County Judge Reports On Expenditures and Deficit

ED.: The following report has been submitted by County Judge Allen Moore for publication and brings the public up to date on activities of the Commissioners' Court. As set forth in this report, the only fund considered up to this point has been the Hospital Fund—thus, the Judge's report covers only that portion of county operations. A recap of the deficit at the end of 1962 shows

the General Fund overdrawn in the amount of \$19,985.28; Hospital Fund, \$20,294.47; Road and Bridge Fund, \$24,147.08; Officers Salary Fund, \$11,854.71; and Park Maintenance Fund, \$9,011.14.

Such reports will be made from time to time to the public according to the judge.

COUNTY JUDGE'S REPORT

The Commissioners' Court met in session January 14, 1963, and after duly taking care of the County business at hand, went

into discussion concerning the deficit of \$85,292.68 as was presented by Hollis Huffaker, County Auditor, on his report.

The Commissioners discussed the various operations of the funds and decided to meet back on January 17 in order to give them more time to study the finances and operations of the funds involved.

On January 17, the Court met in session and County Judge Allen Moore made a summary report on the hospitals as follows:

The most notable cost as pointed out by the County Judge was the increase of cost in salary operations after the hospitals were separate operations. The operations of the year 1962 showed that although both hospitals took in \$110,036.36, the labor costs had increased to \$109,078.01 for only a balance of \$958.35 to apply to all the other hospital costs. As finance officer, the County Judge reported to the court concerning the cost of maintaining two separate divisions of our hospitals against the cost of a joint operation should be studied to see if such a small county as ours could afford the cost of such extra maintenance to maintain.

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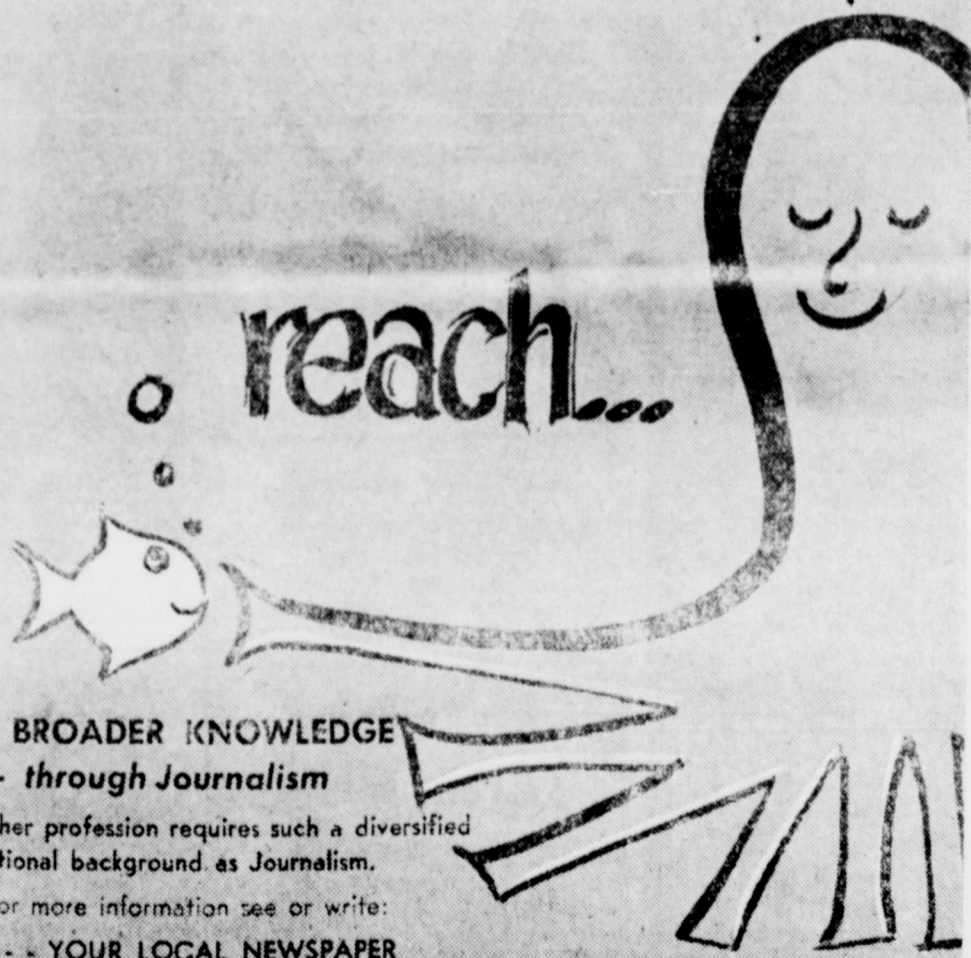
