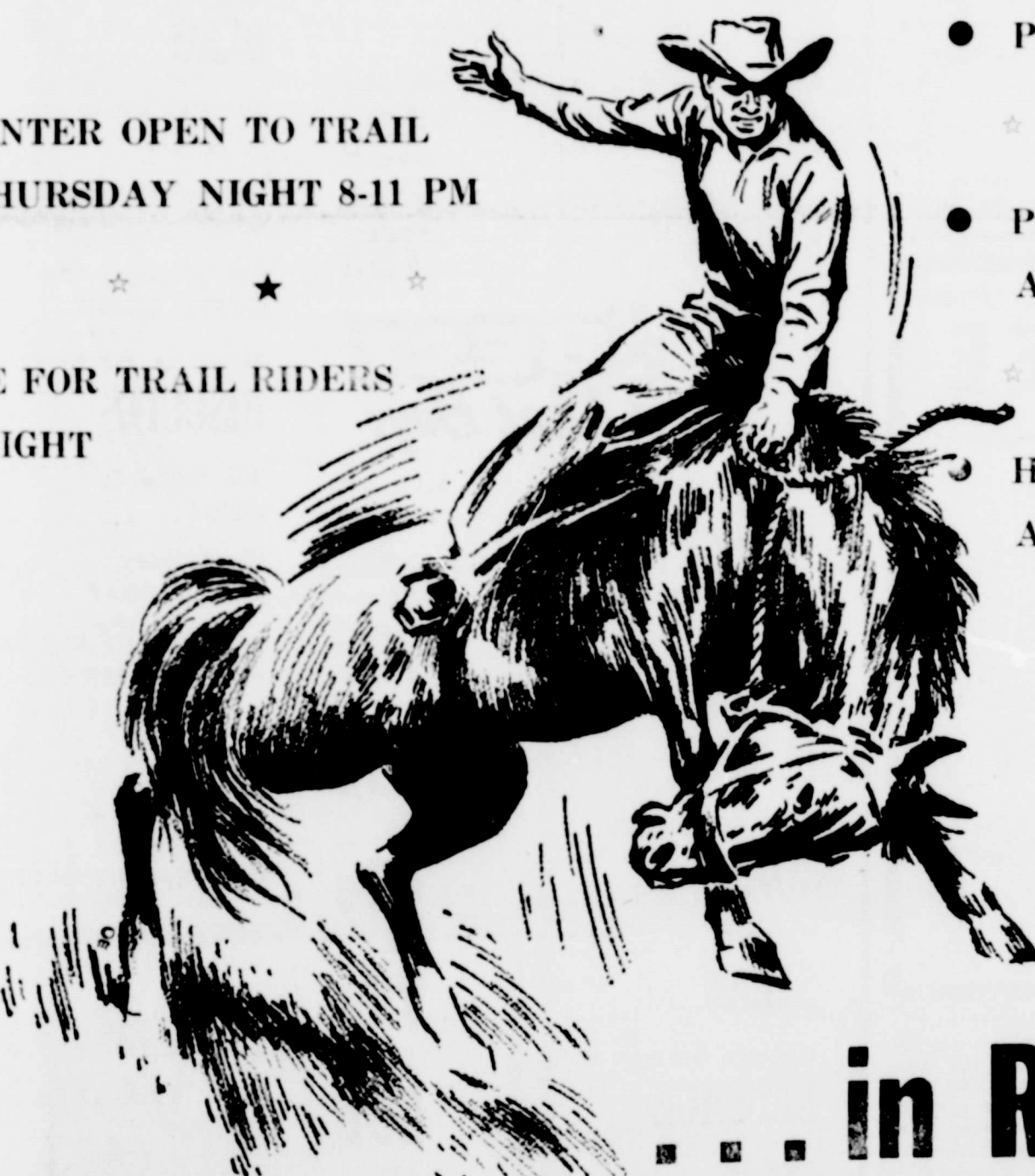

Speaker for the evening will be Mrs. Nancy McKinley, president of the Midland County Historical Society and granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Rankin. Her topic will be the history of P. E. Rankin and his wife, Eliza.

Mr. Rankin donated the land for the present Rankin townsite and laid out the town in 1911, according to his son, Mr. Pearl Rankin.

Other activities by the Society include the dedication of the marker some five miles east of Rankin on Highway 67. Mr. Geo. Ramer of McCamey will make the dedication to County Judge Allen Moore.

Mrs. Jack Smith will present a portrait of Col. W. F. Upton, after whom the county is named to Judge Moore. The picture will be hung in the courthouse.

County, School Tax Matters Settled for Coming Fiscal Year

Upton County and Rankin School District went over their proposed 1966-67 budgets with tax payers last Monday and Tuesday and the results hardly stirred a ripple on the mill pond as far as protests were concerned. Values in the county were up slightly and no proposed changes are foreseen in the tax rate.

For Rankin Schools, values were approximately 35 million but an overall budget increase of some \$29,000 has made it necessary for the district to call for a 10-cent raise in the rate—up from \$1.40 to \$1.50. This 10-cent increase puts the rate back to where it was prior to the 1965-66 figure. As explained at the budget hearing by Superin-

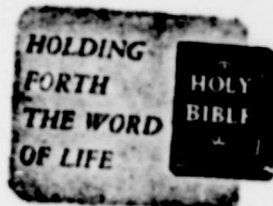

tendent Bill Hood, the budget and resulting tax rate was made primarily because of increased costs in salaries and services used by the district.

The only major improvement planned for the coming year is a expenditure to replace the junior high building.
