# THE SCOOP by Scoop

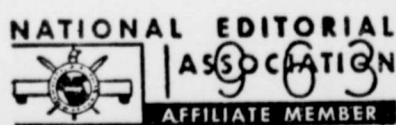

I'm sure that if you can fortify

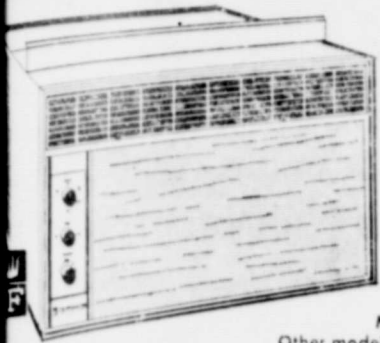

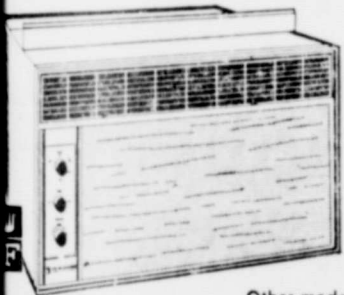
