## Council Grants Increase In Local Telephone Rates

Ben R. Young, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. this week announced that Rankin City Council, in their regular meeting, approved a rate increase in local telephone service. Long distrance calls will not be affected and will remain the same.

Young said that the principal changes in rates would be as follows: business line up from \$8.00 per month to \$9.50 per month; one-party residential lines, up from \$4.75 per month to \$5.50 per month; and two-party residential lines, up from \$4.00 to \$4.25 per month. Effective date for the increased rates will be November 16, 1964. Young stated that no

#### Absentee Voting on Nevember Election

Absentee voting for the November 3 General Election opened at the county clerk's office Wednesday, October 14. It will continue until Friday, October 30.

Any qualified voter who will be unable to go to the polls on election day due to ill health or to his being absent from the county, may cast an absentee ballot. All absentee balloting must be done during regular office hours at the clerk's office. The office is open from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., five days a week.

## Goldwater Group To Work in Upton

A Texans for Goldwater organization has been set up in Upton County to coordinate activities in behalf of the presidential campaign of the Republican nominee.

Boyd Cox of Rankin will serve as local chairman under the direction of Hardy Holers, Austin, and Wm. Robert Smith, San Antonio, co-chairmen of the volunteer organization.

Campaign literature, bumper stickers and speech materials will be available through contact with the local chairman.

Texans for Goldwater is coordinated with the national Citizens for Goldwater under the volunteer leadership of General Jimmy Doolittle and Clare Booth Luce. It is not affiliated with the candidate's party but is made up of loyal citizens who believe freedom has a fighting chance with the election of Barry Goldwater.

#### Bank Deposits Up Over Last Quarter

Deposits at First State Bank showed another increase this past quarter, as they did in the previous quarter. Deposits at the bank stood at \$1,676,659.08 as of October 1 as compared with \$1,649,-282.19 on June 30.

Total assets on October 1 were \$4.561.358.20 as compared with the \$4.229.278.26 figure of June 1. On June 1, 1963, this figure was \$3-866.197.51.

Undivided profits on hand according to the current statement amount to \$205,199.06. Loans and discounts stood at \$1,781,873.67 as compared with a June 1 figure of \$1,734,179.62.

In other recent actions by the council, City of Rankin retired some \$58,000.00 worth of Water Works and Sewer System bonds, Series 1949, and refunded \$50,000 on the same issue. By this action, the city will realize a savings of \$27,000.00 in interest over the maturity date of the bonds which were to have run until approximately 1980.

#### Clothing Drive Set At Local Schools

Clothing may be left at any of the local schools. It should be clean and in usable condition.

Clothing is distributed to children and adults alike of any race or creed to American communities hit by disaster, on American Indian reservations and to orphanages in the U.S. and overseas.

## THE SCOOP by Scoop

UP AND DOWN-

A few weeks ago City Council announced what amounted to a 10 percent cut in taxes for City of Rankin tax payers. About the same time, West Texas Utilities announced a reduction in their electrical rates.

There was joy amid the outlanders. But not for long.

This week an announcement is carried in The News that says the City Council has approved an increase in rates for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. From my own standpoint, this increase will just about wipe out-perhaps a little over-any savings in the two aforementioned reductions.

This is not to say that City Council should or should not have given SWB a rate increase in Rankin. I do not raise the question of whether SWB should be entitled to same. I only make the point that it's mighty hard to put a buck in your pocket now and then-especially when there are so many holes in that pocket.

One thing I don't understand is why one utility such as West Texas Utilities, can give a rate reduction and another and even

bigger utility such as Southwestern Bell Telephone, has to have an increase in the same town to make a living-and especially in light of the fact that WTU has a local office, gives employment to three local families, participates in almost every phase of the community life, operates a system somewhat similar to the telephone company in that the product is carried about the town on poles and lines-and yet, they can offer a lower monthly bill to their customers and etill offer a reduc-

Southwestern Bell, on the other hand, has no local people on a regular basis, they maintain no local office and are only remotely connected with the community-being more or less on automation. They do not have to produce the product such as WTU must operate power stations to furnish the electricity they sell

Like I say, I don't understand these things but I'm sure City Council does for they didn't even have to question any of the users of telephones to determine that-

Theirs is no easy job to start with but the present group has shown that they are not afraid to make the decisions as they see them and although their actions may not always meet with approval by all, I would remind you that's it not easy to find men who will act promptly and with dispatch on questions which come before them.

#### THE ANSWER-

A and B are in business in Rankin. A sells buggy whips and B sells dog sleds. A wants B to buy all his buggy whips from him but when A needs a dog sled, he gets it from Y who happens to be in business in lower Siberia.

Now if A plus B equals profit for A; how comes B plus A does not equal profit for B? Very elementary. When Y it put into the equation profit is transferred from B to lower Siberia and B no longer has money to buy buggy

whips from A who eventually does not have money to buy dogsleds from Y.

A nutty sort of mumble-jumble you say? True. But it makes about as much sense as does the often practiced habit of one Rankin businessman not patronizing

I guess the older I get the dumber I get. It seems to me that the more money we can keep locally among ourselves- the better off we will all be. It's quite possible that Y may or may not sell his dog sleds to A cheaper than B can; but it may also be true that B can buy his buggy whips creaper in lower Siberia if he is of a mind to deport his dollars out of reach.

Way back down the line some one came up with "Trade at Home." It may be a time-worn bit of wording but somehow the economic truth that it contains has not become obsolete.


