MDA Offers Lucky Numbers; Anyone May Be a Winner

This week, in place of the free drawings that were offered by the Rankin Merchants' Development Association over the past several months, a different twist is being tried.

In this issue of The News there appears a group of ads that have a number spotted in them. This number can be valuable. It may be the winner of prizes offered by individual merchants or it may be the lucky number that can win one of three jackpot prizes ranging through \$20.00, \$10.00 and \$5.00. In all there will be twelve numbers in each paper. Any one may be a winning number—either of one of the nine individual prizes or one of the jackpot awards—or even possibly several.

Readers should check each of

the ads for numbers then take their numbers to the firms listed and compare them with a number that will be posted inside the store. If one of the numbers in the reader's paper is the same as that posted in the store, he's a winner. Or it may be one of the jackpot number winners.

All numbers are expected to be posted no later than noon on Thursday, June 26. It is pointed out that no information will be given over the telephone concerning these numbers. Anyone desiring to check the numbers must do so in person.

There is no definite time in which the numbers must be checked. That will be left to the convenience of the person holding a number; however, a new set of numbers will be posted each month that the program is used by the merchants—thus the person having a winning number must claim his prize before the new number is posted.

On the jackpot prizes, it has been agreed by the sponsoring merchants and individuals that in the event one of the jackpot awards is not claimed by the end

of 30 days, that number will be withdrawn and the jackpot prize will be doubled for the next time.

There's nothing to buy—nothing to sign—anyone may be a winner.

Should a party be a jackpot winner, he should contact Mr. H. Wheeler, secretary of the MDA, who will issue the winner certificates in the amount of \$5.00 each, covering the particular prize won. 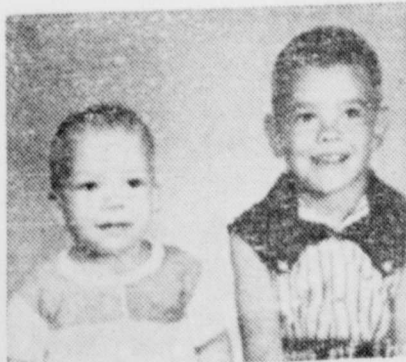
In all, twenty-six entries competed in the contest.

THE NUMBERS GAME—

In this issue of The News you notice a number of numbers.

It seems that everything is in the process of turning to numbers. You have social security and income tax numbers, phone numbers, car tag numbers and many others. Still, last week, more of the same when the Post Office Department announced a "Zip Code" number for every post office in the United States. That "zip" part gives the impression of something speedy—like Gonzales, but it will be may guess from observing former speed-up processes of the Postal Department, that we will plug along at just about the same old speed—taking as long as seven days to get a letter to and from Amarillo even on a run and turn situation.

So don't call. If the merchant is sport enough to offer you a free prize, have the goodness of heart to cooperate and go by the place of business to see if you are a winner. There's no hurry anyway. If you have the lucky number, it will be waiting for you when you get around to it. Nobody else can win it.

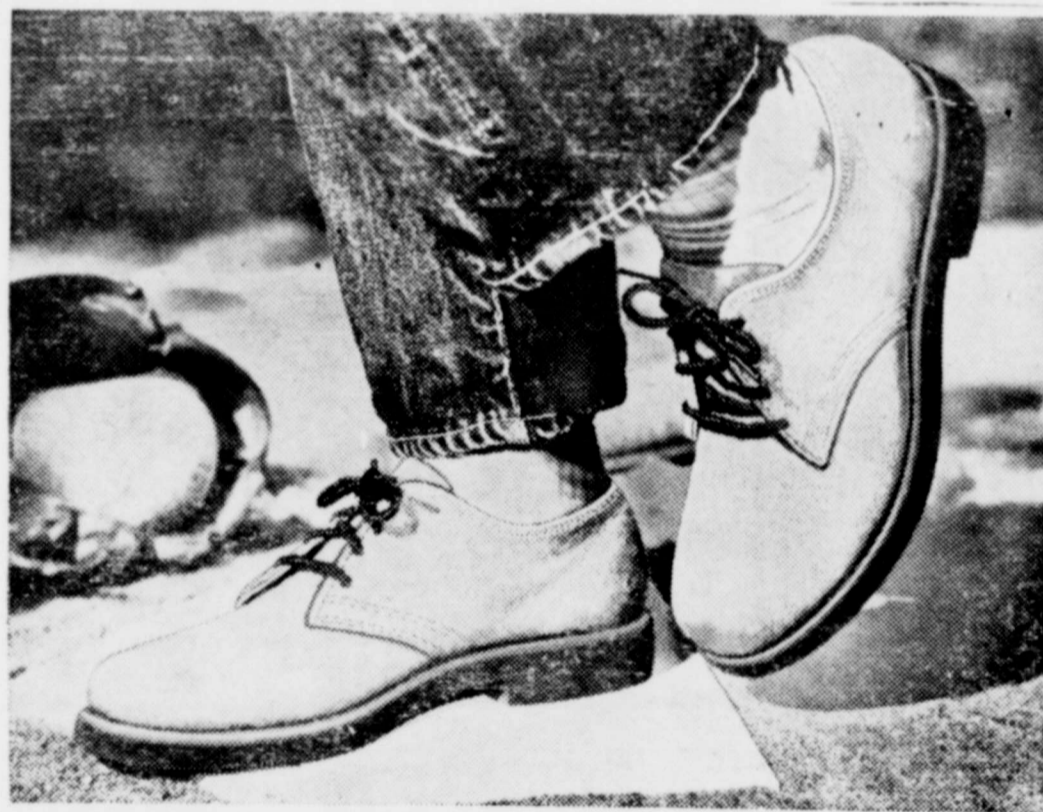
PARTY HONORS OF SUPERINTENDENT

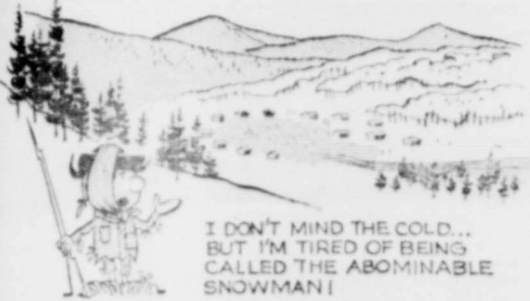

Tax Savings Open On Investments

INVESTMENT CREDIT—

Congress enacted some new and for reaching tax provisions last October. Reference here is made to the investment credit feature of the 1962 Internal Revenue Code.

Investment credit is simply a reduction of tax liability by 7% of the amount of a taxpayer's investment which qualifies. One

major objective of this provision of the law is to stimulate the economy by encouraging modernization of equipment and facilities.

The Internal Revenue Service has recently issued proposed regulations which clarify some of the questions that have been raised by farmers and ranchmen. The portion which deals with qualifying (or eligible) property is mentioned here insofar as these tentative regulations apply to assets often used by farm and ranch operators:

2. Fences qualify for credit since these are specified in the

law. It is believed that it includes corrals and living facilities.

b. Grain storage buildings qualify for credit, the stating that these are considered "as buildings."

c. Buildings and components thereof qualify for the investment credit. However, the regulations yet clarify the situation type of asset that may be attached or set into place. (Continued to Next Page)

be eligible for credit. d. Livestock do not qualify for credit since they were eliminated by specific reference in the law.

It is not clear whether equipment such as a grain drier or air circulating system would be eligible for the credit when attached to single-purpose grain bins but might not be eligible when it is used as part of a building (barn or quonset type) that might have multiple uses. In the very early interpretations it was indicated that central heating or air conditioning systems do not qualify for credit, these being considered "the building." The function of the drying equipment is more directly related to production which is a factor in qualifying property for credit.

A few examples of other assets that are usually considered qualifying investments are:

a. Gasoline pumps to service farm vehicles and power equipment.

b. Hoists, welders, metal-working tools and similar items of shop equipment.

c. Saddles, bridles and related items used with animals connected with the business.

Since investment credit is a

new concept in our tax structure it is important that study be given to it with the objective of helping eligible taxpayers to become aware of the significant tax savings involved. Remember, it applies to any investment for qualified business property acquired in 1962 or subsequent years. Also, it is mandatory that the taxpayer claim the credit in the year that "asset was first used." If a sizeable amount of investment credit was overlooked when the 1962 tax return was made an amended return should be filed, and the proper credit claimed. Otherwise it will be lost.

New Rules Proposed On Allowance Of Deduction For Contributions Other Than Money To Charitable Causes

The proposed rule would apply to cases where property or goods having value of over \$200 are shown as having been contributed.

In addition to having to show the name and address of the organization receiving the contribution the taxpayer must show whether any agreements "or strings" were held on the property given.
