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

OTHERS IN "TALKING" STAGES --

Numerous Programs Underway



Mentioned were such programs as the dam for the Rankin Draw which is awaiting a survey from the Soil Conservation Service, the proposed County Museum, backed by the Historical Society, the low rent housing, the new school teacherages announced only last week, a new sancturary for the Rankin Methodist Church, and the Upton County water survey, underway since last September And perhaps the closest to actual construction is the two county hospital programs in Rankin and McCamey. All of these projects have had some definite action already taken

Among the items that are in the "talk" stage are more private housing for Rankin with one local contractor having said that he plans to build several new homes for resale in the near future, a rumored move of more houses to Rankin from outlaying areas and the "looking into" of the possibility of an urban renewal project for Rankin.

One of the more definite facts that is providing a boost to the area is the oil business. County values have risen from 48 million to 53 million in the last two years and another increase is expected this year.

"If they stopped drilling today, it would take us two years to catch up on our work," said one local man connected with the oil well service business in speaking

only of the new developments in Reagan County.

"If this is not a boom, I hope I never have to work in one," said a Rankin truck driver who

March 31 is Deadline for '66 License Plates

"We've got an awfully long way to go," said Mrs. Edith Windham, chief deputy in the office of H. E. "Gene" Eckols, tax assessorcollector of Upton County. Reference was made to the fact that only 895 vehicles had been registered thus far in the county.

Last year, a total of 4152 receipts were issued—thru the last of February—to Upton County vehicles. This is believed to be far more registrations than there are adults in the county and often brings requests for varification from the tax assessor when the reports reach certain agencies.

Last year, 2107 license plates were issued in the county for passanger cars, 938 for trucks and 1107 for trailers motorcycles, machinery and various permits.

New 1966 license plates must be on vehicles by April 1. March 31 is the last day that purchases can be made without penalty. The tax assessor requests that the vehicle owner bring with him at the time of making his tag purchase, (1) title to the vehicle to be registered, and (2) last year's registration papers.

"And we would certainly appreciate your early purchase of your plates," Eckols said. "By so doing, you won't have to wait and we can give you better service."

And still more locations are announced and new production is found—much of it near Rankin. "Whoever said the oil patch is dead hasn't been out looking over the situation," was a comment heard that generally sums up the feeling of optomism that presently prevails in the county and in Rankin.

the Federal Housing Authority by telephone and determine the exact status of the Rankin project.

Contact was made on Friday with Mr. G. A. Parker, attorney for the FHA, and Mr. Richard Jerome, economist for FHA.

It was learned that the Rankin application was now in its third phase which will consist—among other procedures—of a visit by one of the Federal economists to Rankin. Mr. Jerome stated that he expects to be here early in April. He also said that the Ft. Worth office is currently processing over 100 low rent applications and that that office has in operation and in process, over 800 such projects in eight states.

Rankin has applied for a total of seventy-five units with a minimum of forty as a starter program. Other members of the Housing Board are Porter Johnson, E. Travis Bley, Dell Cooledge and Dunn Lowery.

Methodist Church Plans Expansions

Still another local improvement plan presently underway calls for the enlargement of the Rankin Methodist Church. Building plans were approved and adopted in February and are now on display at the church for inspection by any interested party. A new sanctuary will be constructed on the site presently occupied by the educational building and this structure, along with some other proposed additions, will be tied into the present church building which will be converted into an educational building containing Sunday school classrooms,

Construction will be of tile with a portion rocked to match the exterior of existing church property. Estimated cost is around \$50,000 with over half this amount already in the church building fund, according to pastor Billy J. White.


the school kids of Texas and got up on his States Rights platform and stood foursquare against the idea.



KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

Seedbed sterilization should be considered by growers who raise transplants either for use at home or for sale. The practice means that growers can produce transplants free of disease and weeds.

Equipment costs are low and little labor is required for carrying out the practice. The equipment needed will vary with type of material used. Liquid materials Vapam or VPM, may be applied with a sprinkler can and then watered down with a garden hose. Covering the treated area with an airtight cover such as polyethylene films will improve the efficiency of the material by holding toxic gases for longer periods.

Methyl bromide, a poisonous gas, gives excellent results when used to transplant seedbeds. It must, however, be used under an airtight cover such as a polyethylene film to prevent loss to the atmosphere.

The material is packaged in 1 pound containers and application rates are easy to determine. The material is safe to use but recommendations by the manufacturer must be followed to the letter. It can be extremely dangerous when improperly used.

Information on seedbed sterilization is available from my office, including details on how to apply the materials to the soil and also the air-tight covers. Information on the needed equip-



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


