challenge offered was worth the risk.

Some 38 karts started the race in a very impressive sight and about 25 finished—the remainder having fallen victim of the many

sharp turns and steep climbs.

Overall winner was Jim Pat Claunch of Bula driving a B Super while his brother, Bennie, of Sudan, finished first in the C-Open.

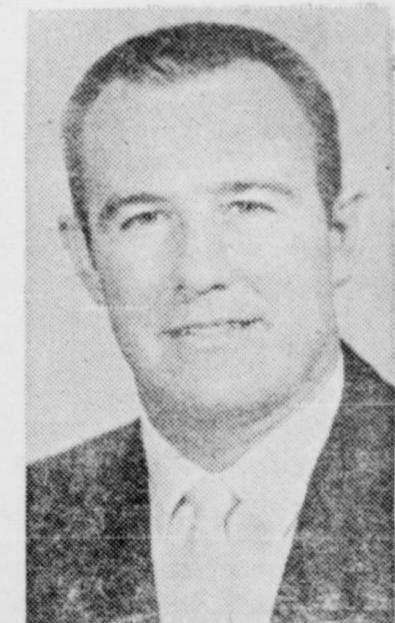

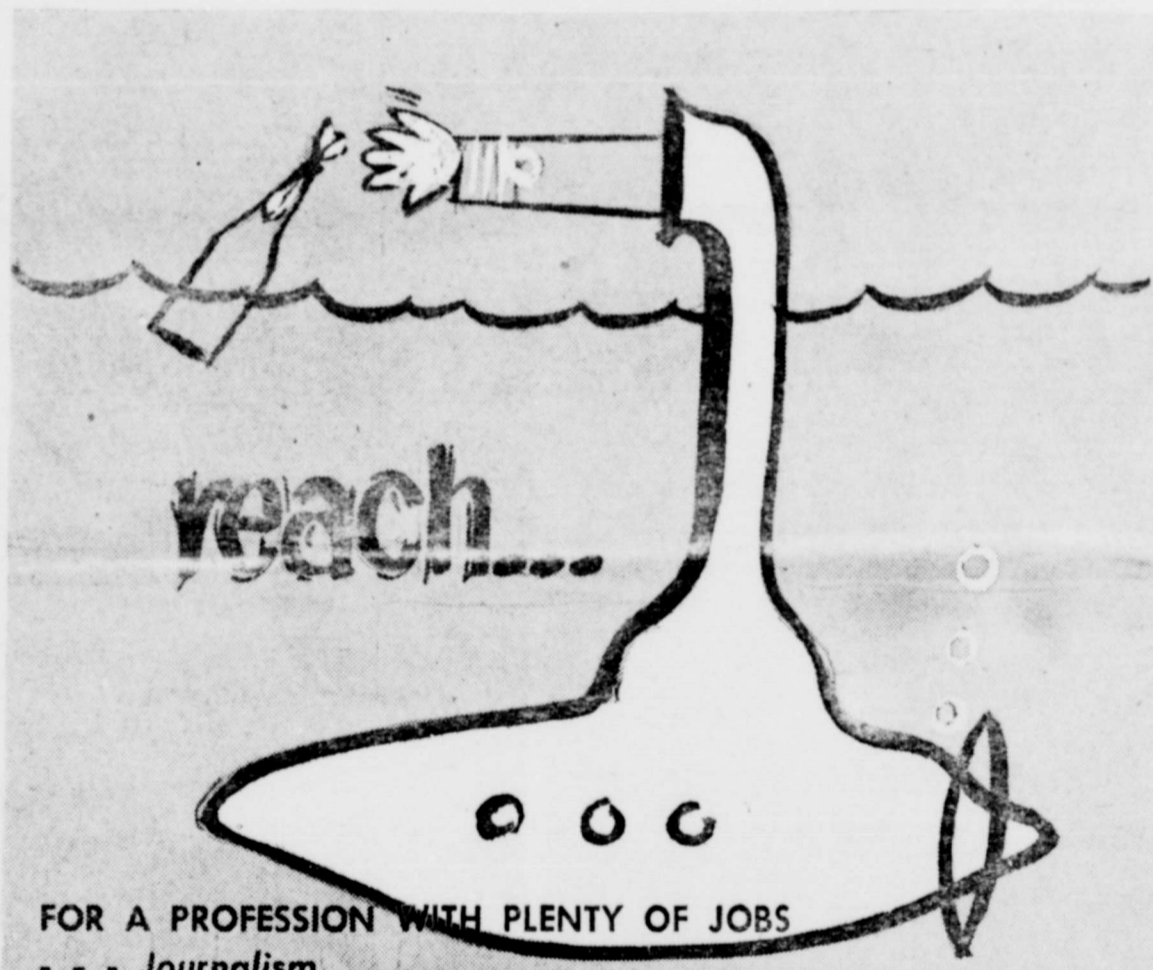

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions"; and  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

the Constitution of Texas, and the "Bill of Rights" shall not in any manner, affected, amended, paired, suspended, repealed or pending hereby."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed on the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. ### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact laws not inconsistent with this section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to enforce and administer the powers contained herein."

"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed on the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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### Sheep Producers To Vote on Fund Use

The USDA has announced a referendum among wool and lamb producers during the period of September 10 to 21 to determine their approval or disapproval of a new agreement with the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc.

This agreement would continue the financing of the Council's advertising, promotional, and related market development activities on lamb and wool through deductions from wool payments for four more years, as authorized in last summer's extension of the National Wool Act.

All producers who have woned sheep or lambs, six months of age or older, for any one period of at least 30 days since January 1, 1962, will be eligible to vote. Each producer will report the number of sheep and lambs on his ballot. Ballots will be distributed to producers by mail prior to the voting period. Ballots may be voted during the period September 10 through 21. The two-week period of voting is aimed at encouraging participation in the referendum by as large a number of sheep producers as possible. Preliminary referendum results will be announced late in September.

The American Sheep Producers Council has separate promotion programs for wool and for lamb.

### What Has the American Sheep Producers Council Done For Me?

The question of "what has the American Sheep Producers Council done for me?" has been asked by many sheep men in Upton County. One of the main purposes of the council is to promote sheep and wool.

A study by the Economic Research Service of the USDA says that advertising has increased the

Wool promotion is on a national basis. Lamb promotional activities are presently conducted on a regional basis in areas of high consumer acceptance and nationally on a co-operative basis with food manufacturers. The activities for both include advertising to create consumer interest; promotion work to urge cooperation by packers, processors, manufacturers, and retailers; and an educational program for retailers and consumers (including schools and colleges) through use of booklets, educational films, and other aids.

The Council's budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1963, totals \$3,231,500. At the maximum rates of 1-cent per pound of shorn wool and 5-cents per hundredweight of unshorn lambs marketed, receipts from deductions from the shorn wool and unshorn lamb payments would average around \$3 million a year. This voting will cover 1962 to 1965.

buying of lamb. The council attempted to boost sales of lamb in two different ways: cooperative advertising as it is placed by local retailers, and promotion campaigns to boost the use of lamb in general. Retailer ads were of "Lamb is a bargain this week—Buy it here" type, while the council ads said in effect: "Lamb is delicious. Why not try it tonight?"

Happily, the results were gratifying. Lamb sales increased as much as 27 percent as a result of cooperative advertising, and 10 percent for the council's promotion. At the same time, sales of other red meats were not noticeably affected. A control period of no promotion by the council was a basis for comparison.

So, the next time you have to give up some of your wool money to the American Sheep Producers' Council, before you complain, just think that because of the work the council is doing—they might have sold one of your lambs today over the counter. And one more sold means that someone, somewhere is eating lamb.
