Rankin Ahead in Series -- Lost Last Year--

Red Devils and the Iraan Braves Renew Old Rivalry Friday Night

Friday night the Rankin Red Devils will make the trip to Iraan, along with just about everyone else in the community, for the annual meeting of the two football teams. The Rankin-Iraan clash is one of long standing and is always a first-rate ball game.

Last year Rankin scheduled the Braves for their homecoming and as a favor, the visitors defeated the Red Devils 23-16. This year, the Iraan School has designated Rankin as the "victim" for their

homecoming and there is every indication that the Rankin crew intends to do their best to put the damper on the Braves party.

Both Rankin and Iraan have been defeated in their last two outings, the Braves going down to Sonora and McCamey while the Red Devils fell to Big Lake and Sonora. On the basis of the two teams' performances against common opponents, they are, for all practical purposes, evenly matched. Iraan, however, started

off strong and has faded while the Rankin crew, playing a much stronger slate of opponents, has showed almost weekly improvement.

All the local hands are said to be in good condition for the encounter after having worked over the Sonora team in what their own coaching staff is reported to have said was their

toughest game to date. Sporting what many believe to be the best defense in the district, the Red Devils have had much trouble all year in getting the offense off the ground. There are reports this week that some changes are in the offing in this department and that they may be used for the first time in the Friday night game.

Rankin holds a comfortable edge in the series. Going back to 1953, the farthest complete record of the games, Rankin has won eight out of twelve. In only two games, in 1957 when Iraan defeated Rankin 33-0 and in 1954 when the Red Devils won 6-0 has there been shutouts. Incidentally, records show that Rankin played Iraan on their third game of the season in 1954 and were unscored on at that point.

There have been no ties during this period and old newspaper reports use such descriptions as "standing room only", "both fences lined five and six deep", "bone-jarring play", etc., indicating the seriousness of the match.

Discretion Was Better Part of Valor, Etc.

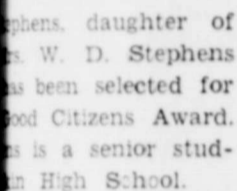

POTATO AND FRUIT
cut-up green toma

- toes
- 2 pounds of raisins
 - 24 oz. dried apples ground (two 12 oz. packages)
 - 3 to 4 whole oranges ground
 - One pound of suet, ground
 - Two whole lemons ground
 - 12 ounces dried apricots ground
 - 1 pint of plum jelly
 - 1 number 2 can applesauce
 - 1 number 2 can pie cherries
 - 1 pound of cranberries
 - 3 cups of pineapple juice
 - 1 pound brown sugar
 - 4 cups of white sugar

1 quart dark molasses
Enough of the following spices to suit the taste: Cinnamon, all spices and cloves. (about 2 table. spoons of each.)

Put all the ingredients in a heavy sauce pan or pressure pan and simmer slowly until the green tomatoes take on the color of the spices, and the entire mixture is thick. Stir to keep from sticking and burning.

Seal while hot, into sterilized jars and store in a cool place. This recipe makes about 2 gallons of mincemeat.

RECIPES FOR LOW COST MENU — BEAN AND CHEESE SALAD

- 1 can beans in tomato sauce
- half cup thinly sliced cheese
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 4.oz. can vienna sausage, drained and sliced.
- 2 hard cooked eggs, chopped
- 1 tablespoon minced onion
- half cup pickle relish
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise or salad dressing

Drain excess sauce from beans. Combine with remaining ingredients. Chill. Serve on salad greens. Serves 4 to 6. Cost approximately ten cents per serving.

Nutrition-wise, this salad contains enough protein to substitute for serving of meat. When milk is served with the salad, more protein is received.

Better see the game. You never know—there might even be a score this year.

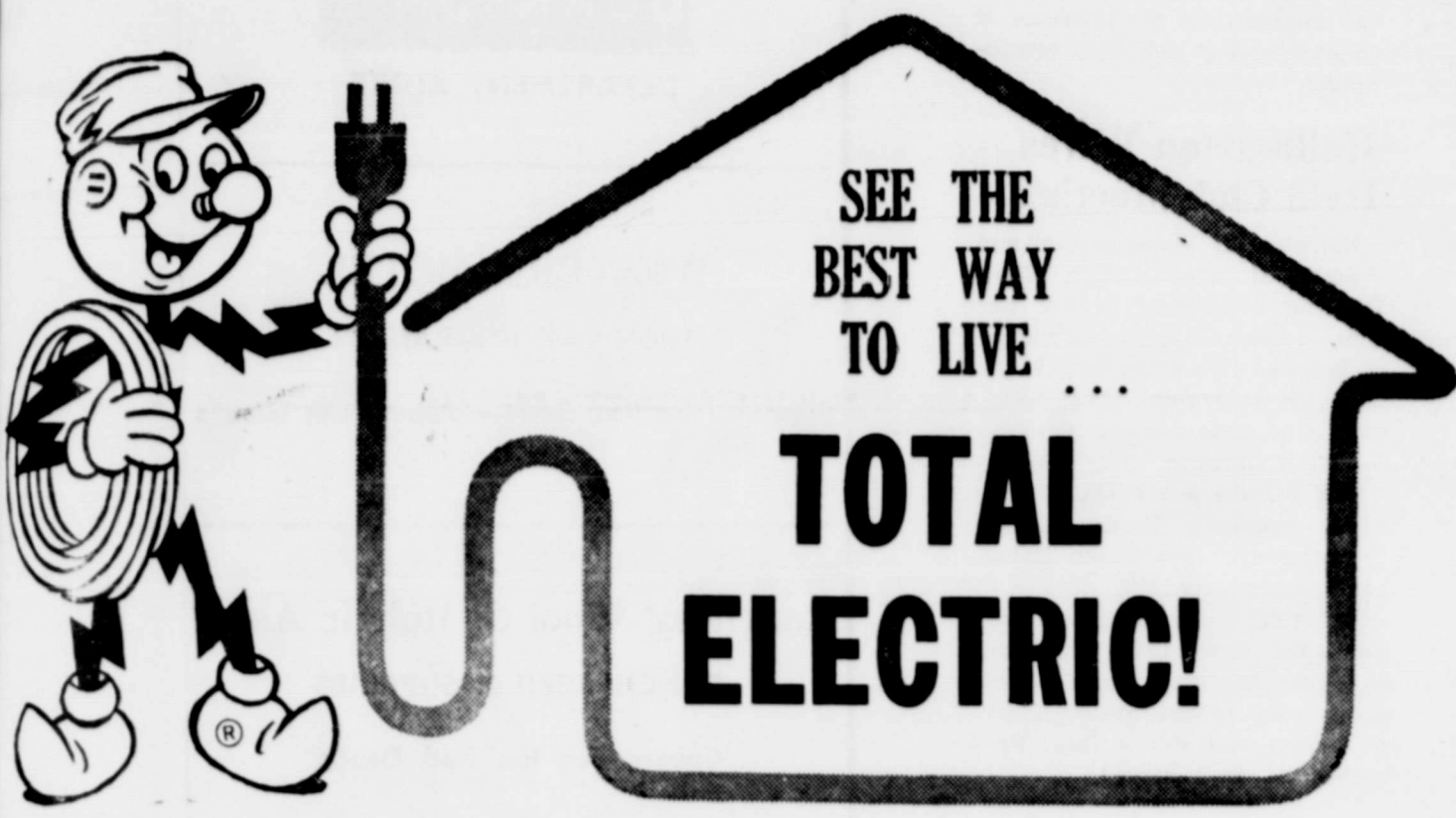

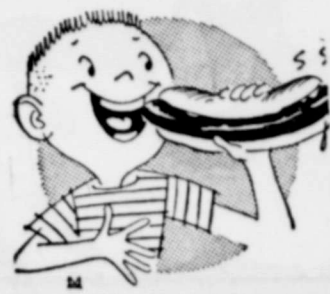
