Outcome is Important to Texans --

Polls Open Saturday A.M. for Amendment Voting

Four polling places will be in operation Saturday in Upton County for the Special Amendment Election. Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. A voter registration certificate for 1967 will qualify eligible voters.

In Rankin, voters of Precinct No. 1 will cast their ballots at

the commissioners courtroom in the courthouse. Mrs. Sam Holmes will be election judge. Voters residing in Precinct No. 2 will cast their ballots at the Rankin Park Building. Mrs. Ross Wheeler is to be judge at Box 2.

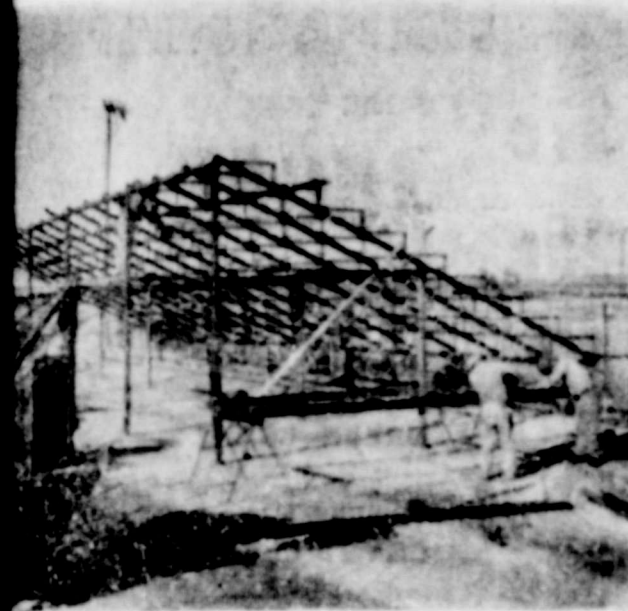
McCamey voters will ballot at the McCamey Park Building and at the school administration offices.

Six proposals will appear on the ballot and all are related to proposed changes of the Texas Constitution. A very light turnout is expected despite the fact that amendments to the State

Constitution are of considerable importance to citizens. None of the propositions have drawn any noticeable attraction—either for or against. One, No. 3 on the ballot, pertaining to the Veterans' Land Program, has been rejected twice previously by the voters—despite the fact that the program has paid its own way and even shown a profit.

Absentee voting, which closed last Tuesday at the county Clerks office, reached nine. This was considerably shy of the usual number of absentee ballots cast in previous elections.

Red Devils Close Season with Menard Yellowjackets

Bringing to a close a season that doesn't make a very big spread in the record books but one which has provided considerable pride for fans and supporters, the Rankin Red Devils end their 1967 football schedule Friday night at home. Opponent for the evening will be the Menard Yellowjackets.

For the Red Devils, 1967 has been what is referred to in football parlance as a "rebuilding year." With only two seniors on the active list for the club, the young Rankin team managed to score on all opponents and forced several teams—including AA squads—to come from behind in order to win. With an offense that could move the ball on the ground and through the air, the

Devils have given much promise to the old adage of "wait 'till next year."

In the Menard Yellowjackets, the Red Devils will be in one of the few matches where they will have the advantage in size and are favored to take the game over the visitors. Rankin and Menard have met only three times previously on the gridiron with the local eleven having won all three games. In 1964, it was Rankin by 34-27; in 1965, 20-12; and last year, 67-8.

Five seniors will be taking the field for the last time for the Maroon and White. They are Larry Funderburg, Mike Turner, Joe Adams, Mark Balke, and Rex Sheppard. Only Turner and Funderburg are letterman while

VOTE 'EM UP—

Saturday, Veterans' Day, will be the last opportunity to make use of the 1967 free vote. And just because Lyndon doesn't have his name on the ballot is no excuse for voters to renig on their duty as citizens by not casting a ballot.

Six proposed amendments to the constitution will be on the ballot. Perhaps all six are worthy of approval. Two definitely are.

No. 5 on the ballot, the State Parks Development Bonds, has already been discussed in this column and your support for its approval is urged. Another, No. 3, Veterans' Land Fund, also is worthy of passage.

Since the days of the Republic, Texas has always rewarded her fighting men by donations of land grants. Now that all public land has been disposed of, the Veterans Land Program is the next best way to permit Texas veterans to own a piece of land.

Since its inception in 1949, the Veterans Land Program has stood

on its own as one of the soundest—and one of the few—state endeavors in modern times. It has been most successful and in its years of operation has not cost the taxpayers for its operation and the purchase of land. On the contrary, it has made a profit for the people of Texas over and above its cost of operation.

Oddly enough, previous amendments put to the voters that would have benefitted this program have been defeated—that in itself being odd since few amendments are ever defeated. It makes no sense. Here is one of few state-backed undertakings that pays its own way—plus a profit—plus benefitting men who have served their state, often at the risk of their lives—and it has been turned down twice that I can recall.

Saturday, Veterans' Day, will be an appropriate time for Texas.

cluding myself, urged him to re-consider when he announced that he would not seek re-election. He was an honorable public servant and was his own man. Such are not always easy to find when it comes to filling state offices.

He will not admit it in public but the reason he quit was rather basic—he didn't get paid enough and couldn't dig up the difference any longer out of his pocket. Being the sort of man who did not think a public servant ought to take hand-outs—that usually had strings attached—he had to quit to make a living.

Mr. Baker will be around and see as many of you as possible. You will find him to be a thoroughly West Texas style gentleman and one who knows what is to put in a days work. He has made the Pioneer into one of Texas' very top weekly newspapers and has done it by hard work.

He knows what it means to meet a payroll, he understands the State legislative workings and he's a straight shooter.

We are fortunate that he has

seen fit to pick up the torch that Hendryx has laid aside and it will be my pleasure to lend him what little support I can. I don't think any of you will be disappointed who do the same.

THE TAX—

Last week's report of taxes collected by Upton County and turned over to the Hospital Districts and the State of Texas apparently was a little confusing. Some readers understood that the state portion was collected in connection with the hospital district tax. Such was not the case.

Upton County has always collected a tax for the State—like all other counties. The fact that we approved hospital districts in the county had no bearing on the amount of state tax collected. It would have been the same with or without the hospital districts based on the county assessment.

Had we not approved the hospital districts, the county would have had to raise more money—consequently, the state tax paid

would have been more.

Admittedly it's something like a bargain sale where you save \$9 on a \$19 item—on sale for \$10. It's a sort of paper savings but we would have had to pay it had we not went the hospital district route.

ELECTION ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

Upton County, Texas November 11, 1967

SAMPLE BALLOT

INSTRUCTION NOTE: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

NO. 1

- FOR: The constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund.
AGAINST

NO. 2

- FOR: The constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services.
AGAINST

NO. 3

- FOR: The amendment to extend the Veteran's Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veteran's Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.
AGAINST

NO. 4

- FOR: The Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed.

NO. 5

- FOR: The amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks.
AGAINST

NO. 6

- FOR: The constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted.
