J. Hood Named Superintendent

Special meeting last week at the Rankin School to name the new superintendent of the Rankin High School. Bill J. Hood was named to the job, vacated by Kenneth Welsch. Some applications for the position had been received by the board.

Hood, who has served for the past year as superintendent of the Rankin schools, was promoted to the position of superintendent of the Rankin High School. He had previously served as principal of the school.

Hood began work on June 19. He is the first superintendent of the Rankin schools to be promoted from the position of principal.

Hood is said to have one of the best records of any superintendent in the state. He has served in the position for over ten years.

County Judge Reports on Tax and Budget Meetings

ED: The following report is made to the public by County Judge Allen Moore and pertains to recent business matters considered by the Commissioners Court.

On Monday, June 10, the Commissioner's Court and County Judge sitting in with the Board of Equalization, met with the taxpayers and tax representatives of Upton County concerning the valuation of property in Upton County for the year 1963. Commissioner E. K. Bufford was absent as he was in the hospital recovering from an operation.

PRELIMINARY MEETING

The Commissioners' Court had some thirty days previous to June 10th had a preliminary hearing with the tax representatives of the oil companies in Upton County concerning the probable valuation for 1963, as well as delving

into expenditures of the present budget and past expenditures of this county. During the preliminary meeting, many probing questions were asked by the tax representatives concerning the necessity of certain expenditures made on our parks and recreation programs, as well as serious questions relative to the cost of the operations of our two hospitals.

The tax representatives admitted they were becoming alarmed at not only our deficit of \$85,292.68 at the end of 1962, but that our expenditures for 1963 were estimated to be some \$30,000.00 or more than our 1963 budget called for. They pointed out to the Commissioners' Court that a great number of Park and Recreational expenditures were carried in other counties by their cities and local civic bodies. Yet, in Upton County, the county took care of almost all the cost of operations of these facilities. They pointed out the various number of caretakers in our Park operations and that they were hired on a yearly basis. The representatives felt that caretakers could be hired during the summer months and regular labor hands could take care of our small park grounds in a few days every month. They also pointed out that we have three of the few remaining free swimming pools in the state of Texas and it wasn't that they cared for us having them, but that in the financial state we were in, could we afford it along with the other expenditures. They were also of the opinion that the cities and local civic groups should participate more fully in the operations of our ball parks and Youth programs as they do in other areas.

The next issue concerned the mounting costs of the operations of our two hospitals. The Commissioners' Court pointed out that several changes had been made in paring down the operating costs of the hospitals by the hospital boards, but that it had been done just recently and it was too early to show the effects of the new measures.

The tax representative of Magnolia Oil Company pointed out to the Commissioners' Court that he noticed that many of the employees of Upton County had not had a pay raise in the last 8 to 12 years, some of them were drawing less money now than the day they were hired. He had also noticed that the number of people on the payrolls had grown

larger. He was in favor of paying better salaries, getting more work done and having fewer employees. He reminded the Court that he had suggested this measure to the Court some 2 years ago.

The tax representative of Gulf Oil Company, in his final argument to the Court, said that his company had stretched their valuation to the limit. He stressed that if the Commissioners' Court were of the opinion that the properties of Upton County should be re-valued and new appraisal valuations set to run the county business, Gulf Oil Company would ask that it be a qualified appraisal of all local properties and not just a token valuation. In this way, he felt the local tax payers being so affected would be more prudent in their demands on the Commissioners' Court. This preliminary meeting adjourned with no agreement as to the possible 1963 valuations or what disposition might be taken by the Commissioners' Court.

JUNE 10

The meeting of June 10th began much on the same note as it had been closed at the preliminary meeting. I explained to the tax payers and tax representatives that our 1964 County Budget was not ready for their inspection. I told them our court was going into detail on all our expenditures so that we could have a budget that we could work with in 1964 and it would take several weeks to complete the budget.

Our tax engineers had reported that our valuation in Upton County had dropped from \$48,382,000.00 to \$46,730,550.00, a loss of \$1,651,450.00 for the year 1963. I explained our financial difficulties again for the benefit of those tax payers who were not present at the preliminary meeting. Although we recognized that our oil runs were dropping, we were asking the Oil Companies for a 5 percent raise over the lowered (See Judge's Report—Page 3)

REPORTING—

This week the county judge is making another report to the public. It is well worth reading.

In it the judge points out what the problem is that faces Upton County as regarding continuation of the present policy of providing funds for the many and varied activities within the county—in the form of recreation in most instances—or related operations.

The judge says that the answer is simple. Either we cut out some of it or else we adjust property values to bring in more money. In other words, a tax raise.

Whether or not the answer is that simple, or whether or not a tax raise will be necessary seems to depend on who's doing the talking. There are those who do not agree with the judge on this point. Nevertheless, it would be most interesting if such were possible, to have the public vote on the question: should we cut out some of the expense or should we raise the taxes?

There is—of course—no way to tell how such a vote would turn out and I've never heard of any such public opinion sampling being taken but there's one point on which there need be no guess work and that's the amount of shouting and calling of names that will take place if a raise is put on in the tax department—and some of those who ask for the most now from the county will do the loudest yelling when and if the tax raise comes.

Another point made in the judge's report that has the backing of even the oil tax men

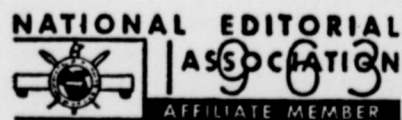

New Method Used In Fly Releasings

A new wrinkle has been added in the battle to eradicate screw-worms from the Southwest.

Screwworm flies reared and sexually sterilized in a plant near Mission are now fed prior to being released from airplanes over large portions of the five-state eradication area.

Entomologists have found that feeding gives the flies a better chance for survival after being released and results in larger numbers of vigorous flies avail-

able for the program.

A small paper cup containing a cotton ball and corn syrup is placed inside each carton at the same time the box is filled with sterilized pupae. After the flies have emerged, they can feed until they are released.

Experts list these advantages to fly-feeding: (1) More flies are alive at release time since cartons can be held an extra day giving pupae more time to emerge. (2) Flies live longer after release and are better able to find shelter and food in nature. (3) Fewer flies are lost during periods when unfavorable weather does not permit aerial release and flies may have to be held for several days. (4) Also during cold weather, it is possible to hold the flies until they are ready to mate, while otherwise many probably would not survive that long in nature.

Eradication officials are so well pleased with the results of fly-feeding tests they are exploring means to completely mechanize the operation. They feel the ini-

1963 valuations, which would give us approximately the same valuation of 1962. It would be a temporary and only for this year.

Again, the matter of many of our expenditures were discussed with the Court and the Commissioners agreeing that such measures as these representatives had presented were reasonable and not affecting those services that the County rendered and they would try to work toward a sound operating budget within the limits of our income for 1964. With that, one representative after another of all the Oil Companies present accepted the temporary 5 percent raise for one year. The meeting ended in harmony.

At the present time, your County Judge is against a re-valuation program for Upton County. I cannot bring myself to believe that a move in that direction at this time would not seriously affect the future economy of this County. Upton County has been on a declining ebb these past few years. If we re-valued our properties at their cost value,

less depreciation in order to get higher valuations, it would be only to get more money for our operations. It would be the same thing as raising the rent of all of the properties within the county. At this time, I do not think it would be feasible. I do not believe in raising the rent when income is down.

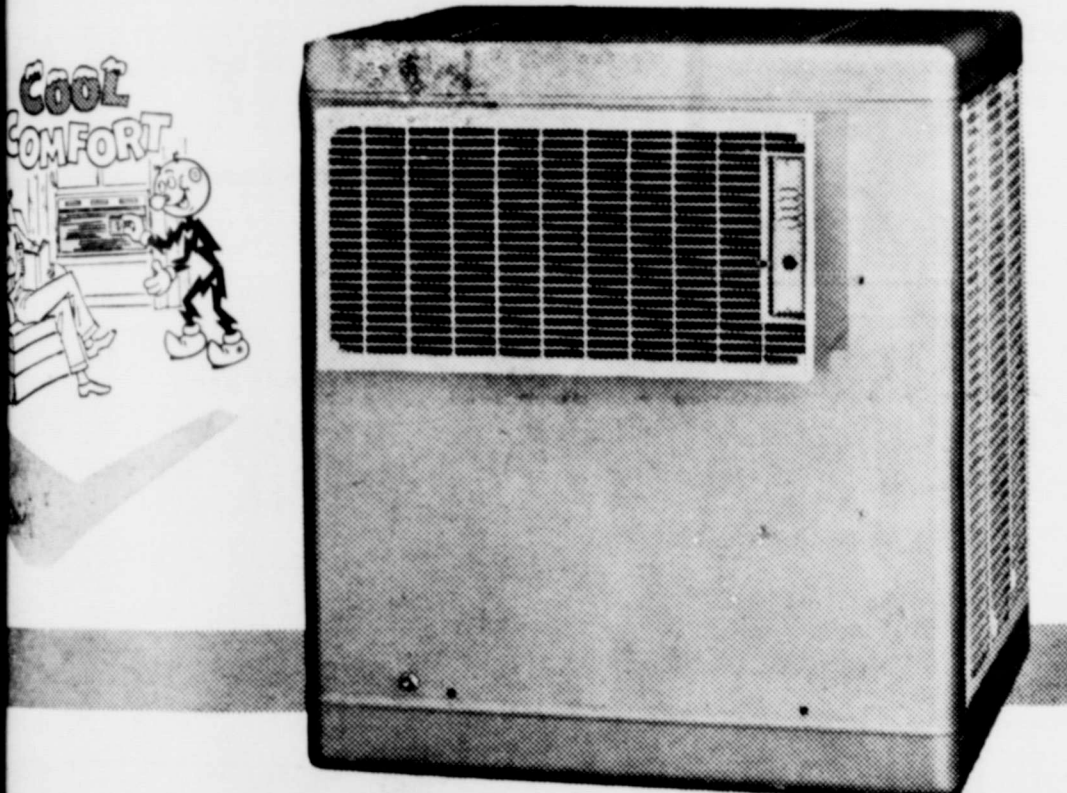
I do think that some of our properties are being valued too low in accordance with other properties rendered by local taxpayers and our board should make adjustments on these renditions.

These next few weeks will be trying ones on this Commissioners' Court. Up until now, they have tried to carry out all the financial requests that have been made on them by various groups, boards and delegations. The requests have been greater than the income. The pruning of these expenditures will call for many changes of operations in some areas. It will need your support.

Again I say, the answer is relatively simple. Either you give your cooperation in pruning unnecessary spending, or we must have a re-valuation program and raise more money. It is your problem to help decide.

I will attempt to keep the public informed as to these changes that will be made in our 1964 budget.

Young Bride's Husband Killed --

Former Rankinite Hurt In Traffic Accident

ED.: The News is indebted to Miss Pat Dishman of Fort Worth for the following report on the injuries of a former Rankin resident.

A June 8th auto collision just north of Cresson, Texas, in Parker County, took the life of Marvin Bert Smith 19, and put his wife, Lynda Jeanne, 18, in a Ft. Worth hospital with multiple injuries. Mrs. Smith is the former Lynda Ingram, who lived in Rankin from 1950 to 1956.

The couple were returning from a bar-b-que at Mrs. Smith's grandparents when the accident occurred. Highway patrolmen investigated the accident and stated that the Smith car, a 1960 Ford Falcon, was traveling north towards Ft. Worth at a moderate speed when a 1963 Ford Galaxie going south on U.S. Hwy. 377 collided head-on.

Investigating officers reported that the Galaxie, driven by 34-year-old Valvin L. Dixon, was 6' 7" in Smith's lane. Dixon was treated for minor injuries in a Grandbury hospital and released to authorities.

Dixon aroused suspicions at the scene when he handed two small bags to a witness and asked that they be mailed to his mother in Mississippi. One of the bags contained a silver-plated .45 caliber automatic, a face make-up kit,

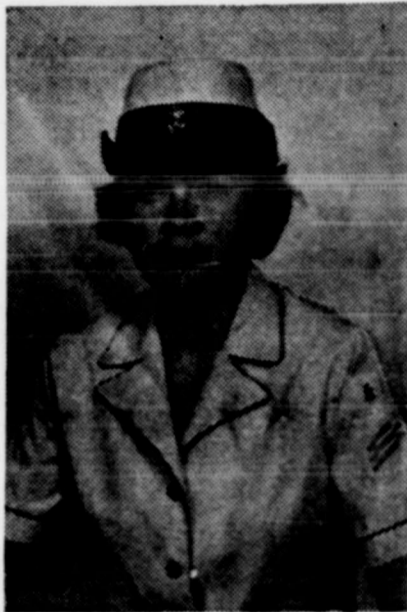
tight fitting black gloves, nylon rope, adhesive tape, and two pairs of cheap handcuffs.

Further investigation by officials in both Parker and Dallas counties turned up evidence connecting Dixon to a series of motel hold-ups in 10 Southwestern states from Nebraska to Ohio and from Florida to Texas. Dallas police reported that Dixon had confessed to 28 hold-ups, including one \$15,000 jewel robbery in Dallas on January 3. Dallas' homicide division chief, Capt. Will Fritz stated, "The stock red-haired man is unusually intelligent for a hi-jacker." In spite of the 28 thefts, Dixon had no previous police-record until the two-car smash-up.

Mrs. Smith, daughter of Mrs. Dorothy McDonald, formerly of Rankin also, suffered multiple injuries including a head injury, numerous cuts and abrasions and a broken wrist. She was in fair condition in Harris Hospital until June 14 at which time she was released to her mother's home at 511 Tienery Road, where she will be confined from three to six months.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith were married May 17, 1963, in the Meadowbrook Baptist Church of Ft. Worth. The late Mr. Smith was a 10-year employee of the Fort Worth Star Telegram and had recently been promoted to the
