## Rankin Approved on Temporary Basis --

# MediCare We've Got... Only Patients are Missing

As of July 1, Rankin Hospital has had the doors open—literally—to all patients, including Medi-Care. In the latter category, there has been not takers as of July 6. And as for the doors being open, the air conditioning unit cratered and all manner of efforts were being used by staff and patients—non-Medi-Care—to keep cool during the hottest spell of the year.

Approval of Rankin Hospital for Medi-Care has been extended on a temporary basis. According to those who grant such approv-

als, Rankin Hospital does not meet all the requirements of the program and thus can only be considered for a period not to exceed twelve months. Just what these deficiencies in Rankin Hospital amount to has not been spelled out by the Federal Agency doing the approving.

In a letter to administrator Leon Feuge, the approvals board indicated that they would set out these "drawbacks" at a later date and would "revalue" Rankin Hospital in about nine months to see if the necessary changes to

gain full approval were being made. Rankin Hospital is the only county hospital approved to accept Medi-Care patients at this time.

Under the Medi-Care program, all that is necessary for one to be admitted to an approved hospital is that he or she be 65-years-old, be a citizen, be alive and have \$40. The \$40 is for payment on the first part of the hospital bill. The Federal Government will pay for the rest of the tab up to 60 days, after (Continued to Back Page)

a hazard to the public, a nuisance in general and increases his chances of getting killed by about eighty percent.

A good chunk of the taxpayers' money has been and is being spent in Washington investigating the safety of American automobiles and writing legislation to regulate same. No amount of money, time and effort is going to make the driving public safe as long as we allow our highways to be cluttered up with junk.

Either we will have to build two separate highway systems — one for the campers, the junkies, the slow trucks and the foreign "bugs", or else make all highways with four or more lanes. You could build an automobile to be as tough as a tank but would have no better chance of avoiding an accident if you drove it in the present "hash" traffic that is on the highways.

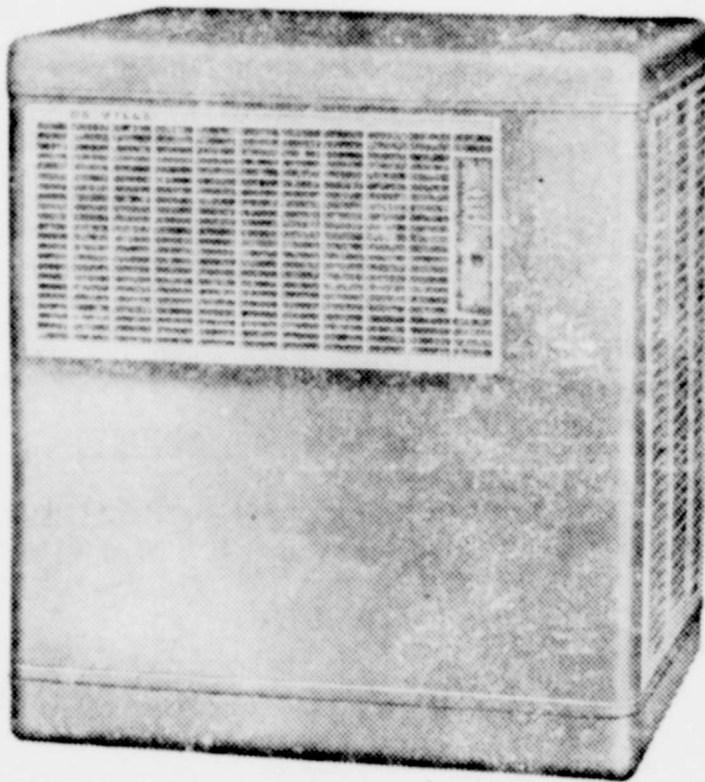
But, says Life, all is not rosy in Texas. Some the the minuses

## ADD NUTRITION TO YOUR SUMMER BEVERAGES—

For a summer treat for your youngsters and their small-fry friends, you may want to use chilled grape juice. This colorful and nutritious food is plentiful and a good buy.

There are various ways for using grape juice. Try some of these suggestions:

1. Grape freeze is a breeze to make. Prepare whipped dessert topping according to package directions and fold in frozen undiluted grape juice, at the mushy stage, until the flavor suits your taste. Brighten with red food coloring if you like. Pour into a refrigerator tray or individual sherbert glass and freeze until firm.

2. Grape-pineapple drink appeals to those who like the unusual. Mix 1 quart of grape juice with a No. 2 can of pineapple juice. Sweeten to taste with a mild-flavored honey. Grated lemon peel adds a tang that many like.

3. Sparkling grape punch is good for teenage parties. Follow your favorite punch recipe and substitute grape juice for at least

half of the total fruit juice. The distinctive color and flavor appeals to the younger set.

4. Grape-orange float is sure to please as a dessert for teenage parties. Fill a sherbert glass a little less than half full of chilled grape juice and add a scoop of orange sherbert. It is both colorful and good.

5. Grape juice appetizer starts a meal with a colorful flair. Dilute frozen grape juice, following package directions and serve with a thin slice of lemon floated on top of each glass of juice. It is

## Rankin G. I. Reaches Vietnam on June 25

U.S. Army, Vietnam — Cpl. Eudardo Sanchez, son of Mrs. Julian B. Sanchez, Rankin, arrived in Vietnam on Saturday, June 25 with the 4th Battalion, 503rd Infantry (Airborne).

The unit departed June 6 from Fort Campbell, Ky., where it had been organized April 13 with personnel already at the post. In Vietnam the battalion has become part of the separate 173rd Airborne Brigade.

During training at Ft. Campbell, the unit stressed the use of helicopters in day and night movements. Also included in the tailored training program were counter-guerilla, counter-ambush, and patrolling tactics.

Corporal Sanchez, a squad leader in the Battalion's Company A, entered the Army in 1960.

## No Action on the 4th Registered in Rankin

Not even the fireworks were making much noise as Rankin very quietly celebrated Independence Day, July 4. Sheriff Gene Eckols said that there were no traffic accidents reported and no law violations recorded.

One bit of excitement did develop when a fire broke out at the Phillips Gasoline Refinery some fifteen miles northeast of Rankin. Units from Rankin, Big Lake and Midland answered the fire call. A Halliburton crew put the damper on the blaze with a chemical extinguisher and the city fire units used their water to cool down the area.

No estimate of the damage has been made but it was severe enough to force the shutting down of the plant for several days. Replacement equipment was expected to be hard to locate.

A light shower in the mid-afternoon helped to break a heat spell that has gripped the area for the past several days. Most stores and business houses were closed and little traffic was noted on the highways.

## KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

Spring and summer storms frequently cause considerable wind damage to trees. And it is often asked when and how this damage should be repaired.

Remove the damaged limbs and branches immediately after the damage occurs, making the cut flush with the trunk or limb from which it is growing. Paint all cuts with good tree wound dressing to prevent diseases or insects from getting into the tree through the wound.

For removing heavy limb in order to prevent bark damage:

First, make a saw cut from the underside of the damaged limb and about eight inches from the main trunk. Make this cut at least a third of the way through the branch or until the saw binds.

Make the second cut from above and several inches further out from the trunk. Continue cutting until the branch is removed.

Make the final cut flush with and parallel to the main trunk, and apply tree wound dressing to the exposed surface.

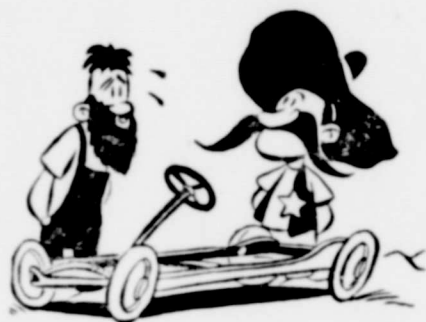

**Peak Water Usage Hits Local System**

After slipping through most of June without any severe heat, the weather in the area got down to the business of summer time around the 1st of July and has kept up the pressure.

And that little quirk of nature has put the pressure on the water pressure in a manner of speaking.

According to those in charge of keeping the water pressure up in Rankin, there has been no great strain on the system thus far although the water level in the big tank near Western Company did get as low as three feet last Friday. Week-end relief, when a number of folk are out of town and other heavy users of water shut down, caused this situation to be overcome and the tank was refilled and all wells were shut in for a short rest.

The water level in the wells is reported to be holding up "about the same as usual." Rains earlier in the year apparently recharged the water formations to some extent. The old city wells in the Rankin Draw have not yet been put into use.

Traditionally, the months of July and August put the greatest strain on the water system and old timers recall instances when turning on the water in the bath tub only brought a slight spurt of dust. However, since 1953 when the current system was installed,
