have backed off and tried to take a look at Rankin through the eyes of a stranger—one seeing the town for the first time? Try it sometime.

During the recent city election, R. L. Bell said that he would be for working toward a clean-up of the city. That's a worthy objective with anyone.

Not so long ago, the beautifying of Rankin was one of the prime objectives of most of the civic organizations and a good many individuals and also drew considerable attention at city council meetings. Now one seldom hears any comment one way or the other. We seem to be content to "let it stand".

What do you suppose the first impression is on a stranger to Rankin? Does he see all the fine public buildings, the schools, the public facilities, the friendliness of the people—or does he see the many drab spots instead—spots that we who live with them daily become accustomed to and often fail to see in our day-to-day living.

Rankin is something of a paradox. On one hand, we have some of the nicest public buildings to be found anywhere for a town of this size. I often get salesmen in the office from out-of-town who, calling in Rankin for the first time, comment on what an impressive courthouse we have and how it would be a compliment to towns much larger. The number of paved streets in Rankin always impress outsiders.

The amount and condidtion of

the neglected buildings and property—not only on Main Street, but all over town, erases all the favorable impressions and the new comer leaves with the feeling that he has passed through the first stages of a ghost town. We who have lived here for any length of time, know, however, that this is not true and that a good mainy improvements have been made over the past ten or so years. The stranger does not know this.


And we seem to have reached the point of not being too interested one way or another—which just might well be one of the symptoms that indicates ghost-town sickness is approaching. A haefty boost on this by our civic clubs, the city and individuals might be in order.

I just never was sure what it meant.

Now all this doesn't put anything in the pot for me but it might prove that you are getting a little something now and then first hand. Better pay attention. You might be called on to recite sometime.

Easter is not a once-a-year event; it is an experience of the Son of God in the life of a person for a lifetime. Yet, so many treat the service of worship on Easter Sunday as a "show". It is not surprising, then, that many again this Easter will be disappointed when the "performance" of the choir is not good, the "performance" of the organist and the soloist is not superb or the "performance" of the preacher is not up to the usual. Once again folk will leave the church and the worship service as critical, if not more so, than when they came in.







This consisted of the general appearance, quality, and flavor of the food she prepared at the meeting; her exhibit-service for one set on a card table with appropriate color scheme, decoration, and the poise, posture, and grooming of the exhibitor herself; her recipe; the day's menus planned to contain all needed nutrients for the day; the menu for the meal including the favorite food; and the girl's knowledge of foods and nutrition.

The knowledge of foods and nutrition counts 40 points on the score card. We wonder how many homemakers could make a good score on knowing nutrients in the food and what purpose they serve, know the four groups of food and nutritional value

each, know why these foods make a difference, and could answer the other questions on the list.

Marsha's favorite food was a cheese spinach casserole and Cleta's was a meat corn casserole-both requiring some cooking skill in their preparation. Each girl has taken part in two food


