Interest Still Running High in Last Saturday's Primary Election

STATE WINNER



KLYE ADAMS, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Adams and a junior student in Rankin High School, won the State UIL boy's prose reading in Austin last week for Class A schools. Of the eleven students who qualified for the regional competition, Adams was the only one to reach the state finals but proved to be enough to secure a share of the coveted championship honors for Rankin High School.

"Who won?" "What was the last count?" "Who's on first?"

These were only a few of the questions being asked by one and all early this week, following the primary last Saturday.

About the only thing that appears to be unquestionable at this point is that the candidates who had no opposition won—probably—and Bill Sherrill and Joe Conger beat their opponents. When the Snelson-Hardeman race comes into the conversation, there are takers on both sides of the tally.

Hardeman apparently is the winner in a race that split some 43,000 votes almost right down the middle. However, there are said to be indications that point to a call for a re-count or an outright election contest.

According to published reports on Wednesday, Hardeman was some 60 votes ahead following the Tuesday canvas of the votes by the county Democratic committees. However, it will be up

to the state executive committee to officially declare a winner.

It could be that following this action, Snelson, if he loses, may decide to take other action that could involve a recount of a contest of the election.

Upton County tallied 1120 votes out of an estimated 2000 with no candidate getting all the votes. In the unopposed races, District Judge Charles Sherrill proved to be the most popular candidate, receiving 1098 votes. Close behind was State Representative Gene Hendryx with 1093.

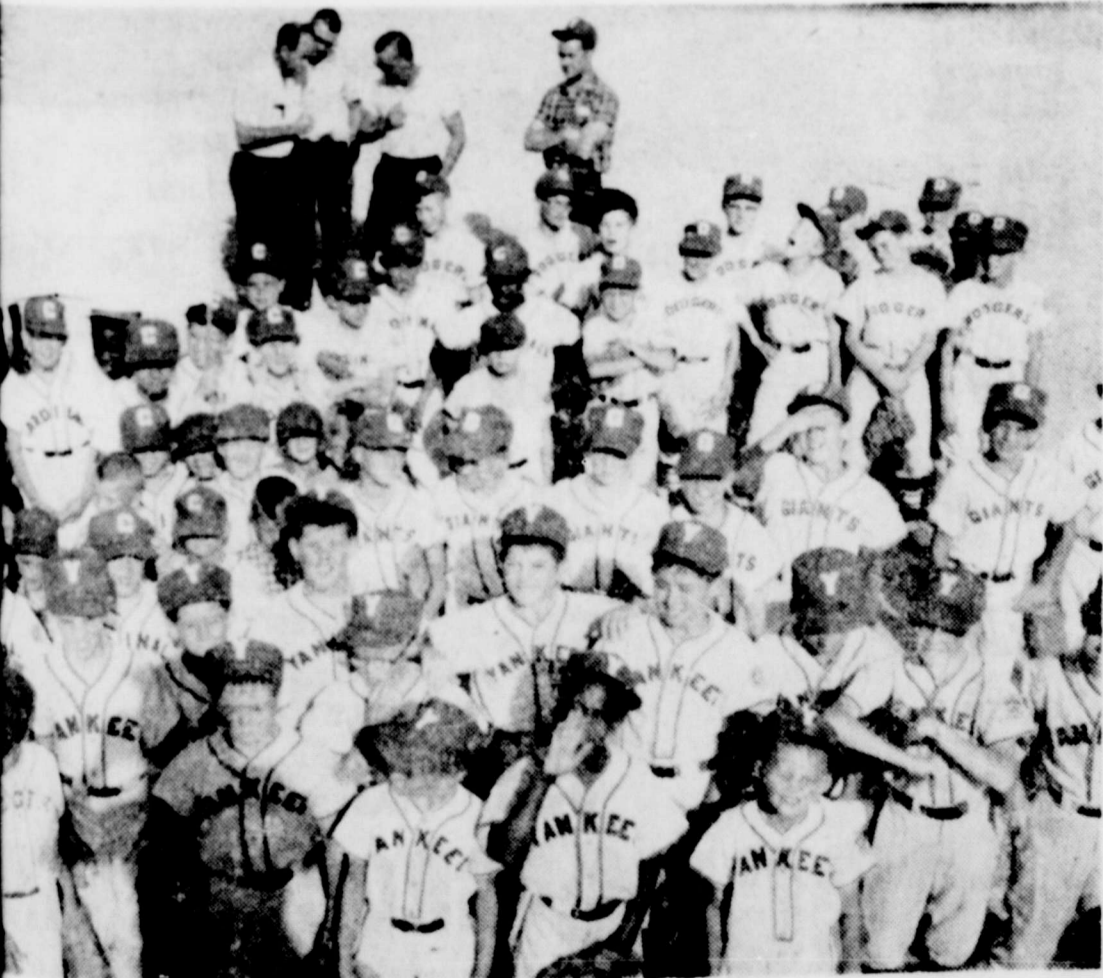

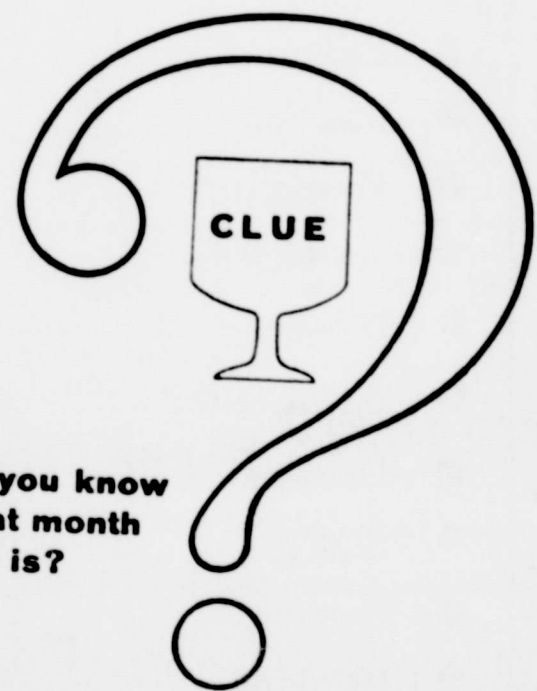

County Lets Contracts on McCamey Hospital

With a courthouse full of hopeful bidders, Upton County Commissioners Court on Monday, sifted through some five overall bids and several partial ones to come up with four contracts for the construction of the McCamey Hospital. Total bid — consisting of four contracts—amounted to \$236,492.88 and will leave the McCamey Hospital with slightly more than \$100,000 for equipment purposes.

Columbine Corporation of Lubbock and Midland and represented by Mr. L. A. Waller of 4613

Pasadena, Midland, was low on the construction bid with \$157,242. Waller will supervise the work and expects to get underway within two weeks. He expects to take about 6 months to do the job.

West Texas Utilities of McCamey won the heating, air-conditioning and duct work bid with a total figure of \$30,852.22. Newton Electric Service of McCamey was awarded the electrical work on a bid of \$18,414.66 and R & S. Plumbing of McCamey took that portion of the job for \$29,-

934.

One overall bid was slightly less than the total amount of these four; however, that particular bid had excluded portions of the work and when the cost of these exclusions were added, the bid would have put the overall cost above the \$236,492.88 figure.

Next bid to be considered on hospital improvements will be that for Rankin Hospital. Plans

Former Rankinite is Author of New Book

Former Rankin resident and graduate of Rankin High School, Miss Pat Dishman, recently received word from Broadman Press that her book, "Ten Who Overcame" will be released July 1.

Miss Dishman was newspaper editor and a member of the year book staff while at Rankin High School. She is currently a freelance writer and YMCA adult program director in Midland.

"Ten Who Overcame" features 10 individuals with varying physical impairments, each of whom had adjusted satisfactorily to his limitations to make a significant contribution to society. Four of these persons are West Texans.

The idea for "Ten Who Overcame" grew from a pet theory that individuals with physical handicaps are more normal than abnormal, Miss Dishman said.

"It has been my privilege to know several persons, who, although physically impaired, continue to lead an active and 'normal' life. For a long time, I've wanted to let others know about these individuals, and I've wanted to share this course of encouragement and inspiration. 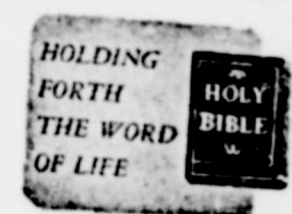
