## Democrats Have Field Day --

# Johnson Si - Goldwater No; Upton Follows the Trend

Goldwater buttons, Foreman stickers and Bush posters were going at 10-cent the dozen—as-sorted—in Upton County Wednesday morning following the return of Upton County to the solid Democratic fold. In this respect, the county followed most of the nation and the State of Texas in a somewhat lesser degree.

With what may well have been a record percentage vote, Upton Countians went to the polls 1752 strong out of a possible 1820. Lyndon Johnson ran up a healthy 958 to 636 for Goldwater. Strongest Republican in the county was George Bush who tallied an even 800 to 803 for Ralphie Yarborough. All three amendments to the

state constitution were approved by margins as large as 4-1.

Biggest upset came in the Foreman-White race for U. S. Representative in the 16th Congressional District where White got 965 votes to 719 for Foreman. In 1962, Foreman carried Upton County over Democrat J. T. Ruth erford, 804 to 694. Also, in 1962, Upton County voted Republican in the governor's race by giving Jack Cox 681 votes to John Conally's 648. Last Tuesday, Conally got 1215 votes to Republican Jack Crichton's 383.

Republicans took their worst shelling in the McCamey area while in Rankin they were more evenly matched and even carried in some of the boxes.

In 1960, Upton County also stood hitched in the Democratic column by giving John Kennedy 930 votes to 796 for Richard Nixon. The county voted Republican in the 1956 presidential race by going 994 for Ike and 834 for Mr. Stevenson.

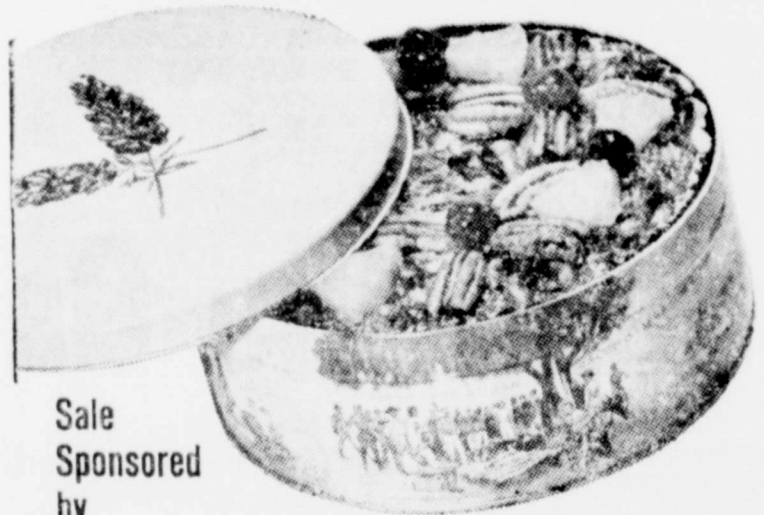
