Rankin Schools join **Educational Center** 

In a special meeting, on July 15. Rankin Independent School District's Board of Trustees approved membership for the local system to participate in Title III, West Texas Education Center, with the beginning of the

Rankin County Hospital District, at their recent budget hearing, announced a reduction in the tax rate statements that will cover next year's operating budget from 48 cents on the \$100 valuation to 43 cents despite an approximate 6 percent increase in the budget over the current one. period of May 1, 1967 through April 30, 1968 amounted to \$96 .-338.03 with \$17.202.16 of this amount coming from Medicare. This left a total of \$79,135.87 as compared with \$55,554.19 for the previous twelve months.

This money, along with tax collections in the amounts of \$131,547.97, enabled the Board of Directors of the district to return a surplus of 025,000.00 into the upcoming operations, account ing in part for the reduction in the tax rate. Total budgeted operations for the coming year are set at \$199.769.35, up from the \$166.345.13 approved for last year and the \$198,524.41 actually spent on operations. This represents an increase of \$1,244.94, or 6 percent, over what was actually spent last year.

Proposals for raising the necessary money for the 1968-69 operations include an anticipated patient revenue of \$75,000.00, the \$25,000.00 surplus and \$99,769.35 in tax money.

Other information contained in the budget as presented at the hearing showed that the hospital had a total of 264 patients last year with 29, or roughly 10 percent of these being Medicare. Full time employees numbered 16 and 8 were part-time emp-

# **Publication Made on** Proposed State

Amendments

With this issue, publication of seven of the lourteen proposed amenaments to the State constitution are being published. In order to cut down on the cost of publication, the amendment proposais are published in their entirety only once in each county in Texas. For that reason, half are published in Rankin, half in McCamey.

Readers are urged to made, a thorough study of these proposals between now and General Election time when they will appear on the bailot. These-or portions of them-will definitely become a part of our laws in Texas if past amendment elections are any indication. Voters usually approve well over half of all constitutional amendments offered for their consideration.

In addition to the publications made by the state, there will be numerous comments on the proposals between now and election time. Also available at the News office is a booklet explaining the pros and cons of each amendment. It is free for the asking.

### **Dove Population** Takes Drop in Area

In a word, Rankin shooters will have to work for what they get this year in the upcoming dove shoot season.

Morning dove hunters should find plenty of birds when the season opens despite an indication of 12 percent decrease in the breeding population, according to Ted L. Clark, biologist in charge of the state-wide morning dove research project for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Clark says he finds the decrease "significant," but hunters should be able to locate doves."

"This is the third year in which the Texas breeding population has shown a decline. A fall census, however, may indicate a slight increase in the dove population because of the excellent breeding conditions which exist this year," Clark said.

Several ecological areas around the State show increases in the breeding populations, according to Clark.

These are: Gulf Prairies and marshes; Post Oak Savannah, Rolling Plains and High Plains.

The areas which indicate decreases in population are: Piney Woods, Blackland Prairies, South Texas Plains, Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos.

The population in the North Zone, which lies north of a line running roughly from Kenney County on the Rio Grande to Shelby County on the Sabine River, had an indicated population decline of seven per cent. The South Zone, which lies to the south of the line, had an indicated decline of 21 per cent.

Clark said he thought the decline in the South Zone especially significant since it comes after an indicated 16 per cent decrease in 1967.

# KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

HUMID WEATHER HARD ON PECAN CROP-

Powdery mildew on pecans is becoming an increasing problem

This is due largely to the humid weather that has prevailed over much of the state this year. The disease usually does not present much of a problem but this year, due to the consistent rainfall over large portions of Texas, powdery mildew is a continuing problem.

The disesase is easily recognized by the white, powdery growth which partially or completely covers the developing nut.

Protective fungicide used for pecan scab control, such as Du-Ter, Cyprex and Dithane M-45. will also help surpress powdery mildew.

These materials should be applied on a two to three weeks interval until the disease is no longer visible.

Another disease affecting pecan growers is pecan scorch. This too, is due to the large amounts of rainfall.

Pecan scorch is a physiological disease brought on by an imbalance of moisture-either too much or too little. It causes the leaves to turn brown in between the veins, appearing to be burnt.

The disease occurs randomly in the trees and may affect one differently from another.

Only control would be to maintain moisture balance under the tress through the use of irrigation.

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.


The Grand Master and Mr. Boulware showed slides of the home for the aged at Ennis and the childrens' home at Corsicana.
