

Seek Bids On Club Building

Plans for Friona's Country Club building have been completed, and within the next week the board of directors will start seeking bids on the structure.

At a general meeting of country club members Tuesday night, in which only 15 members attended, the building plans were shown to the group, and there was a discussion on the proposed plans and just where the club stood in its efforts to complete the golf course and club house.

The proposed club house, on which bids will be sought, will be constructed of brick veneer. Overall dimensions will be a 41x82 feet, and the club house will include a 40x52-foot social room, pro shop, cloak room, kitchen, and rest rooms.

Amount of money earmarked for the structure is \$25,000.

Before a bid is let on the building, however, another general meeting will be held at which time the membership will decide on what activities the building will be used for.

It was the opinion of several club members present at Tuesday's meeting that this be worked out prior to letting a contract.

The by-laws of the club stipulate only that alcoholic beverages and gambling will not be permitted. Other activities, such as dancing, have not yet been decided upon.

A motion was passed by the club members, authorizing the president of the board of directors, Andy Hurst, to appoint a committee to work up recommendations on what the club can be used for, and present them at the next general meeting for a vote.

Hurst, who led the discussion at Tuesday's meeting, re-

ported that the club currently has 101 members, and an additional 22 members were needed to raise the necessary \$58,000, proposed costs of the club's facilities.

The breakdown on what the money will be used for was \$18,000 for the land on which the club house and golf course will be located, \$15,000 for the golf course, and \$25,000 for the club house.

Most of the work on the golf course, which included installation of a well and irrigation pipes, and work on the greens and fairways, has been completed. Money spent to date, totals about \$14,000, Hurst said.

Hurst also reported that the board of directors was planning another membership drive in the immediate future in an attempt to gain the additional members.

On hand for the installation ceremony was Ed Skypala, Lions Club zone chairman of Hereford. He was the installing officer.

At the meeting, Danny Mac Bainum, retiring treasurer of the club, gave a financial report, and listed the various money-raising activities and civic undertakings the club had participated in during the past year.

The club also voted to accept the challenge of the Dimmitt Lions Club to a softball game in which all players will be to wear women's clothes. The first game will be played at Dimmitt and the second one will be in Friona. Dates and times for both games will be announced later.

Auto Insurance Rates To Go Up

Parmer County's automobile owners can look forward to an approximate 15 per cent increase in insurance rates, effective August 1, according to local insurance men.

The rate hike is in line with recent announcement from the Texas Insurance Board, ordering the increased rates across the state.

Comprehensive, collision and liability rates will all be increased, the insurance men point out.

Chief reason for the raise is largely due to miscalculations made when the rate structure was changed January 1, 1960. At that time it was estimated that around 50 per cent of the state's drivers would come in for an increase in rates rather than a reduction.

It was found out, however, that a much larger number of drivers were eligible for the lowest possible rate under the Safe Driving Insurance Plan.

Under this plan, penalties were assessed

for traffic violations and reductions were given to persons who qualified as "safe drivers."

Statistics prove that this program has brought about a loss in premium revenue for agents and companies of approximately \$28 million.

With the rate increase, it is estimated that the deficit will be erased, with about \$30 million to be picked up annually.

One change in the new rate structure will be to the slight advantage of the insurance purchaser, it is pointed out.

Henceforth, minor traffic violations such as running stop signs, which had previously caused penalties, will no longer do so.

Other minor infractions along this line will also be dropped from the list, leaving such items as speeding, reckless driving, driving while intoxicated, and more serious offenses as infractions which will result in penalties.

Two Titles Wrapped Up Herring, Motors Win All-Star Game Set

Two championships have already been determined and the third will be decided either tonight (Thursday) or Friday in the Friona summer baseball program.

Herring Implement Company won two games this past week to win the title in the Babe Ruth League, while previously unbeaten Hub Grain was losing two, to drop to second.

Herring handed Hub its first loss this week, and also defeated Chester & Fleming Gin, to finish with a 5-1 record. Besides losing to Herring, Hub also lost to Parmer County Implement and finished with a 4-2 record.

Also winning the championship this past week was Friona

Motors in Pee Wee action. The Motors team defeated Rockwell, Ehrldge-Spring and Parmer County Pump to finish with a 7-1 record. Friona Consumers was second with a 5-3 mark.

The Intermediate League championship could be decided tonight (Thursday) when Brookfield Drilling plays Associated Growers. A win for Brookfield would give them an 8-2 record and the title.

However, should Growers win, and then Friona State Bank defeat Reeve Chevrolet, a three-way tie will result between Brookfield, Bank and Growers, each team having a 7-3 record.

Vernon Scott, director of the baseball program, says he does not know what kind of playoff will be worked out should the three teams tie.

Drake To Visit Austria As Feed Grain Consultant

Arthur M. Drake, manager of Friona Wheat Growers, Inc., has been selected by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association to be a feed grain consultant at two agricultural fairs in Austria, during August.

Drake, who is the second Parmer County man to be selected for such a mission in recent years, will leave Friona shortly after August 1 for Washington, D. C., where he will receive a briefing on his trip.

He will then continue on to Europe where he will attend showings of a mobile feed grain exhibit of the U. S. Feed Grains Council and Foreign Agricultural Services, at Klagenfurt, Austria, August 10-20, and Ried, Austria, August 26 to September 3.

Drake will be an assistant to the director of the U. S. feed grains exhibit, who is already in Austria getting things set up.

The feed grain exhibit, and Drake's activities as a consultant while in Austria, are designed to stress the availability and quality of grain sorghum and other U. S. Feed

Four Wrecks Last Week In Friona

Four minor collisions occurred in Friona last week, it was reported this week by the Friona Police Department.

There were no injuries, but there was considerable damage to some of the vehicles involved in the collisions, which occurred on separate days, Tuesday through Saturday.

The first one was Tuesday afternoon, July 12, in front of the Friona Star office when a 1957 Chevrolet station wagon, driven by Pudge Kendrick, collided with a 1961 Ford, driven by Eddie Massie.

Kendrick was travelling west on Sixth Street when his vehicle collided with the Ford which was backing away from a curb. The right-hand side of Kendrick's car scraped the bumper of the Ford.

Damage to the Kendrick vehicle was estimated at \$400. Massie's car received no damage.

In a freak accident Wednesday afternoon, a 1952 Plymouth, driven by Claude Wright of Phoenix, Arizona, hit the back of a 1961 Ford pickup parked in front of Herring Implement.
