## Red Devils Priming for Upset of Reagan Owls

Rankin's Red Devils have selected a task for themselves on Friday night which could bring about a considerable amount of joy in Mudville. They have served notice that they fully intend to take the measure of the Big Lake Owls.

Football fever was running at an unusually high level in Rankin early in the week following the Red Devil's 34-27 win in their district opener in Menard. At the same time, the Reagan Owls had a homefield stand for a 27-6 win over the Iraan Braves. The Big Lakers were pre-season favorites to win District 8-A while Rankin was rated third. Big Lake lost their opener to Alpine, then won over Stanton and Iraan. The Red Devils dopped their opener to a good Coahoma ball club and battled the McCamey Braves to a standstill before losing 7-6. In their win over Menard, the local squad made considerable use of the airways and are expected to do so again Friday night.

Some sickness has slowed practice sessions—the principal victim being head coach Don Leach who has been abed for the past several days—missing classroom assignments and workouts. How-

ever, unless new injuries should develop in further workouts, the Red Devils will be in top "Go" shape for their undertaking of dropping the highly-favored visitors from neighboring Reagan County.

Word from the Big Lake camp is that they are not taking the Rankin game lightly but expect to have to go all out. In last year's game, the Red Devils gave the Owls their hardest game before the Reagan team was finally eliminated in state play-offs.

Big Lake feautres a considerable amount of power play football with a good, big fullback. Against the Iraan Braves last week, they appeared to be somewhat weak on pass defense. And with Senior quarterback Roy Winters tossing the pig hide, this will

get a fair test against the Red Devils.

In the Menard game, a large number of Rankin backs came to the front. Hard running by fullback David Brown, and halfbacks Kellam Colquitt, David Zoller, Billy Wayne Hale and Jim Pettit made the Devil's passing game go. Along the front line, led by Senior Ronnie Thorn, a lot of hard work was turned in by the Ivey twins, Gary Houchins and others.

Although most fans will admit that the Red Devils will have to turn on the steam to defeat the visitors, all agree that Friday night, should be a whale of a ball game.

Kick-off time is 8:00 p.m.—the last game of the season to be scheduled at this hour.

## Harris Takes Over American Station

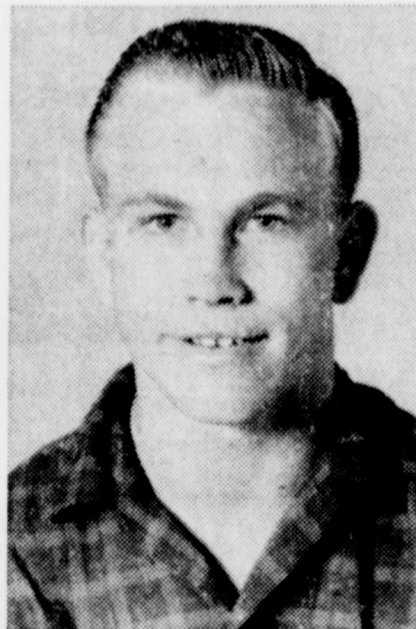
Ed Harris has taken over the operation and managership of the American Service Station on Highway 67 at Main Street. Harris began operations in the station around the middle of last week.

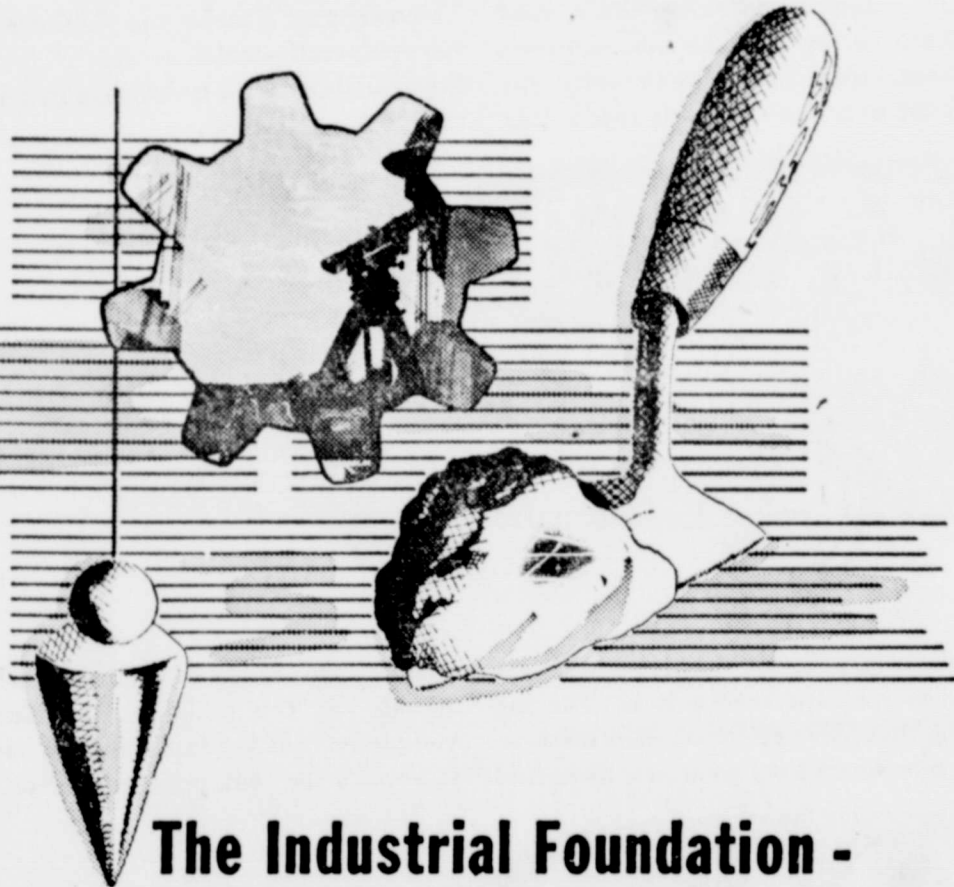

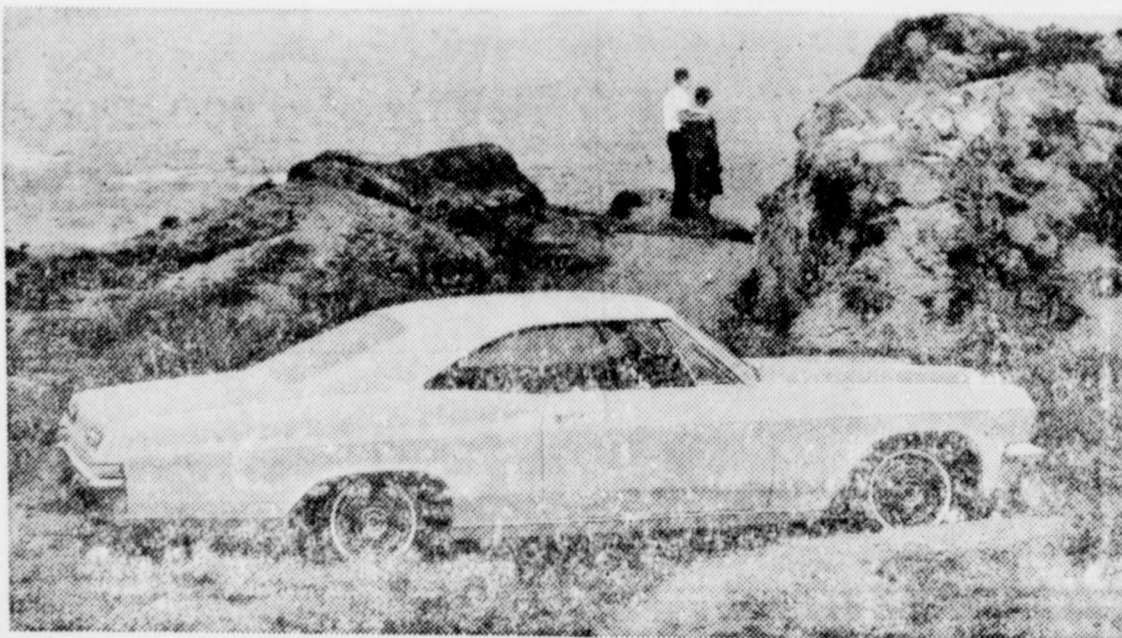
