Aerial Spraying for Rankin-McCamey Scheduled this Week

A joint city-county mosquito spraying has been scheduled for Rankin and McCamey sometime this week, according to county and city officials. An airplane out of McCamey has been hired to do the work and application with the Federal Aviation Agency has a formality that allows pilots to fly over towns in their spraying work. Ordinarilly, they are bared from such practices.

Weather condtions will determine exactly when the spraying will take place. It will be either early in the morning or late in the afternoon of Thursday, Friday or Saturday of this week.

The chemical used will not be harmful to either humans or animals and it will not be necessary to try to keep it out of the home or avoid direct contact with

o task. Sometimes rage is over inflanted out that the es not buy as much of 1939. My hy 1939? Why not or 1865 or some such date? The dollar bought a lot more in those by-gone eras than it did in even good ole 1939.

Actually, you can pick almost any date in American history and compare it with a date some 30 years later and you will find a considerable difference in many things-the purchasing power of the dollar included. What most of us are saying when we talk about the value of the dollar in 1939 is that we would like to make our present wages and at the same time be able to buy at 1939 prices. Who wouldn't.

It could be that one of the little ironies of the American scene is that most of us have moved into the plutocrat side of the economic life. Ninety percent of us were not very well off in 1939. In fact when they talk of how grand it was in those days and how much the dollar would buy, I am reminded that I knew durn few people who made a decent living in those days, much less a prosperous one. We have a pretty good segment of folk now living sorta high on the hog-they would have been considered rich folk in '39-and they are beginning to think like and talk like a J. P. Morgan.

In politics, they are very conservative and speak in terms of not going for this business of sharing the wealth. Well, I'll buy that-up to a point. But in America today-under what many call a socialistic, shore-the-wealth society, I would venture to estimate that there are fifty times more millionaires than there was in '39 and a vast hoard of people who have moved from the relief rolls to the fat side of life. I do not know of one single big fortune that has been runined in the United States within the last thirty years except by is owners own stupidity. In fact, if anything, there has been some pretty hefty bankrolls accumulated by their owners through transactions carried on with the Federal government.

No-when you want to knock the American way-seriously- I am not your boy. I don't give a hoot about a man's party affiliation. He can be called a liberal or a conservative but unless he believes in and works for the America that has proven time and again to be the best all-round form of government that has ever come along-and unless he does a little flag waving on its behalf, then to me, he's just another twobit politician, out to fatten his own purse and not at all interested in serving the people who may elect him. Sure, I get after Lyndon pretty regular and intend to keep on doing so. I think

we have too much governmentat least for my taste. But I also think that we will continue to grow and prosper in this nation as far into the future as it is possible to see today. All those who would sell us short and who hollar "woif" at every shadow are not listening to the same drum-beat as are the vast majority of citizens.

We will continue progressingwith social security, with medicare, with the poverty program, with the great society-maybe not because of them-maybe in

You may apply new math or the old fashioned—the answer is the same—a tremendous saving.

Many other bargains in wholesome foods may be found by studying your local market ads, your local seasonal surplus.

Potatoes fresh are about as cheap now as they will be this fall. The late summer crop has been harvested. These fresh new potatoes are not cured and there fore will keep only a short time. If a surplus is bought, keep cool, dry and in a dark place. Refrigeration changes some of the starch to sugar and gives them a sweet taste. Good baking potatoes cannot be refrigerated—it makes them sticky when baked.

Preezing is not a safe procedure.

French fries Method (1) Cut the potatoes in ¼-inch squares. Pre-heat sticks in boiling water for 2 minutes. Cooling: Cool in cold running water. Three Minutes Pack: Pack dry without any water.

Method (2) French Fries:

Fry in deep fat to light golden Brown. Drain thoroughly on absorbant paper. Cool to room temperature. Pack in moisture-
