or part of the expenditures with
\$4,290.90 having been paid out of
the total expense of \$7,080.32.

The sheet indicated that total
accounts receivable at the hospital
as of May 1 amounted to \$36,-
607.91.

formation to be found within six
miles of Rankin.

Drilling and testing of the well

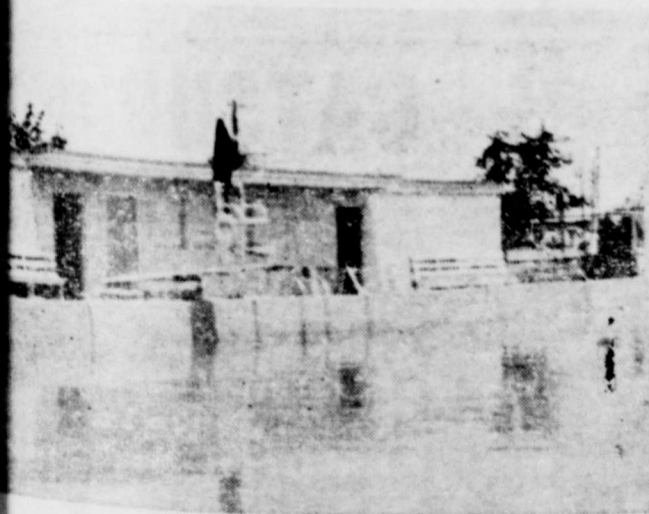

Paper Tells of Work Done by Bill Moore

ED.: Following is contents of a paper recently submitted to a contest for Public School Bus Driver of the Year by Rankin Schools. The local nominee, Mr. Bill Moore, has now advanced to regional winner, making him one of six in Texas.

For Public School Bus Driver of the Year we respectfully submit for your consideration our Upton County winner, William F. Moore of the Rankin Independent School District. Mr. Moore is 62 years old and has been employed by RISD as Bus Driver for thirteen years, having driven during that time approximately 400,000 miles without mishap or being ticketed for driving infractions. During all of this time he has also served ably as Custodian of Buses. Naturally patient and easy-going, he long has been a favorite of these teachers and other administrative personnel with whom he works, feeling a keen responsibility toward the end product of his labors—the safe, economical, and timely delivery of his charges to the school campus and their return home. Well liked by the students, he encounters no trouble in securing cooperation and good discipline on his bus. His dress is neat and clean and, along with his always proper conduct, he adds to the general good reputation of our school.

Mr. Moore has been a resident of the Rankin community 22 years and during that time has discharged honorably all the duties of good citizenship, including 8 years as Constable. He reared and educated five step-sons and one son, and they have the reputation locally of being perhaps the finest boys ever to have grown up in Rankin. Four of the boys received college educations.

His public relations with parents are very well handled in a diplomatic way and practically all problems are worked out to their mutual benefit. It is rare, indeed, when it becomes necessary for him to submit a problem concerning his passengers or their parents to his supervisor for mediation. He has never known to be late in reporting for work.

Bill has been valuable as a trainer of other drivers, advising them in the correct operation and care of their vehicle, safety measures, and proper supervision of passengers. As Custodian of all buses, he views seriously his responsibility for top notch maintenance and repair in order that all equipment will continue in efficient running condition at all times. He has attended all available Work Shops over the years, including those held locally and the District Bus Drivers School in Odessa.
