City Council Calls Election For Sewer Treatment Plant, Sept. 22

Saturday, September 22, has been set as the date of an election called by the Baird city council for the purpose of deciding on a \$123,000 revenue bond, needed for water and sewer improvements, recommended by an engineering firm employed by the city for the purpose of studying the needs.

Business and civic leaders are rallying behind the issue. Monday night, the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce voted to endorse the issue, and to offer the services of the body in any way needed. Other civic groups were expected to follow the leadership of the Chamber of Commerce.

The bulk of the money from the sale of the bonds will be used in the construction of a new and modern sewer treatment plant to replace the overloaded and outmoded present system. It was pointed out that

the present system, which was built in 1927, was designed to serve some 200 to 300 customers. It is now caring for approximately 550.

Councilmen said that they had been studying the matter since insufficient facilities had brought about numerous lawsuits in which the City of Abilene was the defendant. In all cases, jurors found in favor of plaintiffs.

Mayor J. L. Ault pointed out that the improvements were made necessary by the growth and the expected continued growth of the community. The Chamber of Commerce directors note that expected growth could come only if facilities were adequate to care for additional people and businesses.

Additional information on the proposal will be carried in the Star each week until election time.

Highway Contract Awarded This Week

A contract for 6.5 miles of construction on SH 206 in Eastland and Callahan Counties has been awarded to a San Antonio firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Cage Bros. submitted the low bid of \$283,439 on the project. Grading, structures, base and two course surface treatment from FM 569 to Cross Plains is expected to take 170 working days, according to J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer at Abilene.

R. W. Domann, Resident Engineer at Abilene will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Bookmobile Has Record Distribution

Texas State Library's Tri-County Bookmobile demonstration, serving Callahan, Shackelford and Taylor counties, reports that during the month of July 4,907 books and recordings were borrowed from the Bookmobile.

Mrs. S. L. McElroy, Bookmobile librarian, also stated that 29 new patrons registered to borrow books. "I would like to clarify a misunderstanding some patrons have regarding the registration. It is necessary to register only one time and that single registration is valid as long as the Bookmobile serves the area. We ask patrons to present their library card each time they borrow a book because it is necessary to use the card in the automatic charging machine."

The Tri-County Bookmobile demonstration is considered one of the outstanding examples of library service in the State. Recently the Commissioners Court approved the purchase of a Bookmobile and all counties have appropriated money in the next budget for its operation and maintenance. Texas State Library will continue to furnish most of the books.

Mrs. McElroy urged residents to make use of the Rural Library Service Bookmobile. "Residents will find books of all kinds, informational as well as recreational; books for adults, young people and for children."

Polio Immunization Plans Complete For Baird, Cross Plains & Putnam

Plans for the polio immunization program for Baird, Cross Plains and Putnam scheduled for September 16, were nearing completion, it was reported Thursday by E. Elton Ables of Baird, Byron Richardson of Cross Plains and Mrs. Grady Pruet of Putnam, who are in charge of preparation in the three communities.

Plans call for use of the Sabin oral type vaccine to be administered to all residents of the areas around the three towns in the afternoon of the 16th. The Baird school cafeterium will be used for administering to Baird residents. Dr. M. D. Couch will be in charge of the administration in Baird.

The Putnam school will be the central point there. The Putnam Community Club is spearheading the Putnam program.

The Baird Chamber of Commerce originated the idea and Cross Plains and Putnam accepted the invitation to join in the project. It was the hope of the committee that everyone in the county would take advantage of the opportunity for immunization against the dread disease. There will be no charge for the vaccine or its administration, but a free will gift will be accepted. It was expected that the vaccine would cost approximately 25 cents per dose. It will be given orally in a small glass of water. It is pleasant tasting, it was reported.

Mrs. Lynn Ault, Callahan County School Nurse, is aiding in planning and carrying out of the project.

Additional information will be given weekly until time for the actual immunization, it was reported.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Very few cars and trucks in Texas are taxed through the ad valorem tax program.

Some counties, cities and schools tax them, but close to 80 per cent of the vehicles go untaxed. So the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy proposes that something be done about it.

An Amendment to the constitution is their recommendation. They suggest an amendment exempting motor vehicles from the property tax, but allowing the Legislature to tax them.

Plan is to have the Legislature set up a procedure by which a state board would determine the value of all makes and models of motor vehicles. Then the county tax assessor-collector would collect a tax at the rate of \$1.50 per \$100 of market value when license tags are purchased.

Under this "suggestion," 40 per cent of the \$52,000,000 annual take would be divided among the school districts of the counties. Balance would go to the cities in accordance with their populations. The County's share would be that portion represented by population outside cities.

Counties and Cities would be required to spend the money only on road and street work.

Before the commission decides to recommend this procedure to the Legislature, a public hearing will be held sometime this fall.

SOCIALIZED INDUSTRY — A study committee on the Cost of Government is exploring the possibility of using convict la-

bor to produce more of the products used by the prison system.

State spends about \$3,000,000 a year for merchandise such as soap, paint, tobacco, tires, mattresses and furniture for the prisons.

In the past, organized labor and business groups have been able to keep the state from using convict labor in competition with paid labor. But the farmers have not been so successful. Prison farms produce much cotton and other products.

SAFETY DRIVES — Two more safety drives were launched by Gov. Price Daniel.

He proclaimed September as Home Safety Month, asking Texans to "live, think and drive safely throughout September."

Also outlined was a campaign to prevent some of the 30 traffic deaths the Department of Public Safety predicts will occur over the Labor Day week end.

Highway Department got into the act, too, due to the U. S. Army's planned maneuvers for October. Highway workers will erect signs calling motorists attention to tank and convoy crossing-areas along state highways.

CARLA'S FORCE — The Water Commission engineers have calculated the kinetic energy released by Hurricane Carla. They figure the energy exerted over a 24-hour period is equal to 8,000 20-megaton nuclear devices.

In other words, it amounted to a 20-megaton atomic bomb exploded every 10 seconds for 24 hours.

State engineers agreed that

man can do nothing about the wind involved in such great force. But they felt that man can protect the land from tidal waters.

Galveston County engineers proposed that the island city's seawall be raised six feet.

MORE TAXES? — Legislators and citizens who thought the state's money problem was solved by the sales tax, which took effect a year ago September 1, may have another think coming.

Budget requests of state agencies predict another huge increase in public school and college costs in the two-year period starting September 1, 1963. Laws already on the books will divert about \$55,000,000 a year more from the State Treasury to the public schools, without any new legislative action.

College and university administrators, expecting a new flood of high school graduates, say they need \$40,000,000 a year more to take care of them. This includes \$10,000,000 a year for the University of Houston, which will be the state's second largest university when it joins the state system in 1963.

So budget-makers are thinking in terms of another tax law of some kind. Only a fast upturn in business conditions, bringing new cash into the treasury from existing taxes, can relieve the situation.

Legislators, campaigning this Fall, will have a chance to offer voters their suggestions. Some think the exemption on groceries, medicine and low-cost clothing should be taken out of the new sales tax law.

POLIO CASES — Doctors and health workers are pushing polio immunization drives.

The 1962 polio epidemic in Texas, now at 176 cases, is small compared to pre-vaccine epidemics, but one case is too many. Six cases of paralytic polio reported last week were all in West Texas with one each in Ector, Ochiltree, Potter, Randall, Tarrant and Taylor Counties.

Back to school booster shots were urged by the State Health Department. It said parents should check their children's vaccination records to see that they are protected against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, polio and smallpox.

HOUSE "PILOT" DIES — Read Granberry, the man who piloted legislation through the House of Representatives for 19 Legislatures, is dead.

Granberry became parliamentarian of the House in 1915 at the age of 15. He started as a page, served for two sessions, then was named parliamentarian.

He was also an electrical engineer and professor of engineering at the University of Texas.

Granberry left the University in 1953. Three years later he became director of the Texas Legislative Council.

Throughout every session during the past 38 years, he sat beside the speaker of the house, advising him on parliamentary procedures.

REDISTRICTING — There have been rumors of lawsuits to come, ever since the U. S. Supreme Court held that the courts can force states to redistrict, for legislative purposes, if their systems are patently discriminatory.

But it took Giles Miller of

Dallas to bring the first suit. The Republican sued State Treasurer Jesse James, to prevent him from paying the salaries of state officials who make up an ex-officio legislative redistricting board. That is the body which is supposed to meet and redistrict, if the legislature fails to do so.

Miller's suit departs from procedures used in 31 other states in that it is aimed at getting state, rather than federal, court action.

He contends that the redistricting law passed by the last Legislature was not fair and that it therefore is unconstitutional.

Dallas County is limited to nine representatives and one senator under a state constitutional provision designed to limit representation of the big counties. It would be entitled to three senators and about 15 representatives if the state was divided evenly.

NEW TARGET DATE — Construction on the 3,027 mile Interstate Highway System in Texas is progressing so rapidly that the completion target date has been moved up a full year to 1971.

Texas Highway Department points out that the state now has completed and opened to traffic 1,090 miles, or 36 percent of the total.

FUDGING FOR BEER — Minors who fudge on their age are the biggest headache to Texas Liquor Control Board agents and the beer industry in Texas.

They "qualify" themselves as beer purchasers by changing birth dates on drivers licenses and raising their ages to 21 on other identification. But the tight liquor control act is unrelenting, say the Liquor Board agents. It punishes both the seller and the buyer when they are detected.

Liquor Board agents reportedly nab most underage beer buyers by watching for unusually large gatherings of youngsters at taverns and drive-ins where the beverage is sold.

POWER POLITICS — Although the Texas Legislature is not scheduled to meet until next January, capital talk is that Sen. Galloway Calhoun of Tyler is in line to be chairman of the powerful State Affairs Committee in the next Senate.

Predictions are contingent on Democratic nominee Preston Smith winning the lieutenant governorship over his Republican opponent O. W. Bill Hayes.

BATTLE CLOUDS — Legislative battle clouds already are looming on the horizon, anticipating an early combat baptismal for the many new members of both houses.

Hearings before various state agencies and legislative committees are forerunners of pitched battles over the proposed consolidation, under a separate agency, of overlapping services now being rendered by numerous departments.

For example, the Texas Highway Department carries on the tourism effort. State Parks attracts tourists by providing recreational facilities for them. And the Game and Fish Commission lures visitors to fields and streams. The Highway Department supervises pleasure-boating activities of a million people, while the Game and Fish Commission regulates and taxes shell used as road building material.

At least six agencies lease state oil and gas rights, yet the Railroad Commission deals with oil production.

Suggested as possible solutions: expand and consolidate the Game and Fish Commission and the State Parks Board; or make it all a division of the Highway Department.

Political repercussions may surpass all previous legislative battle combined.

Economies and efficiencies, in

the opinion of some legislative committee members, would justify the effort.

FLU SHOTS URGED — Health department has issued a warning to pregnant women and persons over 45 that it's Asian flu time.

Department is urging adults over 45 (particularly senior citizens over 65), pregnant women and persons of any age with heart trouble, lung, kidney or metabolic diseases to make immediate arrangement for flu shots.

Widespread outbreaks of Asian influenza are predicted for the coming winter.

-A-strain flu occurs every two or three years.

Two doses of influenza vaccine, two months apart, are urged for people not previously immunized. Both should be administered prior to December, starting point of the cyclical onset.

TEACHERS TO LEARN — This Fall, 2,300 public school teachers, of physics, mathematics and foreign languages, will attend classes Saturday mornings, or after their own teaching hours, to learn the latest developments in their subjects.

This is part of a program instituted by the Texas Education Agency to help beef up the state's instruction in these subjects.

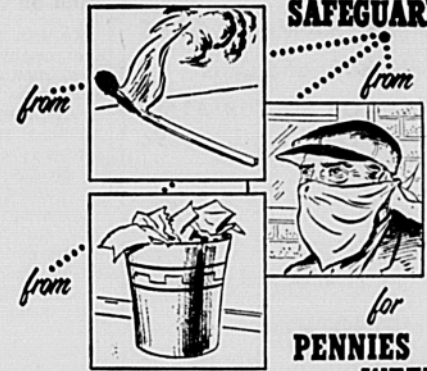

It's the Law in TEXAS



IDEA FOR A LAW

A bill before Congress is an idea for a law.

Who thinks it up? A congressman, the home folks, the President, almost anybody.

How does it become a law? 1. The congressman calls on the Congressional Legislative Service to cast the idea into legal language.

2. He drops his bill into a legislative hopper. The clerk numbers and passes it to the Speaker of the House of Representatives. He refers it to a committee. There it may "die" unless the sponsor asks for action.

3. If he does, the committee may consider the bill or assign it to a subcommittee to consider the bill. Usually, either the committee or the subcommittee will hold hearings, study the merits of the bill, and prepare a report on it to be submitted to the House.

4. At long last the committee votes on it. If most members support it, it goes 'out of committee' to the House.

5. It gets on the calendar and the House Rules Committee says how, when and for how long the House may review the bill.

6. The Speaker sets a time for debate with equal time to both sides.

7. Afterwards the House votes. If passed, the bill becomes an "act" and goes to the Senate.

8. The Senate President refers the act once again to a committee which may "table" it, or report it out with or without changes.

9. The Majority Policy Committee sets the time for debate on the bill, and a member asks to have the act considered. If this motion is carried, it calls for debate, perhaps amendments, and a vote.

10. Often, if the Senate (or the House) amends the bill, it goes back to the House (or Senate) for another vote. Failing that, the bill goes to a "conference committee" of both Houses (as a rule, seven members from each) to iron out differences. Result: often a compromise. Should the conference committee disagree, the bill dies.

11. If it agrees, the Act goes back to both houses for a final vote.

12. If approved, the Act goes to the President. He may (1) sign it and make it a law; (2) veto it (two-thirds of both houses may over-ride his veto); or (3) neither sign nor veto it.

13. If he does not sign it, the Act becomes law in 10 days if Congress is still meeting. If Congress has gone home, the Act dies by "pocket veto."

14. Bills starting in the Senate must go to the House of Representatives and thence to the President.

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About Your Health . .

Cancer is often spoken of as the "silent" disease. This is because in many cases cancer grows without giving any symptom. And pain, which is most often thought of as accompanying diseases, is not generally present until cancer is far advanced.

Most cancers can be cured when detected and treated in the early stages. The difficulty in cancer control, then, lies with the detection of the disease.

Only a physician can tell if cancer is present. Any suspicious symptom should always be examined by the family physician. But often, by the time any symptoms of cancer show up, it is too late. Treatment of advanced cancer is difficult.

The only insurance against this silent growth is a regular, at least yearly, physical examination.

All physician's offices should be cancer detection centers. The family doctor is most often the front line against cancer. For a physical check-up, whether cancer is suspected or not, the personal physician is the person to see.

If cancer is suspected, the family doctor may refer his patient to one or more specialists to confirm or rule out the possibility of cancer.

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary, shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty-Fourth Legislature, supra. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set

for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.

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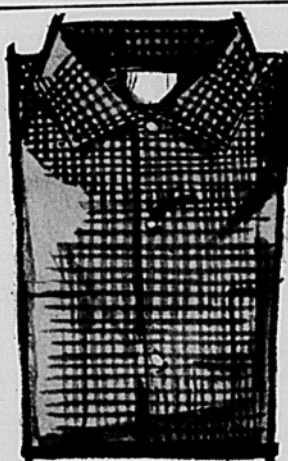

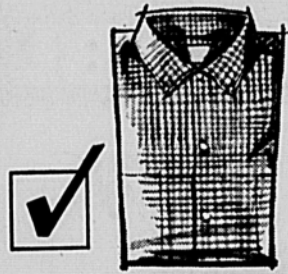
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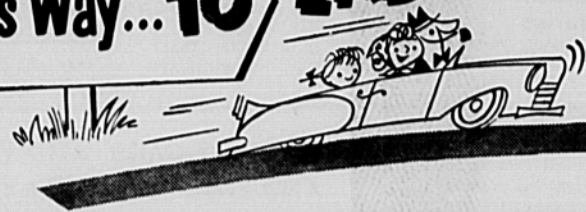
