Absentee Voting off To a Fast Start

ABOUT HERE-

In a little while from now we will go to the polls and vote. Of principal interest will be the race for President. I have read three books, "A Texan Looks at Lyndon", "A Choice, Not an Echo," and "My Hopes for America", the latter by LBJ. Along with these books has been a few dozen reams of literature, columns of newspaper print-most of it slanted for this or that candidate—and a few hours before the idiot box. In other words, I'm thoroughly confused and disguested and in a perfect frame of mind for vot-

Lyndon's book, "My Hopes for America", is full of a fine assortment of typical Johnson speeches and statements. It is something with which anyone could find at least partial agreement. After you have read it, you don't know a bit more than you did but you can't help getting the feeling that it's all Grade A. I said that I read "A Texan Looks at Lyndon"-I read parts of it-enough to know that it contained very little that had not been brought out before. I've heard and read of a lot of people who have knocked the book and its writer for his attacks on LBJ and others but as yet, I've not heard of any one named in the book filing law suit against Mr. Haley for


libel. Roughly, when you sue a person for libel, you have to prove that what he said about you was

The third book, "A Choice, Not an Echo", makes a great deal more sense than either of the other two. Written by a woman-I can't recall her name-it goes a long way toward proving what I have been saying for a long time: the American people have not elected a president in many years. We have only gone thru the formality of approving a man, hand-picked by the powers that be in politics. The writer contends that Barry Goldwater was not so selected and judging from the places from which he is drawing opposition, I believe she is

Whether you want such a man for president is up to you. And it is very likely that this will be your last chance for a choice in the foreseeable future.

Of major importance on this ballot on November 3 will be 3 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. More than once we have all heard someone say "Where the heck do we get this or that stupid law." Well, a lot of the time, we voters approve them at the polls. Texas is one

Established in 1854 with 2 million dollars, the school fund stood at \$533,090.094 on September 10 of this year. During the 1963-64 school year, the interest and dividends from this investment amounted to \$18,495,569.59. In the ten years, 1953-1962, the interest from the fund provided \$101,901,-687.75 for Texas Schools. Had the fund not existed, this amount would have had to be provided by additional taxes.

In past year, the legislature has "raided" the fund to get the 1 percent allowable to put into current operations. A vote "For" this amendment would put a stop to this practice. It doesn't take much of a student in math to see that the more money the fund has in it, the more it will grow and to take it down a piece at a time hurts in the long run.

It would seem wise to vote "For" on this amendment.

Next week, we'll look at the other two.



Senior Students at RHS Given GED Test

The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) was administered Tuesday, October 20 to some twenty-three high school juniors by Mr. Bil Shafer, high school conuselor.

These tests measure two kinds of scholastic ability—verbal and mathematical. Studies have shown these two abilities are essential to successful college work.

Test scores are a strong indicator in influencing college attendance and can also be helpful for a student in deciding upon what type of college he should attend. Overall, the test is very similar to the two major college entrance exams.

Scholarship sponsors also find the PSAT helpful in considering applicants for scholarship aid. It is further used by employers in considering the non-college graduate student for employment.

In Rankin schools, the test provide a comparison of the local student with those on a national level and still further, aid the local school in advising students on college work they should take.


