# Social Security Benefits On Increase in County

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Upton County now top \$23,105.00, H. P. Thomas, District Manager of social security in Odessa, said today on releasing his annual county benefit data report. For the 13 West Texas counties from Gaines to the Big Bend and from Midland to Reeves, payments increased 14.4 percent over the past year. The increase was general throughout the district.

"This increase can be attributed to the change in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of our aged population," Mr. Thomas said. "This money stimulates county business; most of it is spent for food, clothing and shelter."

"There is no longer any doubt. Social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in the district. The current payment is at a rate of approximately \$9.5 million per year.

Monthly benefits first became payable in January 1940, and they have continued without interruption for 23 years, accompanied by a steady growth in the number of beneficiaries. As of 12-31-62—some 365 citizens of Upton County were collecting about \$277,-260 annually from social security.

More people in the area, Thom-

as said, probably could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the law, and for that reason they are urged to visit or call the local social security office whenever they have a question concerning their benefits or responsibilities.

As of January 1963, in the nation at large, more than 18 million beneficiaries were receiving payments at the rate of \$14.4 billion per year.

The average monthly old-age retirement benefit in January was \$76.19 for all States while in the State of Texas the average was \$68.49.

Following is the number and amount of each type of monthly benefit paid in Upton County, as of December 31, 1962.

Retired workers, 162, with payments of \$12,626. Wife or husband, 49, \$1,999. Widow or Widower, 27, \$1,811. Mothers and children, 105, \$4,948. Disabled workers and dependents, 21, \$1,-637.




