I am hereby coming to the defense of the Southwestern Public Service Representative here in Friona, I feel that a great many people are on my side in so doing. Mr. Outland is tops in my book. He gets out in the WORST weather in order to repair and keep the service going here in Friona, To be without electricity for any period of time is an inconvenience but most of us have managed to live through it in the past. And most of us will survive the inconvenience in the future. I can count on one hand (and have fingers left over) how many times we have had to be without electricity for more than 30 minutes here in town. There are towns that I can recall that went without electricity for a day or more this past winter but Friona wasn't one of them, We did have a day this past winter when we were inconvenienced for about an hour or so but we managed to live through that, too. Did you know that Mr. Outland went to Bovina that day and switched us over to a line from Clovis so that we would not be inconvenienced any more than was necessary??

We, in our block, were without electricity for a couple of hours about 2 weeks ago and that was only because lightning had hit in the alley just as the storm was getting started. Did you know that Mr. Outland was out fixing the line while it was still lightning around?? Did you know that he was out earlier that same night fixing a line at a private residence that had been hit by lightning so that particular party would not have to be too inconvenienced?? Did you know, that he finally had to give it up and go home because he was soaking wet??

These are just a few instances where Mr. Outland has been known to be doing his job and doing it to the best of his ability. NO ONE is perfect, not even

Just one last note-- I've heard it said and believe it's true, "When you point your finger at someone (or something), remember that there are three others pointing right back at YOU! For a change, try saying something NICE about someone. You'd be amazed at what a good feeling it will give you.

Babies Should Be Kept Cool During Summer

of Texas summers, most of us can do something to get some relief -- take a cool shower, wear light clothes, find a shady spot or sit in front of the air conditioner.

But babies are not so selfsufficient. They are dependent upon mother to help them beat

The human body constantly produces heat and so must constantly lose it to be compatible with life. Evaporation of sweat cools the body and this process is aided by circulating air. Also, physical exercise increases the amount of heat produced and in turn must be lost.

With these facts in mind, mother can do a lot to make baby comfortable in hot weather -- and she'll have a healthier baby if she does.

Baby should be placed in the coolest spot possible. The crib or playpen should be placed in a good circulation spot -- in the middle of the room or near a window or door, If outdoors, place the baby in the shade. Placing an electric fan in the

room increases the circulation of air around him. This should be done whenever the temperature exceeds 84 degrees and

During the sweltering heat there is little or no breeze. But be sure the fan is out of reach of inquisitive hands.

If an air conditioner is used, it should be set about 78 degrees and adjusted so that the cold air does not blow directly on the baby.

When shopping on hot days, never leave the baby in the car. Temperature rises to dangerous levels inside a car parked in the sun in a very short time.

Clothing is important. In temperatures below 80 degrees the usual clothing may be worn, but with temperatures between 80 and 92 degrees, just a diaper is sufficient. But when the heat goes over the 92 mark, baby should wear a cotton shirt to absorb perspiration.

The more active the baby, the less clothing is needed at the same air temperature. It helps to change the position of a small baby occasionally.

Plenty of liquids should be offered the baby on hot days -at room temperature -- and don't worry if the baby seems to lose his appetite a little.

Most babies love a bath, Several a day will help to keep him cool, if the temperature is over 90 degrees, partially drying the baby will have an additional cooling effect.

A bath before napping will help the baby to fall asleep easier.


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
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

Ex-Frionan Writes Of Life In Thailand

PFC Billy Parker, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Parker of Frione, is with the 27th Inf. Wolfhounds in Thailand, Asia.

While stationed in Oahee, Hawaii, the 27th division was sent to Thailand early in May when Thailand was threatened by the Red Chinese Communists in Laos. The boys are approximately 11,500 miles from home. Here the Americans are treated with much respect.

Billy writes that there are so many more insects and snakes and the climate is very hot. The Monsoon season is in July, August and September and the boys build their bamboo huts several feet off the ground.

Billy states, "It is funny to awaken to an elephant's cry instead of a rooster's crow." Nine Thai soldiers were killed by a wild elephant not far from the boys camp in the jungle. Roads are just beaten paths.

There, 50¢ is worth \$5,00 dollars here. Places to eat are unclean and the soldiers are allowed to eat only their own provisions.

All of the work is done by the women, and the main religion is Buddha worship. The temples are huge and trimmed

July 22-28 is National Farm Safety Week and the theme for this year is "Family Safety At Work and Play".

This theme should be a vearround goal for all of us in Parmer County. Consider the sobering fact that agriculture is the most hazardous industry in the nation in so far as total number of deaths of workers are concerned. Farm people suffer 11,300 fatal accidents each year. Of this total, approximately 3300 deaths occur as occupationalor work accidents. At the present time the death rate of farm workers stands at 58 deaths per year per 100,000 workers. This is the highestoccupational death rate in the nation.

Sixty five per cent of all fatal traffic accidents occur within 25 miles of home, maybe this is because we become familiar with our surroundings, perhaps too familiar.

In driving the same automobile or tractor over the same roads countless times we tend our ability to handle any situation. We let down protective and begin to take chances.
