# 83rd Grand Jury Convenes To Consider Murder Charge

Members of the 83rd Judicial District Grand Jury were called into session last Monday and took under consideration the murder charges filed against Mrs. Betty Legg of Iraan. Mrs. Legg was represented at the Monday session by her attorney, Warren Burnett of Odessa. The Grand Jury is continuing its investigation into the charges and is to meet again Friday at the court-

house in Rankin. In charge of the case for the State is Shelby Blades, 83rd D. A., and John A. Menefee, Upton County Attorney.

Mrs. Legg, 30, was charged in Justice of Peace Ben Hill's court in McCamey early Sunday mornher husband, James Legg, 40, of ing with the fatal shooting of Iraan at the T-P Tavern on Hiway 67 east of McCamey. Mrs. Legg has made no written state-

ment concerning the shooting.

She surrindered at McCamey Hospital to Upton County Deputy Malcolm Reimers and immediately, upon being charged in the J. P. Court, posted the \$5,000 bond set by Judge Hill.

Legg, a pumper for Marathon Oil Company who had previously lived in McCamey, was reportedly shot one time in the chest with a .38 caliber gun. He was dead on arrival at McCamey Hospital. The gun was surrendered to the sheriff's office.

It is reported that the shooting followed a domestic quarrel that took place at the raod house.

Legg is survived by two daughters, one son, both his parents and a brother.

ion cubic feet of natural gas. The oil was valued at \$35.3 million; the natural gas at \$5.1 million.

Upton County ranks 27th in the state as total value of oil and gas production.

It is estimated that royalty payments to Upton County landowners who are fortunate enough to have producing wells on their property create a "crop" worth about \$5 million annually. These and other farmers and ranchers who have leased acreage for exploration receive additional rental

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and bonus payments, but sufficient current data is not available for measuring the amount.

Oil and gas operators invested an estimated \$1 million in Upton County last year in the search for new fields and in development of zones where production has been been found. The Oil and Gas Journal reports that 127 wells were drilled in the county in 1963, resulting in 105 oil wells, 6 gas wells, and 16 dry holes.

Drilling operations included 16 wildcat wells in which operators hunted oil in new territory or at new depths. About \$1.5 million of the drilling expenditures was lost to dry holes, the Association estimated. Approximately \$380,000 was spent to conduct seismic explorations mapping underground formations which might contain

#### Final Test Underway Of Screwworm Fight

Heavy rains over many parts of the state have brought long-sought relief to drouth-stricken pastures and empty stock tanks and have brightened future crop pros-

to the county, according to Texas Employment Commission records. They show about 450 persons directly employed in oil and gas operations.

The state government's financial interest in Upton County operations is measured by the \$2 million a year which the operators and royalty owners provide the state government in production taxes. These payments are in addition to those paid to local units of government and schools as property taxes. Oil and gas property taxes are reflected in local support of many Texas school districts. For example, 93.3 percent of the local taxes for the McCamey School District comes from oil and gas operations; 71.4 per cent at Rankin.

Among the county's industrial operations is the processing of oil and gas. Some 7 natural gasoline plants are operated to recover butane, propane, natural gasoline and other liquids from natural gas. They have a capacity of 182 million cubic feet a day.

Screwworm flies may also be welcoming the moisture. Confined to the areas along water courses and around stock tanks during most of the summer, the insects generally take off crosscountry during the fall season when every chuck hole and creek contains water. This brings about the annual fall increase in the screwworm infestations that eradication officials have warned a-

No cases have been reported in Texas for more than seven weeks now so officials feel that no screw worms exist in the state to start a buildup. However, rains have also been prevalent in northern Mexico, and migration of insects from that country into the U.S. presents a danger. No buildup of infestations has been observed in the Mexican states adjoining the Texas border, although Chihuahu and eastern Sonora, below Arizona, have experienced considerable problems with screwworms.

The next 4-5 weeks should tell the tale as to whether livestock producers will have to doctor more "wormies" this year or not. As a precaution, stockmen should keep a close check on their animals and treat cuts, scratches and other wounds, so that if screwworm flies do manage to slip past the barrier zone, their livestock will be protected.
