## HIGH SCHOOL DROP-OUTS —

What is the impact of High School drop-outs on the economy of our country? Suppose we have 50 boys and girls who drop-out of High School at the end of their Junior year. Life expected income of this group is \$188,362 each, or a total of \$9,418,100. If these boys and girls had finished

four years of college, their life expected income would have been \$382,982 each or a total of \$19,149,100.

In other words 50 drop-outs a year represent an economic loss of nearly \$10 million to our country.

This is not the whole story. The economic deprivation of the poorly trained segment of our so-

ciety is only one of their problems, but it is one our country should be aware of.

**A Disproportionate share of family Resources allocated to one area of need.**

### ANOTHER EXAMPLE

Another example of a disproportionate share of family resources allocated to one area of need is in spending for transportation. Transportation has edged out clothing as the third largest area of spending. The number of two or even three car families is at an all time high and increasing rapidly. Many times families have

trouble living within their incomes for the first time in their lives, when they buy a second automobile. Why? Many times it is because the family saw only the \$500 purchase price on that used auto they were buying for their second car. They failed to consider such things as the cost of operation; cost of upkeep, which is higher on used cars; cost of insurance, especially if there are teen-age drivers.

New car costs vary considerably from one dealer to another and from one lending agency to another! Current patterns in transportation show that the average

man spends more on his car than homes in his life. Intelligent buying of 12 or more cars means another child to college.

of Rankin and McCamey get along better than any two sister communities that I have ever known. We not only cooperate in sporting events but extend the working together over into civic clubs and other phases of community life. Again, maybe it has not always been that way but its that way now and I say, "Good".

**ALL THE WAY—**

According to LBJ, we've never had it so good. In fact, we are

doing so well that needy folk among us have increased by some 30 million in the last four years and I, for one can agree that there are those among us who are dragging their feet when it comes to getting the national income average up to a fatter figure. I can think of one instance in particular. What has me worried is this rapid gain in poor people. If this nation keeps on doing better at its present rate, I have it figured that by somewhere around 1970, we will all be on relief.

Of course that's nothing for one to worry about. Congress knows what to do. They pass another bill and spend some more money, that way they help the poor from being poorer and at the same time make some more new poor out of the folk they tap for the money to help the poor in the first instance. Right now there is being waged—with vigor—rawther, a fight against poverty in such places as Harlem. Mainly, what is being done to help the poor there is to spend Federal tax loot to register voters. This is always a good way to help the poor.

And then in Virginia or someplace, they have some more big plans for helping the poor and—of course making sure they get to the polls on election day.

It is a proven fact that better education is the best remedy for poverty. Why, then, doesn't the Congress set up direct grants to any college-age student who can prove that his folks can't afford to send him to college? By figures from the brain trusters, that act would assure him of earning some \$382,000 in his lifetime and if that's poverty—where do you sign up?

There is, however, one rather sad fact. College students—for about half their school years, are not old enough to vote and by the time the little stinkers get an education they come up with the wild idea that they can make a living for themselves—without any Federal aid, yet.

As you can see, this poverty thing is pretty deep and complicated. As a Man said some 1964 years ago, "The poor ye shall have with you always . . ."

**Texas is Feed of  
Screwworm Cases**

Texas continues to be screwworm-free with no cases having been reported in more than five weeks (last case—August 2 in Irion County.) New Mexico also remains free, but a buildup is apparent in Arizona. An increase in fly release in that state is being contemplated.

Scattered showers in many parts of the state are a sign that an extremely critical period for the screwworm eradication program lies ahead.

An increase in screwworm infestations during the fall months has been the normal pattern during past years. Witness what occurred in 1962 and 1963 during the weeks following September 1:

1962: 1st week, 758; 2nd week, 823; 7th week, 2075; 9th week, 1,429.


1963: 1st week, 32; 2nd week, 49; 7th week, 377; 9th week, 346.

Veterinarians and entomologists give two main reasons for this buildup:

(1) Cooler, wetter weather which is conducive to the development and cross-country migration of screwworm flies and (2) a greater number of fresh, attractive wounds caused through fall animal husbandry practices such as shearing, castrating, dehorning, farrowing, etc.

Perhaps a third major factor is the decreased alertness to the screwworm by livestock producers who become accustomed to a drop in infestations during the hot, dry summer months. The latter is of particular concern this
