## Tax Rates Set for Hospital Districts

In recent hearings on the proposed budgets, the Rankin County Hospital District and the McCamey County Hospital District came up with firm figures for their current tax rolls.

For the Rankin District, the tax rate has been set at 55-cents on the \$100 value with a total valuation figure of \$25,300,000.

In the McCamey District, the tax rate is to be 58-cents on the \$100 with an overall value set at \$28,900,000.

Property owners residing within the respective districts will be receiving their tax statements in the near future. The hospital districts' taxes will be billed and collected by Upton County with the money—less a fee for collections—going directly to the districts.

## Series Dates Back to 1960 --

# Rankin to Big Lake for Last Pre-District Game

After dropping their first two games to strong Class AA contenders, the Rankin Red Devils appeared this week to be getting out of the skillet into the fire as the move into Big Lake territory Friday night. The Big Lakers—on paper—figure to be the strongest team yet encountered by the Rankin squad. However, reports making the rounds this week indicate that the Owls suffered a few casualties in the route last week of the Ozona Lions and will not likely be up to full power.

For Rankin the prospects will be somewhat improved over the last two outings in which they have operated at something less than full potentation due to injuries in key positions. Coach Mitchell at mid-week reported that at least one more regular would be back in the line-up and that he had another that might get to play. Two "main-stringers" are still sidelined.

The Rankin Big Lake football game has a rather extended record and has always been play-

ed with considerable enthusiasm from the Rankin standpoint but most of the wins have gone to the Lakers—in fact, aside from a tie game played in 1961, Rankin had never won over the Owls up until last year. With the series that began in 1960—Rankin had previously played the Reagan County squad when Rankin was in Class B—the Red Devils had never scored more than three times in any one game and had amassed a total of 62 points in six years of play.

Last year, however, the Rankin team made up for some of the difference as they shelled the Owls 23-0. In a wild start, the Red Devils put 14 points on the board in the first three minutes of the game. With the shut-out of the Reagan Owls, this marked the first "skunking" of the series and a measure of revenge will likely be in the minds of the Big Lake crew.

Football fans are never shorted on excitement when Rankin and Big Lake meet. Game time is 8 p.m. in Big Lake.

# Golfers Plan Tournament; Figure on Loan Estimates

Meeting held last Wednesday. Rankin Golf Club plans ready by next week after which the club will again meet with Mr. Bob Edwards, the F. representative, and determine their next steps.

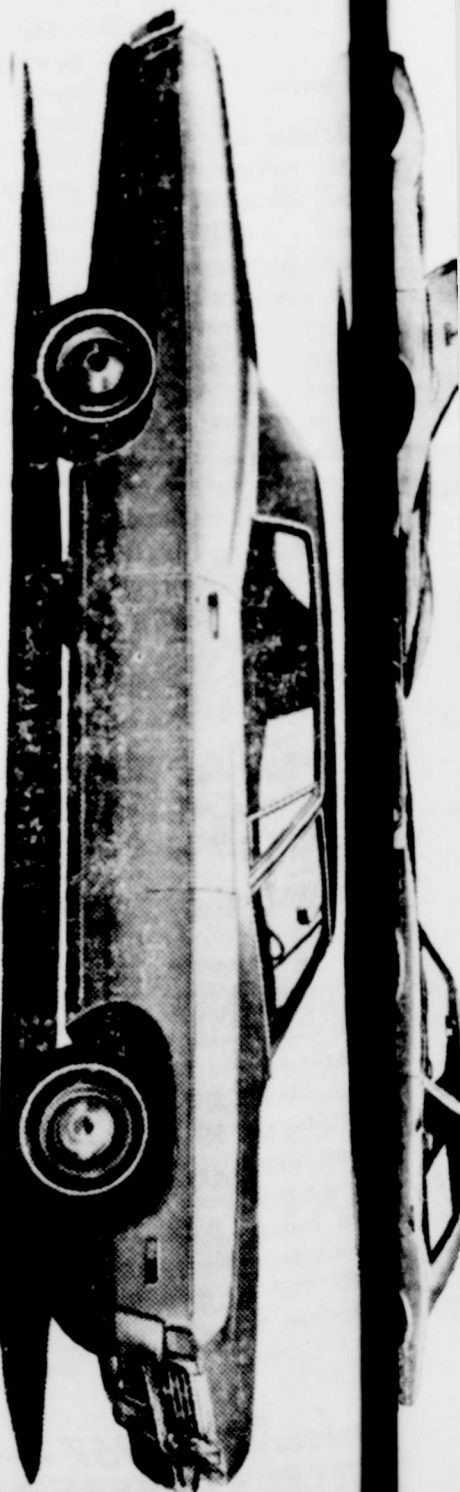

## Pecan Crop Up

### From Last Year

County Agent, Upton County

Pecan production in Texas, based on September 1 prospects, is estimated at 35 million pounds by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is the same as the August 1 estimate and is 35 percent above the 1966 crop of 26 million pounds.

Pecan set is fair to good in the Cross Timbers, Northeast Texas and San Saba areas with a poor set in the Blacklands, South-central Texas and Upper Coast areas.

Dropage of pecans in August was about normal. Second generation casebearers caused some damage earlier in the season and scab, aphids and weevils are currently causing some damage.

The drought has also caused some shedding of pecans as most major pecan producing areas have received below normal rain. Fall during the summer. Moisture is needed to size nuts and fill out kernels.

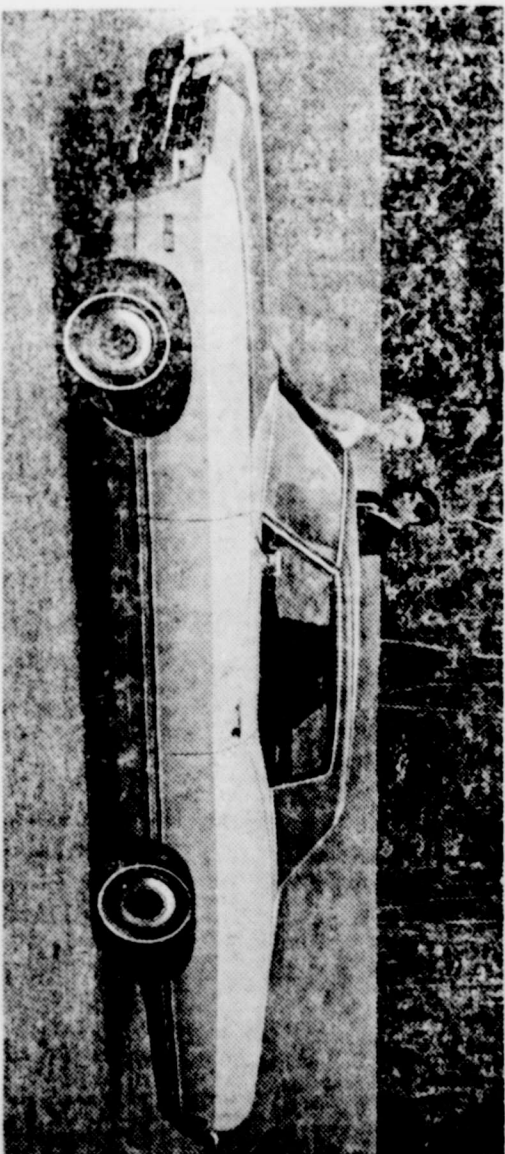
