Registrations over the entire system are expected to be about the same as at the close of school

last May. High School enrollment may be down a little but gains in the other two schools will probably bring up totals.

Lions Broom Sale to be Held Monday

Monday, August 26 will be the date for the annual Rankin Lions Club Broom Sale. Starting early Monday morning with the arrival of a van at the lot next to the Post Office, sales are to continue throughout the day, and in the afternoon after school is out, the Boy Scouts will join in the effort and a door-to-door sale will be made throughout the residential area of Rankin.

All merchandise in the sale comes from the Texas Home of the Blind in which blind people manufacture goods for sale through these "Blind Shop Caravans". A portion of the money goes to help Texas blind people become self supporting and a portion is retained by the local Lions for their civic work.

Thoroughly familiar to Rankin residents, the Broom Sale has been an annual event here for more than ten years. The usual assortment of products such as brooms, mops, brushes, ironing board covers and pads, door mats, etc. will be offered.

"This is a good chance to help a very worthwhile cause and to get your needed household items at the same time," said Travis Bely, chairman of this year's sale.

"The people of the Rankin area have always been generous in their support and we know that we can expect good results again this year," he said.

Fly Problem Bad --

Texas chalked up 37 more screwworm cases Wednesday and 40 on Tuesday to push the mid-week total to a record 152 cases. The state's total for 1968 has zoomed to the 1,716-mark as the costly livestock pest continues to plague livestock industry leaders.

Nationally, 1,990 of the outbreaks have been confirmed this year in the southwestern United States, and the current epidemic is expected to push the count over the 2000-mark Thursday, officials at the Mission Screwworm Eradication Lab announced.

Arizona had two more cases confirmed in Yavapai County on Wednesday to bring the state's total of an even 200 for the year. No new cases have been reported this week in either New Mexico or California. California has recorded 59 cases this season and New Mexico, 15, for the year.

Brooks County, in South Texas, continues to report the most cases with five on Tuesday and five more Wednesday. Reporting three cases each on Wednesday were Starr and Live Oak; while Terrell, San Patricio and Bee reported three on Tuesday. Pecos County reported four on Wednesday and two Tuesday. Two cases each were recorded on Tuesday in Hidalgo, Val Verde, Starr, Brewster and Edwards. On Wednesday, Kenedy, Val Verde, Kimble and Jim Hogg each had two confirmed cases.

Single cases Wednesday were recorded in Hidalgo, Aransas, Terrell, Presidio, Mason, Kleberg, Bee, Goliad and Karnes, along

with a new county Midland.

Livestock owners are urged to be on the alert for additional cases as large buildups of native fertile flies have occurred in many cases where reporting is slow. All preventive measures — such as spraying herds and treating all animal wounds — should be used.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas, the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR2)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to exempt from ad valorem taxation State of Texas and political subdivisions real property on which the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

Peach Picking no Hit or Miss Task

BY LOU JEFFERS
County Home Demo. Agent

Watch for ripeness when select-
ing peaches but don't be
fooled by the "blush" on peach-
es—this is not an indication of
ripeness.

The background color is more
important: it should be a creamy
to gold color. A green back-
ground color indicates that the
peach was immature when pick-

ed. Such peaches lack flavor
and will never ripen well.

It takes about three medium-
size peaches to weight a pound.
A pound of peaches will yield a-
bout two cups sliced or one cup
of pulp.

Many of the peaches coming
to market have been hydrocooled
and defuzzed — you can enjoy
eating them with the peel or
just as you eat apples. After you
buy peaches, sort them for ripe-
ness. Those with a "tinge" of
green can be ripened at room
temperature away from sunlight.
Store fully ripe peaches in the
refrigerator.

When you buy peaches in large
quantities, sort daily and select
ripe ones for immediate use or
refrigeration.

Peaches are popular for salads
and desserts—try fruit cups, cus-
tards, puddings, pies, cobblers,
shortcakes, ice cream or other
frozen desserts.

NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:

throughout the state on the
first Tuesday after the first
Monday in November, 1968, at
which election all ballots shall
have printed thereon the fol-
lowing:

"FOR the constitutional
amendment fixing the time
during which members of
the Legislature shall be in-
eligible to hold other of-
fices."

"AGAINST the constitu-
tional amendment fixing the
time during which members
of the Legislature shall be
ineligible to hold other of-
fices."

If it appears from the re-
turns of such election that a
majority of the votes cast
therein are for such amend-
ment, same shall become a part
of the Constitution of Texas.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 24,

In April, 1967—or thereabouts,
the post office went out of the
business of postal savings. They
made an effort to get all the
people who had deposits in this
form to cash them in but appar-
ently a lot of people were not
paying attention.

A recent notice from the Tex-
as Press Association says the
Post Office Department has un-
claimed millions of dollars be-
longing to 500,000 former postal
savings system depositors. This
money just sits. It hasn't earned
any interest since April, 1967.
Pretty soon now, unclaimed sav-
ings are scheduled to go to the
Treasury and said depositors will
be left holding the bag—empty.

If you have such savings, or

if Grandma Jones or Aunt Bes-
sie have any, better round 'em
up and get their money.

A VOTE--

The following comments in no
way, shape, form or fashion are
to be taken as a slander toward
our local post office people. They
have always been "Number One"
with me and The News and are
a help whenever they are able.
They do their job—by the book,
and would get canned if they did
otherwise.

But the comment that I want
to make is that the Post Office
Department is a sad sack.

While every business that is
still in business is looking for
and finding ways to cut back on

overhead—even to cutting down
on help, the Post Office Depart-
ment recently told Congress to
go soak its head when the
lawmakers ordered all govern-
ment departments to save some
money.

It's interesting to me to note
that the Rankin Post office and
the Rankin News do about the
same gross volume of business
each year. The News is operated
by me and the wife and we
manage to pay most of our bills
and keep the wolf from the door.
The local post office has more
employees and—if it's like the
rest of the Department—loses
money each year—has been for
years and will continue to do
so.

Again I say, this is no reflec-
tion on Grace and her folk. They
do as they're told and the Pos-
tal Department will tell any who
are so brash as to question their
operation that theirs is a service
organization — not designed to
make money; not designed to
break even. All to which the
question arises: "Why not?"

What would be wrong with the
post office paying its own way?
Why is it that postal rates go
up almost every six months
while the Department loses more
money each year and the service
gets more out of date?

Why can't the Post Office De-
partment be operated under a
corporation set-up as recently
suggested? Why couldn't Rankin
Post Office be leased to individ-
uals? It would make a pretty
nice man and wife operation.

Or could it be that such
champions of free enterprise as
our good, loyal, honest, neat and
clean Senior Senator Ralphie
Yarborough and others of his
 ilk do not want to dry up that vast
reservoir of Federally supported
votes—did I say Federally sup-
ported—excuse me, — supported
by tax payers—who usually vote
right down the line for people
in Congress who look after them
and their jobs?

Naw. It couldn't be anything
like that at all.

Probably the Post Office De-
partment will answer me right
soon from Washington—unless it
comes a shower somewhere up
on Highway 20 in which case the
mobile post office won't be able
to make connections and this
issue of the News will take its
usual ten days to two weeks to
reach Washington.

At the turn of the century, it
would have made the trip in a-
bout four or five days.

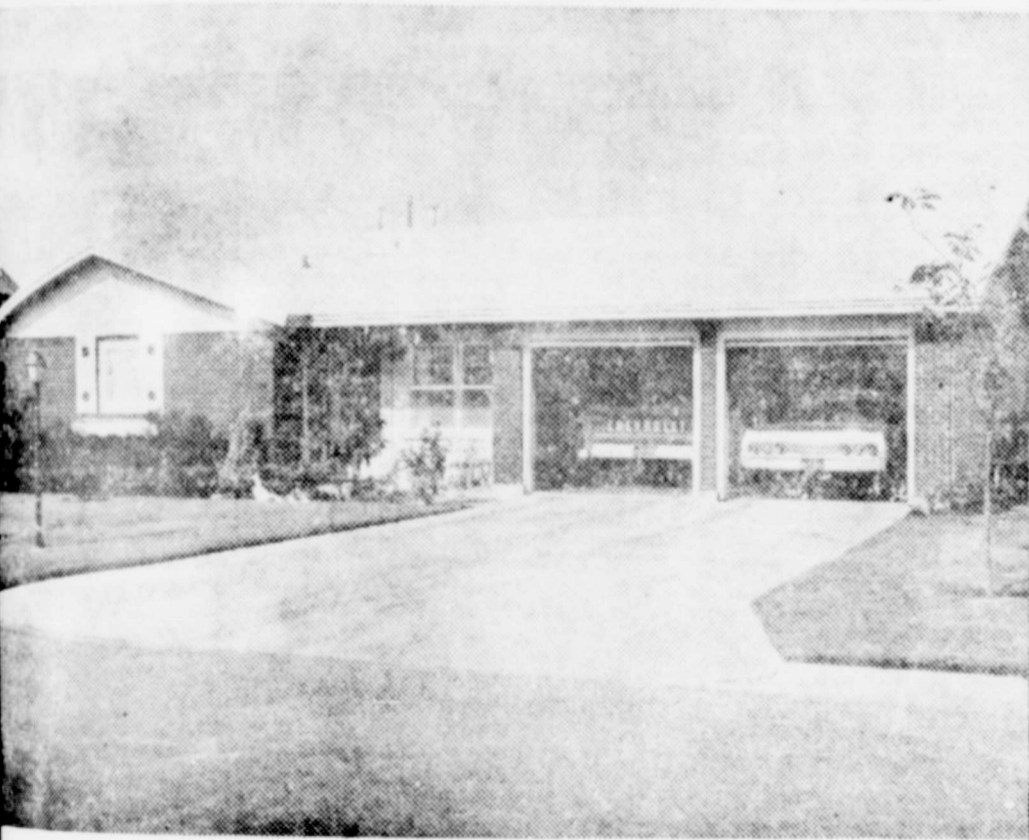
