## Second Polio Clinic Planned For Rankin Area Sunday

The second Sabin Oral Polio  
vaccine immunization in the Ran-  
kin area will be held from 11:30  
to 5:30 Sunday, January 6, at the  
Rankin Park Building.

Type II vaccine offers immuni-  
zation for Type II polio, the  
second most dreaded and severe  
form of the crippling disease. Like  
Type I vaccine, the Type II is  
a tasteless and odorless liquid  
given orally. The vaccine is giv-  
en on sugar cubes for all except  
small babies, who take it direct

from a medicine dropper.

Everyone who took the Type I  
vaccine and filled out the appli-  
cation forms can take the Type  
II vaccine without filling out a-  
nother form. The ones used in  
the first series of vaccine doses  
are good for all the dosages, so  
said Dr. J. D. Gossett, physician  
in charge of the immunization  
campaign. Dr. Gossett requests  
that those who took Type I bring  
their personal record cards with  
them so that the cards may be

dated. Everyone is urged to take  
the Type II vaccine whether or  
not they took Type I vaccine.

Persons who did not get the  
Type I vaccine can get it from  
their doctor. It makes no differ-  
ence in what order the types of  
vaccine are taken, but a period  
of about a month to six weeks  
should separate the times the  
vaccines are taken.

It is hoped that everyone who  
took Type I vaccine, and every-  
one else who can will take the  
Type II vaccine Sunday.

For persons who did take the  
Type I vaccine, Sunday's dosage  
will be a fast moving affair. Only  
a minute or so will be required  
to take the vaccine.

Persons who did not take the  
first vaccine will have to fill out  
the brief consent forms, which  
will take only a couple of minutes.

There is no charge for the vac-  
cine, but the medical society sug-

gests contributions of about 25  
cents per vaccine. If making a  
small contribution to offset the  
cost of the vaccine would work  
a hardship, the medical society  
wants to give it free of charge.

About 1300 persons took Type  
I vaccine. Since there have been  
no ill effects from the first vac-  
cine, public acceptance of the  
vaccine should be much higher  
than at first.

The Rankin Lions Club and  
the two chapters of Beta Sigma  
Phi Sorority will again aid the  
doctor and the hospital person-  
nel in administering the vaccine.

# THE SCOOP by Scoop

THIS IS 1963?—

Whatever it was that most of us were expecting to happen in 1963 must still be ahead of us for so far things don't look much if any different from 1962.

About the most marked difference a lot of people find in 1963 over the last day of 1962 was the fact that it tasted a heck of a lot different early on the morning of January 1.

One thing I did notice about the past holiday season and that was that many more of the Christmas cards sent out carried the religious theme—as compared with past years. I don't know whether this indicates that we have become any more religious over the past twelve months or whether we just all had the devil scared out of us during the Cuban crisis.

But it was a good holiday season. Most of us lived through it. Big dinners, extra cake and candy, a little Christmas cheer and New Year's tonic, a whole gob of football games—all of these things seem to settle one a little. At least the spot in the easy chair looks bigger.

1962 was not a really bad year for Rankin. We had a few moments of excitement, dug a few more oil wells that are now producing a little less oil than they did a year ago. We lost a few of our residents and we gained a few new ones—going down hill a bit in the exchange. Politics was long and hard and we had some good times in that department. The word "Republican" is still not used much outside the family bedroom but like an underground—they seem to have gained a pretty fair following in Upton County during 1962.

And 1962 was an unusual year in one respect. If my memory is correct, we did not have a single bond election—city, school or county-wide. And right here is a good time to mention that January is the month to buy your poll tax. It may well be the last one you will ever buy so if for no other reason, it will make you a good souvenir.

As usual, in 1962 we had our

experts predicting what the year would bring. Some said boom. Some said bust. And, as usual, none were entirely right—nor entirely wrong. We can expect—and are already getting more of this expert forecasting for 1963.

What about Rankin and the year ahead? It does not hold any great deal of promise but at the same time, it's very little different from other years we have faced. One thing's for sure—the best way to make sure that it won't amount to much in Rankin is for us to sit on our hands and moan. That's always good for business and for a community.

Since everybody else gets into the act of forecasting what is out ahead for us in the coming year, I may as well look foolish along with the rest. If you will think back to how my picking came out in football, you won't take this too seriously.

For Rankin, 1963 could be a better year than 1962. We should be near the end of the oil company reshuffling that has moved a lot of families around. Some more minor moves and changes should be expected but the big cutbacks, consolidations and shake outs ought to be just about over. Consequently our population ought to level off and perhaps even show a slight gain toward the end

of the year.

## New Postage Rates Effective January 7

If what this country needs is a good nickle rate for first class letters, it'll have that beginning January 7, a rate schedule table giving new postal rates shows.

The new rate table lists 43 increases in rates and believe it or not, two decreases. The decreases are under the third class mail non profit classification. Non profit circulars will go from 16 cents per pound to 9 cents and non-profit books, catalogues, etc., will go from 10 cents to 6 cents per lb.

The post office will not accept pieces of mail odd sizes, such as animal cards, triangle or circular shapes, after January 1. An minimum size of three inches by four and one-fourth inches will be in effect on January 1 also.

First class charges will be five cents a letter, as afore mentioned, four cents for cards and drop letters. Airmail letters will be 8 cents per ounce, and increase from 7 cents. Air cards will increase from 5 cents to 6 cents.

Second class rates will increase for newspapers under that classification, as is the Rankin News, to zones to the tune of 4 cents

Third class rate increases include a two-cent per pound on circulars or an increase of an eighth-cent per piece, in one of the categories affecting a lot of businesses.

Fourth class rates (educational and library materials) will be effected in one bracket. The first pound of educational materials

### Television Series Is Directed at Juniors In Saturday Showing

Something new in children's television programming will be seen on local screens when Channel 2, KMID-TV, Midland, begins the series called "Breakthru."

Six years in the planning and production, "Breakthru" will be seen in this area over KMID-TV, Channel 2, on Saturdays at 12:30 p.m., beginning January 5, according to Rev. A. S. Masterson, pastor of Rankin Methodist Church.

"Breakthru" is 14 half-hour programs. Part drama and part conversation, all is on film. The intended audience is boys and girls

in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades with an age range of nine through eleven.

Why were pre-teens selected as the age group around which to build a television series? Because surveys have shown it is in these years that boys and girls begin to be interested in reality as well as fantasy. Also, the amount of time spent in front of a television set is greatest then.

"Breakthru" is a new concept in Christian education for boys and girls, according to its producers. Each program tells a story common to the experience of most children. One is about getting along with difficult people, another is concerned with assuming responsibility for one's actions, and still another shows the fear one often feels in a new and strange situation.

The new children's television series is a joint endeavor of the Methodist Board of Education, the Methodist Television, Radio, and Film Commission, and the United Church of Canada. It is being presented on television stations by councils of churches and

similar cooperative church groups through the National Council of Churches.
