## Changes Made In MDA Drawings

In a meeting last Tuesday night, members of the Rankin Merchants' Development Assn. voted to make one important change in the MDA Free Drawing for the coming end-of-the-month.

You need not be present to win.

The new regulation allows one to sign up as often as he is in a place of business offering a prize and should his name be drawn from that box, he will be notified of his winning.

At the same time, the MDA decided that, beginning with the June drawing, still other changes in the procedure would be made. In the new method, a number will appear in advertisements in The News—each paper printed for that particular week having a different number. A participating merchant will then decide on a number and post it in his establishment. Numbers appearing in the advertisements may then be compared with the posted number and the person having that number wins the prize.

## County Judge Files Reply To Russell Arnold Charge

Records on file in the County Clerk's office in Rankin indicate that action is beginning to brew in the case of Russell Arnold vs. Upton County. Arnold, a McCamey dirt contractor, has charged that Upton County has been guilty of violation of a restraining order handed down some time ago in the 83rd District Court

by Judge J. H. Starley, prohibiting the use of county equipment for the benefit of private individuals. In his charge, Arnold names all commissioners and the county judge as the representatives of Upton County and makes certain specific charges against two commissioners, Wheeler and Bufford.

In the case jacket this week appears an answer to the charge, filed by Paul McCollum, on behalf of County Judge Allen Moore. McCollum is a member of the law firm of Shafer, Gilliland, Davis, Burton and McCollum of Odessa.

In part, the answer to the charges by Arnold as related to Judge Moore says: "This Defendant was not a defendant in the original action filed by Plaintiff . . . and was not named in the Court's Writ of Injunction."

In another portion of the answer, the document reads: "He has

never disobeyed the Injunction of this Court as alleged by Plaintiff and further this Defendant disavows any intention to ever disobey such injunction."

The answer asks that Judge Moore be dismissed from the case on these grounds.

No action on the part of the four commissioners appeared in the case jacket as of Tuesday. They have until next Monday to make reply to the charges.

Representing the commissioners is John A. Menefee. Menefee, the county attorney, will not be acting in any official capacity as attorney for the commissioners as related to his being the county attorney but rather, will be representing them as a private attorney.

No definite date has been set for a hearing on the case nor has the judge who will preside at such hearing been determined.

## Clock Defeats Rankin One-Act Play at State

The Rankin High School one-act play cast gained a more complete understanding and sympathy for track contestants who run against the clock when the group lost the possibility of winning another state championship by being disqualified for running five and 3/4 seconds over the 40-minute time allotment for play presentation.

Rankin's "Medea" was presented Friday afternoon at the State Meet in Austin. According to the audience consisting of university and high school students, other directors, parents and interested spectators, "Medea" was a high point in the two days of play presentations. Those who had been closely connected with the play for the past two months felt that the student actors had reached a peak performance at the state meet.

However, the state director of the one-act play contest, Roy Brown of the University Interscholastic League staff, ruled that the excessive time made the play ineligible for consideration and that the cast members were also ineligible for individual honors.

Clyde high school's "Box and Cox" placed first in the A Conference and its cast received the main individual honors. Rankin's

cast and director, Pam Simpson, Sam Bean, Eudora Pettit, Craig Welsch, Eddie Love, Jim Ivy and Robert Ross returned home a sad but wiser group, feeling that they had at least scored a "moral victory" by having reached the state contest.

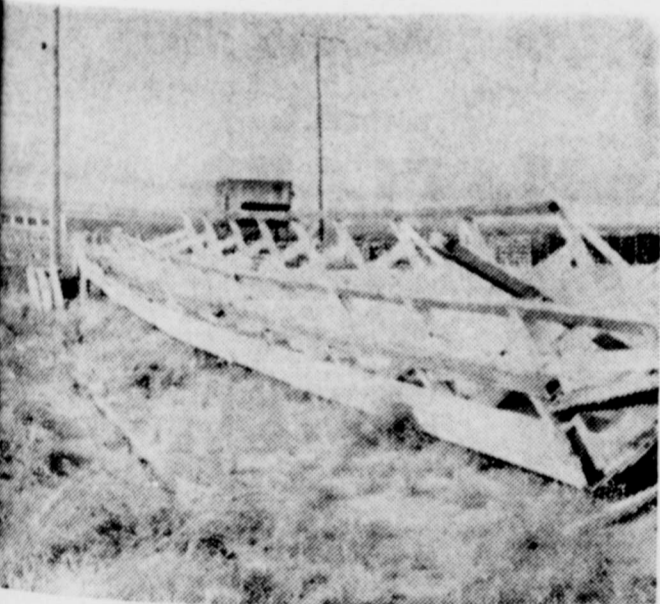
## Little League Play

## Odessa Firm Gets Hwy. 67 Contract

A contract for 17.16 miles of construction on US 67 in Upton County has been awarded to an Odessa firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads, Jones Brothers Dirt and Paving Construction Company's bid of \$309,307.00 on the project was low for grading, flexible base and too course surface treatment of road from Rankin east to Regan County line and from Rankin west for a distance of 9.2 miles. Working days is expected to take 150, according to Archie J. Sherrod, District Highway Engineer at Odessa.

Jack V. Valentine, Resident Engineer at McCamey will be in charge of the project while it is under construction.

No date was set for beginning of the work.

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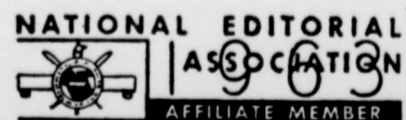

**Time to Spray Pecan Trees is on Hand**

There have been some people asking about spraying pecan trees and what to use and when.

The timing on spraying pecan trees is very important, but a good rule of thumb is to spray between the 1st and 15th of May.

This spraying will more often than not get the pecan nut case-borer, a little worm that bores into the little pecan. The real test is to look over the little nuts and check for eggs that will be deposited on the brown end of the little nuts.

can be three pounds of fifty percent wettable DDT or one pound of 25 per-cent wettable parathion, or three pounds twenty-five percent wettable malathion, or two pounds eighty percent wettable sevin.

In some experiments run last year by the experiment station at Brownwood, the 80 percent wettable sevin gave the best results, for the money spent.

This should be followed every three to four weeks until the 3rd spraying has been completed.

The type of sprayer should have at least 300 pounds pressure.

## Notaries Public Must Sign Up By June 10

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1963 and June 10, 1963.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1963 and May 20, 1963. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

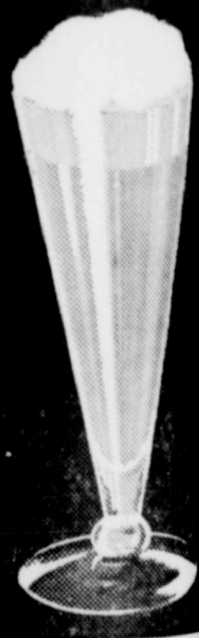
