# Grand Jury Indicts Legg for Murder

The 83rd District Grand Jury last Friday returned an indictment against Mrs. Betty Jewell Legg of Iraan, in which it is charged that she did "with malice aforesaid, shoot

James Cecil Legg, with a pistol, with intent then and there to murder the said James Cecil Legg." Bond was set at \$6,000 and was posted by Mrs. Legg. No definite date for trial has been set by Judge C. E. Patterson.

The charge grew out of a shooting on September 27 at the TP Tavern in McCamey in which Mrs. Legg is alleged to have kill-

ed her husband following a family argument. Mrs. Legg surrendered to law officers at the McCamey hospital following the affray.

Warren Burnett, noted criminal attorney from Odessa, represented the defendant before the grand jury. District Attorney Shelby Blades, district attorney in the 83rd district, and John A. Mene-

fee, county attorney for Upton County, represented the state. If convicted of murder as charged, the death penalty is the maximum sentence under Texas law.

It is believed that Mrs. Legg is the first woman ever to face a murder charge in Upton County. A grand jury no-billed another woman who killed her husband at Midkiff some time ago.

As usual, highlight of the activities will be the football game; this year's event having promise of being a thriller between the Rankin Red Devils and the Iraan Braves.

Rankin has a considerable edge in this series—something like 6 wins out of the last 8 meetings. Iraan, a much improved team this season, will be looking forward to playing the spoilers for the Red Devil homecoming and will likely go all out to win this one.

Both teams are about the same size with Rankin having a bit of advantage in the lineup of Senior players. The Braves have yet to win a district game but did down the McCamey Badgers last week while Rankin was losing to the Sonora Bronchos. Rankin has one district win and 2 losses.

Work in the Red Devil camp this week has been spirited and all players are in top condition for the game. Reports from the

Brave camp indicate that they took a few licks in the McCamey encounter but nothing serious.

Iraan used a good bit of the single wing formation last week to confound the Badgers and it is anticipated that they will shoot some of the same at the Red Devils. They sport a well balanced attack from both the airways

and on the ground.

Generally, the game is rated as a toss-up. Starting at 7:30 p.m. Friday, fans will get the answer as to whether it's to be heads or tails.

Rankin gave as good as they got from the much heavier Sonora Broncho team, outgaining their opponents in yardage and first downs and lost the game primarily on a spotted defense. Overall, they have shown considerable improvement as they have

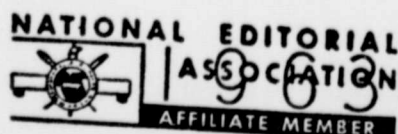

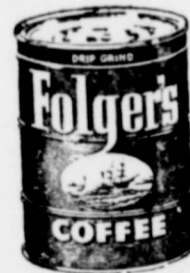

in 1965, from the Texas Forest  
Service at a delivered cost of \$1.50

sales tax.

The trees and shrubs may be  
used for windbreaks, soil stabili-  
zation, and Christmas tree plant-  
ings, but cannot be used or  
resold for shade or ornamental  
purposes. All seedling orders will  
be packed in moss and moisture-  
proof paper and shipped prepaid  
direct to the purchaser.

Orders for species shown on the  
application must be in multiples  
of 50 and orders for less than 100  
seedlings or seed (black walnut)  
will be accepted.

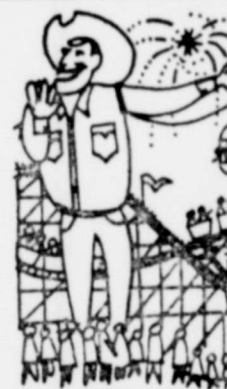

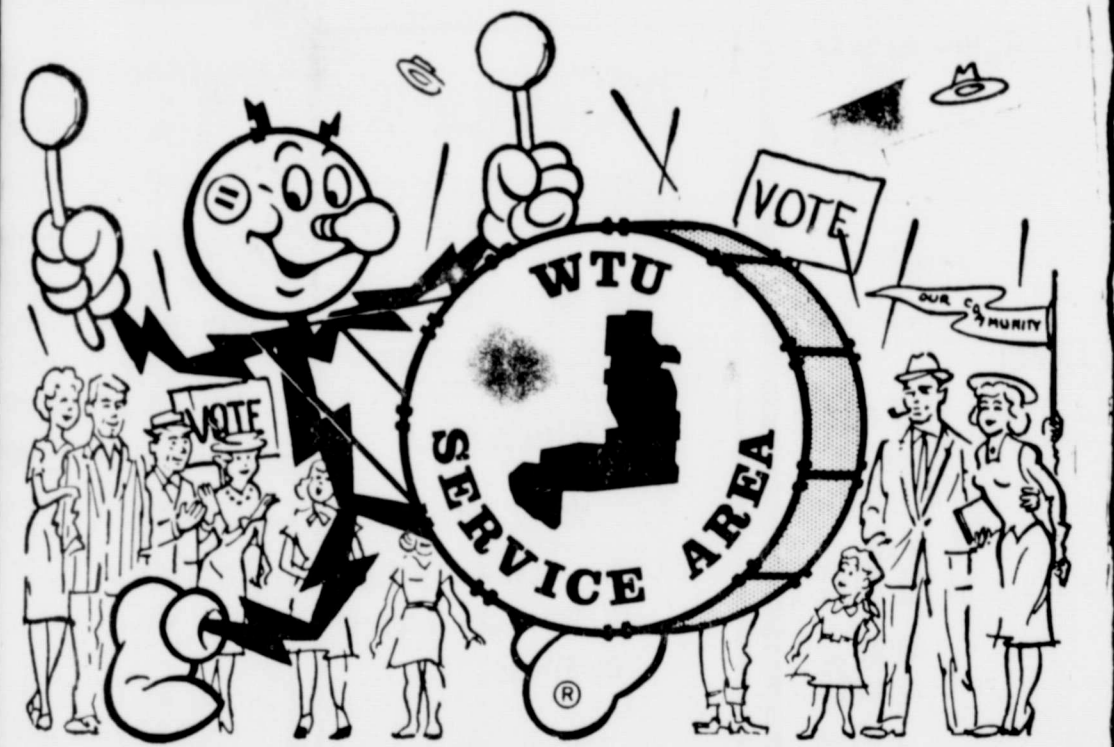
