After watching the school board in action for ten years now, I have come to the conclusion that Bruce McGill is probably one of the be t trustees I have ever seen on this or any other school board.

His judgment has proven to be better than most of ours, when he gives his word on matters pertaining to the school, he has always stood by it-as he does in other matters as well-and he is definitely a man who can not be swayed by pressures from individuals or groups-period. On the other hand, he has not demanded that everyone else see things from his side.

He has stood firm behind the policies of the school-particularly as to taxing policies, against all comers be they friends, fellow. ranchers or oil companies. In these times, this could be of the utmost importance if we want to continue with first class schools in Rankin as we now know them.

The fact that he does not now have children in school should be no mark against him-nor anyone else who wishes to run for the board. He has proven long ago that his interest in good education is more than a passing thing. He did not want to run again this year— having served something like 16 years—but I suppose from repeated requests by his close friends, he decided to offer his services once more.

This is in no way an effort on

my part to tell anyone how to vote or suggest that Mr. McGill is the best qualified man in the field. Others, I'm sure, can do an equally good job. I only say that he's one of the best I have ever seen and that if he's willing to serve again, then-in my judgment-it will be to the benefit of Rankin Schools if he's one of the three elected to the board.

THE LIBERTY AMENDMENT-

The Liberty Amendment is an item that most of us have heard little or nothing about but which may yet prove to be one of the most important pieces of legislation to appear in the United States since the Bill of Rights.

This proposed amendment to the constitution is as nearly nonpolitical as a matter of its nature can be. It strikes at no political party nor any political philoso. phy. It's only aim is to strengthen the constitution by putting the operation of the government on a completely constitutional basis. It has the support of individual Democrats and Republicans from all parts of the nation.

This amendment already has the approval of the Texas Legislature and the Legislatures of 5 other states and is presently being considered by 22 other state Legislatures If approved by some 34 state Legislatures. Congress would be forced to call a Constitional Convention on the matter.

In brief, this amendment, as it now is pending in Congress as H. J. Res. 23 is:

"Sec. 1. The Government of the United States shall not engage in any business, professional, commercial, financial or industrial enterprise except as specified in the Constitution.

"Sec. 2. The constitution or laws of any State, or the laws of the United States shall not be subject to the terms of any foreign or domestic agreement which would abrogate this amendment.

"Sec. 3. The activities of the United States Government which violate the intent and purposes of this amendment shall, within a period of three years from the date of the ratification of this amendment, be liquidated and the properties and facilities affected shall be sold.

"Sec. 4. Three years after the ratification of this amendment the sixteenth article of amendments to the Constitution of the United Sates shall stand repealed and thereafter Congress shall not levy taxes on personal incomes, estates, and/or gifts."

Over 700 federal agencies today compete with private enterprise without constitutional authoriey for doing so. They are not selfsupporting. They operate rentfree, interest-free, and tax-free basis (they pay no corporate taxes, local, state or federal). Yet, despite all these advantages, these programs still LOSE MORE MON-EY EVERY YEAR THAN IS COLLECTED BY THE PERSON-AL INCOME TAX.

This amendment would not curtail defense spending, social welfare programs nor any other governmental operation provided for in the constitution-and yet, through the elimination of federal competition with private enterprise, would put more money into the federal treasurery-without the income tax-through taxes collected from the now tax.free federally owned operations.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair share—others, less.

People in 26 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected...all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510—so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure to each landowner his FAIR SHARE.


