



There's never anything good about losing, but in evaluating the Friona Squaws' losing the district playoff to Floydada, there seems to be one thing which is gratifying.

That would be the mushrooming interest and backing for the sport of girls basketball at Floydada, which up until last year had never won a district championship in the sport in the school's history.

With the type of Support the Squaws receive, it would have been disheartening to have lost the championship to a team which did not have fan support, but such was not the case. There appeared to be an almost equal number of Floydada fans at the playoff as there were Friona supporters.

It's encouraging, then, to see the sport getting good support at one of our larger district schools. Floydada has probably the largest enrollment of any school in District 3-AA. At many places, the larger the school gets, the less the support gets for girls basketball, but this apparently is not the case at Floydada.

In fact, it seemed as though all of Floydad was united behind the Whirlettes. Several pep signs had been prepared and were on display in the gymnasium, with slogans such as "The Student Council is behind the Whirlettes."

This fan interest and support is gratifying, because it guarantees some heated competition for the Squaws in the future.

However, the way that the fight went for the district title this year, one might say that you might carry this competition thing a little too far.

In fact, Floydada coach Kelly Chadwick calls District 3-AA the "Little NBA (National Basketball Association)."

District coaches have remarked that you could choose four teams from District 3-AA and pair them up at Austin and you'd have a whing-ding of a state tournament.

This has been pretty well borne out in the round-robin competition. In fact, the team that finished sixth in district, Hale Center, lost by only two points to Floydada during the second half.

Back to the support the Floydada girls received, we noted from an advertisement in the Floydada newspaper of last Thursday that the team backers were saying "On to State." So, you can see that the team and its followers have their sights set high.

It's a credit to the team and its coach that Floydada bounced back into the playoffs this year, in spite of losing five of six starters from its district championship team of last year.

And, they're a never-say-die team. Several times this season they've been forced to come from behind to win. That's an attribute to a good team.

When you consider that the Squaws lost to only two teams -- Floydada and Springlake -- then you see that they had a pretty good season, in spite of missing out on the championship.

**Squaws Succumb To Floydada**

The Floydada High School Whirlettes failed to be overwhelmed by a tremendous Friona opening quarter, and came back with three steady quarters to earn a 62-49 win over the Squaws and with it the District 3-AA championship.

Down by nine points early in the game, the Whirlettes bounced back with a vengeance to win going away. It marked the team's fourth win over Friona this season. They are the only team to win four games from the Squaws in 10 years.

Early in the game, just as in the team's previous meeting at

Friona, it appeared that the Squaws might win easily.

Hazel Fallwell scored a lay-up shot, was fouled and made it a three-point play to give Friona a 3-0 lead with 18 seconds going in the game. Cindy Ingram then scored six consecutive points to give the Squaws a 9-2 advantage with less than three minutes gone.

Miss Ingram's layup shot gave the Squaws their first nine-point lead at 13-4 with 3:31 left in the quarter. Two free throws by the same player made it another nine-point edge, 17-8, with less than a minute left in the

opening quarter. Floydada scored to cut the margin to seven, 17-10 at the buzzer.

Friona's longest lead of the second quarter was eight at 20-12, but Floydada utilizing fine outside shots, began to steadily cut the Squaws' lead.

The Whirlettes finally tied the score at 26-all with 2:02 left in the half, and took the lead for the first time, 28-26, with a minute to play in the half. Halftime score was 30-28, Floydada.

The Whirlettes, getting a taste of their second straight district championship, continued in the third quarter what they had going for them in the second quarter.

Cindy's layup shot following the second half tip tied the score for Friona at 30-all but that was to be the last time the Squaws scored just 19 points, to Floydada's 32.

Friona guards had gotten in foul trouble early in the game, and the Squaws' cause was hurt somewhat when Linda Fallwell received her fifth personal foul with three minutes left in the third quarter. Friona trailed at this point 38-33.

A minute later, Miss Ingram received her fourth personal foul, and this had an effect on the Squaws' offensive punch the remainder of the game. Another starter, Lou Cochran, fouled out early in the final quarter.

With five minutes remaining in the game and the Whirlettes enjoying a 53-41 lead, Floydada began to utilize a stall, both in its backcourt, and with the forwards.

Friona had a brief rally, cutting the margin to nine points, 53-45, with 4:30 left, but Floydada regained its over ten-point lead, and its stall worked to perfection the remainder of the game. The Squaws were forced to foul to break up the stall, and Floydada added to its lead each time.

Nine-year-old Jacquelyn Langford of Farwell, 11-year-old Rickie Seaton won the championship for the second straight year, and once again it was with a cross-bred barrow. Last year was the first in the show's history for a cross-bred entry to take the championship.

In fact, Lazbuddie entrants won five of the six breed championships in the barrow division, as well as two of three in the sheep division.

Other breed champs were shown by Seaton in Chester White, Brad Trieder for Hampshire, Theresa Seaton in Durocs.

The only non-Lazbuddie breed champion was exhibited by Friona's John Baker in the Berkshire division.

Reserve champion steer was shown by Gary Phipps, who last year made show history by showing both the grand and reserve champions. Phipps thus repeated with half of his championship.

Top lambs were shown by Carroll Foster, Bovina (Southdown), Wesley Barnes, Jr. of Lazbuddie (medium wool) and David Nelson of Lazbuddie (fine wool). Lazbuddie entrants won the top nine places in the fine wool division and the top five places in the medium wool class. Bovina youngsters dominated the Southdown division.

The top animals were auctioned off for more than \$23,000 in the sale on Saturday afternoon.

Friona State Bank bought the grand champion steer for 80 cents per pound. Friona Wheat Growers bought the reserve champion for 50 cents per pound. Both prices were comparable to last year's championships.

Foster Fertilizer of Lazbuddie was successful bidder on Seaton's grand champion barrow at \$1 per pound. Farmers Union Co-op of Lazbuddie bought Elliott's reserve champion for 61 cents per pound.

The champion sheep were bought by Oklahoma Lane Gin, Western "66" of Muleshoe and Lazbuddie and Sherley-Anderson's Lazbuddie elevator. All brought at least 80 cents per pound.

Once again good premiums were paid for the animals which made the sale, all the way down the list. The sale total was not far off last year's all-time record of \$28,708.97.

The floor price on the steers was won by Friona Feed Yard at \$24.00 cwt. Clovis Hog Company bid \$19.80 for the barrow floor, and King Brothers of Muleshoe bought the sheep at \$20.

**Williams' Contract Is Not Renewed**

Three Friona High School coaches received new two-year contracts, but Coach Mel Williams' contract was not renewed at the meeting of the school board Monday, February 13.

Williams, girls basketball coach at FHS the past three years, was completing a two-year contract. In three years as coach of the Squaws, Williams compiled a 70-24 win-loss record, as the team finished first, third and second in district.

The team record was not cited as a reason one way or the other for not renewing the contract, however.

Football coaches Don Light and Bob Owen, each completing two-year contracts, received

new two-year pacts. Cecil Maddox, boys basketball coach completing his first year, also was extended a two-year contract.

In other business, the school board approved a plan presented by the high school committee for academic achievement awards, to supplement awards currently being presented for athletic endeavors.

Reports were presented by Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr on the school budget of various funds.

Election of classroom teachers besides the coaches will take place at the next board meeting. The three principals and counselor Baker Duggins have another year to go on two-year contracts.

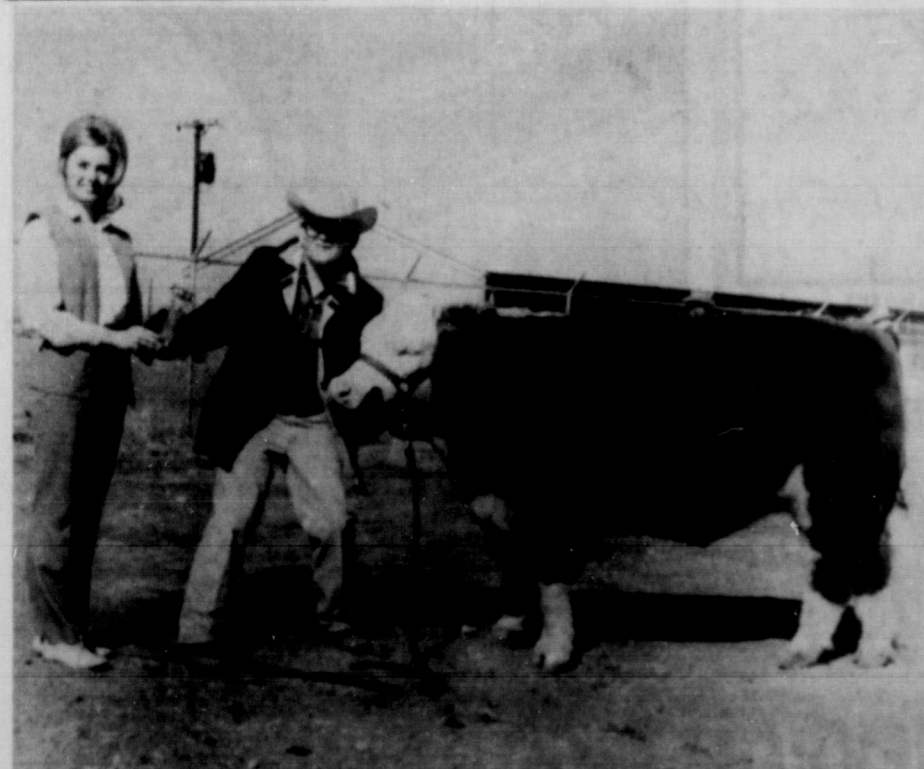

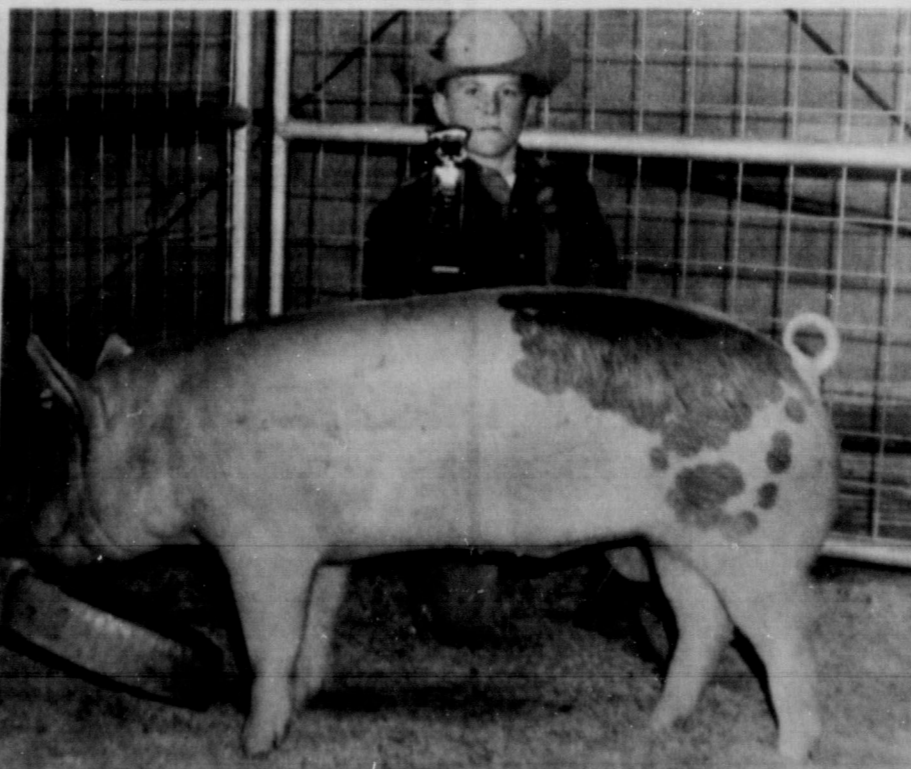

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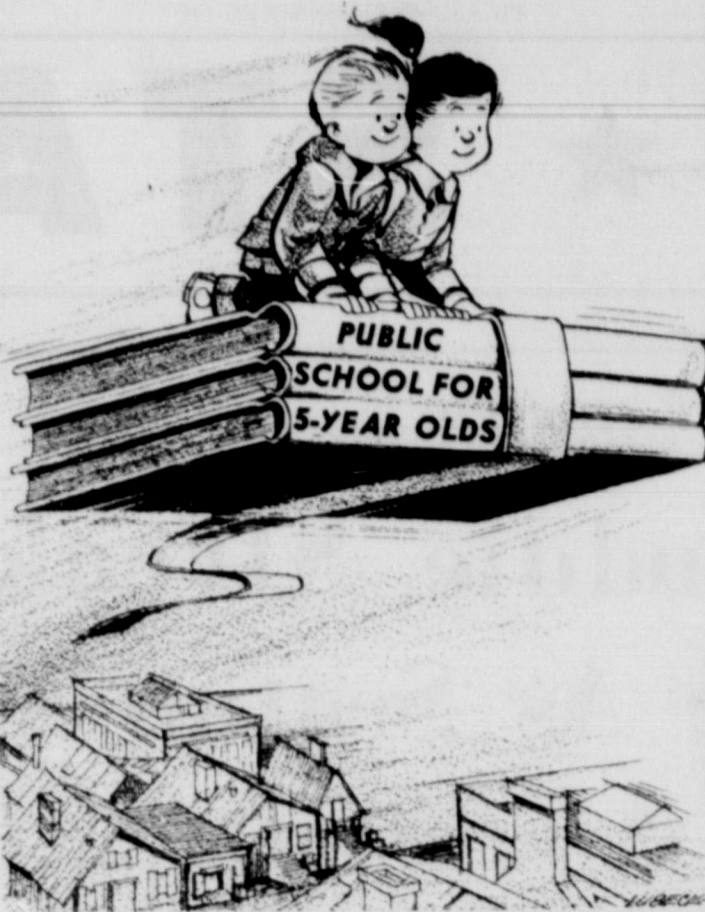

## 'Kindergarten' Program Is Seen As Benefiting Both Four And Five Year Olds

AUSTIN—If the 1967 Texas Legislature acts favorably on a proposal recommending free public schooling for 5-year-olds, 4-year-olds will also benefit.

Under a proposed plan for free, state-supported "kindergarten" that the 21-member elected State Board of Education has announced it will ask the Texas Legislature to enact, 4-year-olds could begin public school in September so long as they are five on or before the following January 1st.

The proposal was prepared for the State Board of Education by Texas Education Agency (TEA). It recommends that subject matter include social studies, science and "number concepts." The latter would be an early foundation for mathematics. In fact, number concepts are a part of mathematics.

With subject matter such as this recommended, it is easy to understand why calling the proposal a "kindergarten" plan is less than accurate.

### Support Grows

Support for the proposal has grown since the State Board

adopted it earlier this fall. The Texas State Teachers Association has given the idea its blessing and has agreed to support the measure when it is introduced in the Legislature next year.

The idea of earlier schooling is supported by a mass of evidence that in today's increasingly complex society, it is not only desirable but virtually essential that the schools take in those under age six.

"Research, experience, and technology," says Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education, "clearly indicate that age six is too late for children to begin their schooling."

TEA cites one researcher who has stated that 50 per cent of intelligence development takes place by the time the child is four years old, 30 per cent between four and eight and 20 per cent between ages eight and 17.

Therefore, thinks TEA, schooling must begin earlier than six.

### Not A Crash Program

If approved by the Legislature the program could go into effect for participating school districts as early as the opening of school next year.

## Jordan Leads FHS Basketball Records

Senior Bobby Jordan led the Friona Chieftain basketball team in three statistical departments, according to final season statistics released this week by Coach Cecil Maddox. Jordan edged fellow senior Ray Murphree in each case. He led in scoring average, 18.4 to 17.1; in field goal shooting, with 51 per cent to 50 per cent for Murphree and in free throws with 71 per cent to 69.

Both players scored well over 400 points, and are the first Chieftain basketballers to crack the 400 point total in a season in several years. Jordan scored 479 points in 26 games and Murphree scored 462 in 27. Jordan would doubtlessly have scored over 500 points had he not been injured late in the season. His point production fell off after the injury, as he had been averaging over

20 points per game. He wasn't able to even see action in the final game.

Murphree, meanwhile, salvaged one honor for himself by grabbing the most rebounds, 179 for the season, an average of 6.9 per game to lead the team. Eddie Wood was second with 143 rebounds and a 5.8 per game average.

Jordan had the highest individual game with 32 points scored against Lockney. Wood had 30 points for second best, against Abernathy here. Murphree's high was 28 points in the final game against Dimmitt.

As a team, the Chiefs averaged 56.2 points per game, to 53.1 for their opponents. The team had a season record of 18-9, posting a winning record for the third straight year.

"Industrial development has many times resulted from the actions of one individual. Just the slightest rumor has led, on many occasions, to the establishment of an industry which was economically important to a community. This type of approach will obviously lead to some blind alleys, but it is

equally obvious that, with the cooperation of all of us, it can also produce some valuable industrial prospects," Larry Milner, industrial development manager for Southwestern Public Service Company, said.

Plans for following up on the leads provided by the "Prosperity Through You" program call for an evaluation of the tip by local business leaders and then some type of contact with the prospect suggested by the local resident.

Southwestern Public Service Company announced establishment of a new industrial development department last fall. Since that time, the department has been accumulating economic information about communities in its service area in order that it will be able to provide industrial prospects with factual information. "Prosperity Through You" is the first program in what will be an expanded industrial development effort.

By applying techniques learned, club members will be able to recognize symptoms of "lazy eye blindness." Amblyopia is a condition in which an eye that appears healthy actually has low or poor vision. By the age of six the eye should have already learned to see, and if it has not, then it may be too late. Therefore, club members will be screening children four to six years of age.
