## Hughes Wins Council; Livestock to Remain

Less than 200 voters turned out in the Rankin City Election last Tuesday to give a big majority of their votes to Mike Hughes for city councilman and to put their stamp of approval on the continued keeping of livestock within the city limits.

Hughes won his first full term as councilman over R. L. Bell by a 138-43 mark. The livestock referendum was approved by a lesser majority of 103 for keeping of livestock within the city limits, to 66 against. Although the livestock vote was only a sampleing of public opinion on the question, it is anticipated that the city council will go along with the





## Decrease in Sheep Noted Over Nation

BY W. M. (DUB) DAY County Agent, Upton County

The decrease in the sheep inventory continued in 1962 and the smallest sheep and lamb inventory since 1950 is anticipated for 1963. The outlook for 1963 is not for further large scale liquidation or for any large increase in flock replacement, or for expansion.

The 1962 lamb crop, estimated at 20 million head, was 4 percent below the 1961 lamb crop with most of the decrease in late lambs. Commercial slaughter also was down 4 percent during the first half of 1962, let held at a higher level during to last half. With slaughter remaining high and a lamb crop decline in 1962, a further decrease in inventory and a reduced rate of slaughter in 1963 is indicated.



# LETTERS To The Editor

J. B. Hutchens, Jr. Rankin News Rankin, Texas Dear Scoop:

By now you have probably seen or heard about the Congressional

Redistricting Bill which yanks your county out of the 16th Congressional District and places you in a district which goes from the Rio Grande almost to the Travis County line, and from the Culberson County line to the Bexar County line.

In my opinion, this is an ill-conceived bill. I believe our West Texas counties have more in common with the 16th District than with Pearsall, Castorville, and Lampassas. Historically, geographically and economically, our counties should remain in the 16th District.

I called Congressman Clark Fisher in Washington and told him that I have nothing personal against him but that I intend to oppose transferring our counties into his district. I have also told State Representative Terry Townsend of Brady, who helped draw up this redistricting, I intend to oppose the measure.

When the bill reaches the floor for debate, I plan to offer an amendment to put our counties back into the 16th District, and if the amendment fails, then I plan to try to kill the entire bill. I think the bill is unfair and unjust. It is drawn so that the district is over five hundred miles wide and four hundred and fifty miles long. I have read in some


