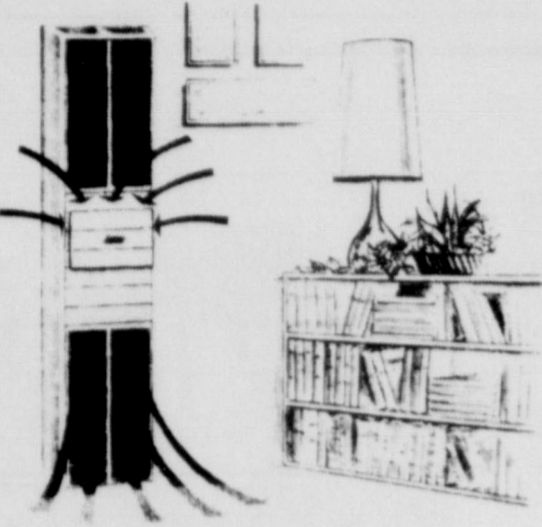

IN C. C. C. LOAN

Federal Regulations Defining "Eligible Grain Sorghum" State:

Grain sorghums containing over 13% moisture shall not be eligible for the loan, except under the following conditions:

- (1) Grain sorghums containing from 13.1% to 15% moisture will be eligible for loan provided the warehouseman agrees to deliver grain to CCC containing not in excess of 14% moisture.
- (2) Grain sorghums containing from 15.1% to 18% moisture will be eligible for loan provided the warehouseman agrees to deliver grain to CCC containing not in excess of 13% moisture, and provided that the warehouse receipt shall represent the ACTUAL QUANTITY of grain remaining after drying to 13% moisture.

To Comply With These Regulations, The Undersigned Elevators Have Adopted The Following Policy:

Grain containing up to 15% moisture - No shrinkage

Grain containing 15.1% to 18% moisture - Shrinkage deducted down to a 13% moisture basis

Grain in excess of 18 per cent moisture is classed as sample grade by CCC and is not eligible for CCC loan even though dried to 13 per cent moisture.

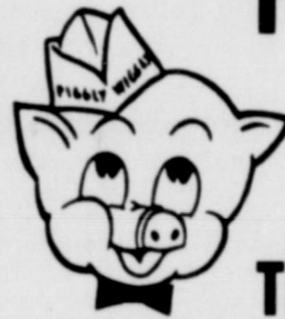

COWBOY SPEEDSTER RUNS WILD

Plains Cowboys Come Up With Another Pistol Pete

West Texas State has Pistol Pete Pedro, and the Plains Cowboys had his high school counterpart, as far as the Friona Chiefs were concerned last Friday night.

He is Ronny Hendricks, like Pedro small at 150 pounds, and also like the Buffalo star, hard to bring down when he gets into gear.

Hendricks was a one-man gang in last week's Friona-Plains battle. In an eye-popping exhibition, Hendricks scored five touchdowns and booted an extra point as the Cowboys swamped the Chiefs, 51-0.

The senior speedster carried the ball 24 times for an amazing 332 yards, which comes out to 13.8 yards per carry. His touchdowns came on runs of 45, 78, 10, four and 56 yards.

Led by Hendricks' grand total, Plains racked up 475 yards rushing, and 549 total yards. Friona had 130 net yards rushing, and added 62 yards

passing for 192 yards total offense.

Although the point spread was as great as it was, Plains had only seven more first downs than did Friona, 19-12. The Chiefs missed out on three chances to score, after mustered drives into Cowboy territory.

Friona started out like they were going to make a game of it. Everett Gee returned the opening kickoff from his 19 to the 41-yard line. With Gee carrying four times for 23 yards, the Chiefs moved the ball to the Plains 26 in only six plays, but lost the ball on a fumble.

The Chiefs almost held Plains on their first offensive try, but a penalty for roughness on fourth down enabled the Cowboys to continue their first scoring drive. Penalties had put Plains in a fourth down and 15 situation on their own 42, when Friona drew the untimely red flag.

On the first play following the penalty, Hendricks broke into

the clear, and scampered down the sidelines 45 yards to the game's first touchdown. Fullback Tetum Perrin ran for two extra points and an 8-0 Plains lead.

Friona took the kick and once again began a drive. The Chiefs put the ball in play from their own 16. Quarterback Gary Renner's running and passing sparked the team to four first downs in the drive, but it also was stymied.

Renner picked up 12 yards, passed to halfback Doug Dodd for eight, and ran for another first down on a nine-yard gain to the Plains 47. Gee picked up another first down with a 13-yard run, and after Tommy Baxter picked up nine yards, Gee made another first to the Plains 26.

Renner got it to the 20 on a keeper, but there luck ran out and Plains took over on their 23. It didn't stay there long. On the second play, Hendricks scooted 78 yards, and the running conversion by Roland Faires made it 16-0, and the

Cowboys were on their way. With a stiff wind to his back, fullback S. D. Baize booted what must rank as one of the longest punts in Chieftain history early in the second period. Kicking from his own 27-yard line, he got the ball up into the wind, and it sailed and bounced all the way to the other goal line -- 73 yards!

As luck would have it, though, Hendricks was the man who picked up the punt. He took it on his own one, stepped back into the end zone momentarily, then sped upfield 47 yards before Doug Dodd finally upended him--the last man between the fleet Hendricks and a 100-yard runback.

Friona held a Plains drive on their own five, and it appeared that they might get by with a 16-0 halftime deficit, when the Chiefs recovered a Cowboy fumble on their own 13 after having to punt. But a Renner pass was intercepted by--you guessed it--Hendricks.

With just 34 seconds left in the half, the Plains jackrabbit scored his third TD of the game, and the Cowboys led, 22-0. Friona was still trying as the half-time gun sounded. Gee returned the kick to midfield, Baxter ran 17 yards, then Gee connected on a pass to Dodd for 21 yards as the half ended, with the Chiefs on the Plains 21-yard line.

Perrin got the scoring started in the second half, with a six yard romp for a 29-0 Plains lead.

A short Friona punt, this time into the wind, led to another Plains score from the Friona 35. It took the Cowboys just six plays, with Hendricks getting his fourth TD from the four, his shortest scoring run of the night.

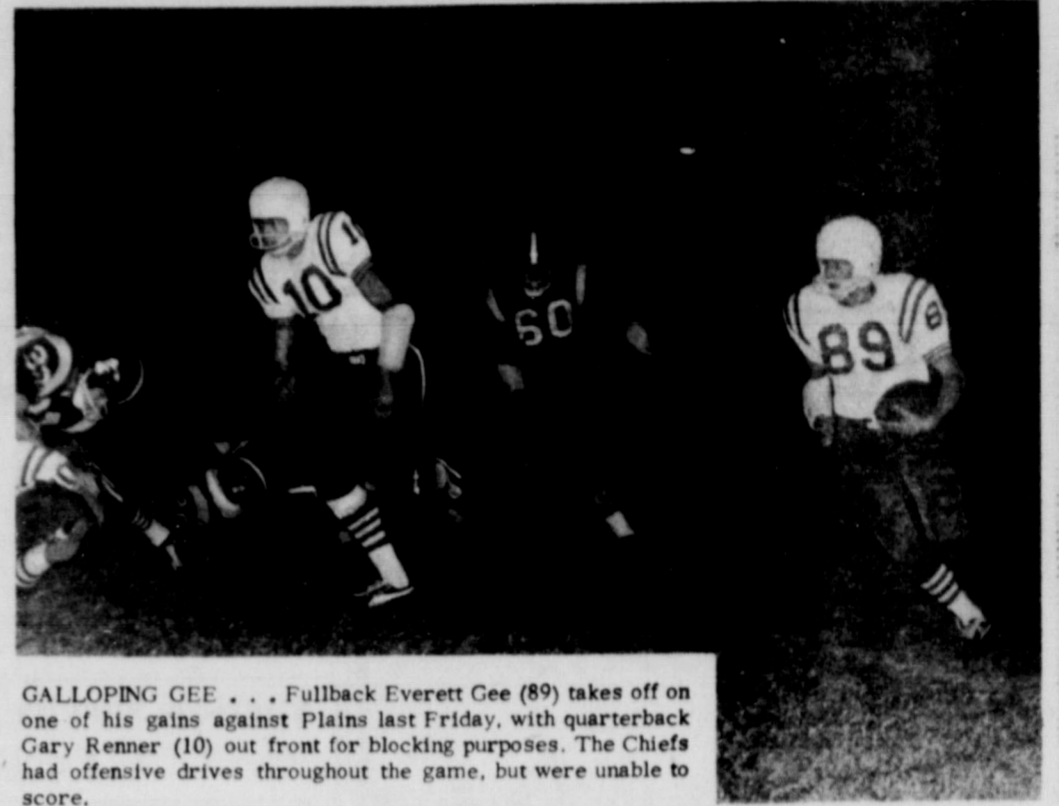
After the kickoff, Renner was

dropped on his own one-yard line on a passing attempt, and on the fourth quarter's first play, Gee was trapped in the end zone for a safety and a 36-0 Plains lead.

Five plays later, Plains was faced with a fourth down situation on their own 44-yard line. They had not had to kick all night. The Cowboys lined up in punt formation, but Hendricks took the snap and decided six points were better than a punt, and raced 56 yards to score his fifth TD of the night, just to prove that he could do about anything. Hendricks booted the point for a 43-0 score.

The Chiefs missed their best chance to score when Gee gave them a first and goal situation on the Plains one. Here the Cowboys buckled down, and took the ball over four plays later on their 11.

Just to put icing on the cake, Faires capped the Cowboys' final drive with a five-yard scoring run, and J. B. Wilson's run made it 51-0.

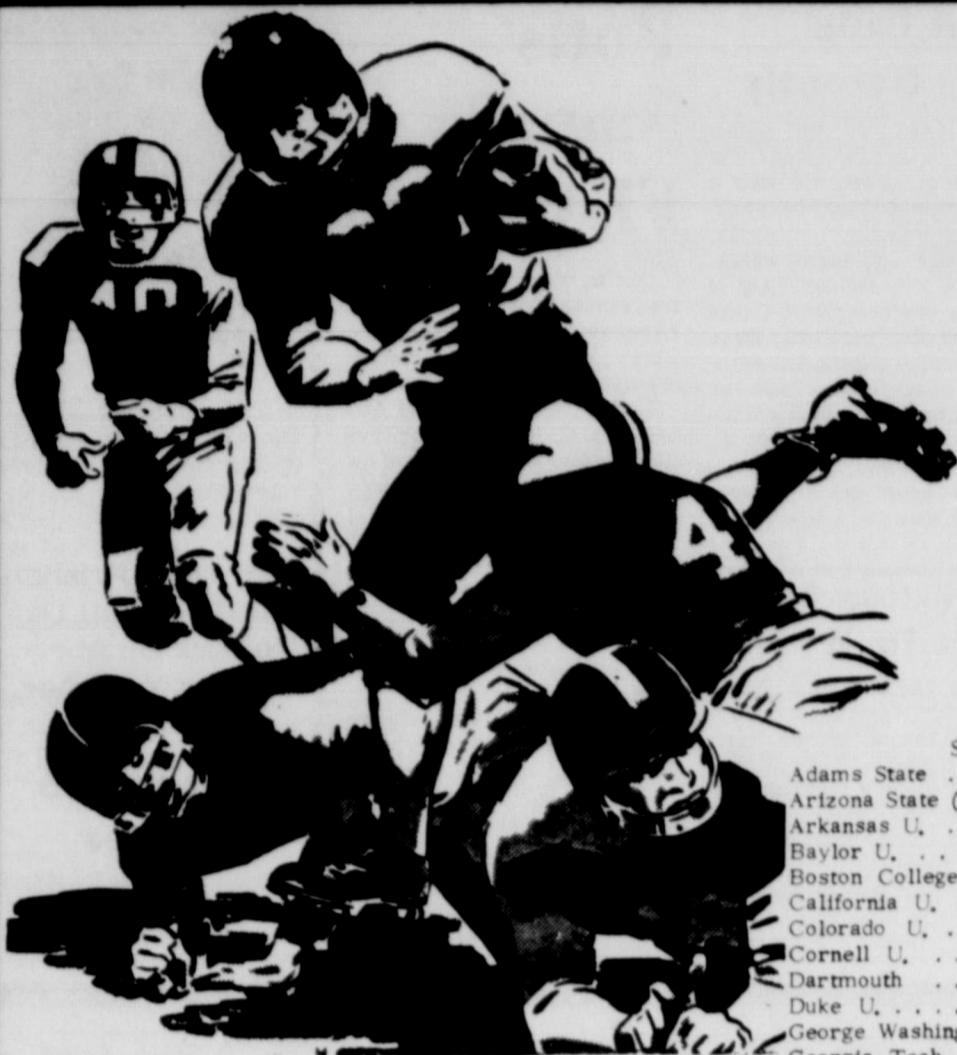

Rains Delay County's Predicted Record Harvest

THE HIGH PLAINS FARM AND HOME

The light but steady rainfall which blanketed Farmer County beginning early Monday put a damper on the infant harvest season this week.

Actually, the moisture was a boon to wheat farmers, who found it "just what the doctor ordered" for their winter wheat. And, unless the rain got much heavier, or became prolonged in nature, row crops weren't expected to suffer much.

But farmers were nevertheless anxious for clearing

skies, so they could get on with the harvest of what has been predicted by some to be the county's best maize and cotton crops in history.

Only a very small percentage of grain has been harvested at this early date, but what has come in bears out yield predictions.

Herb Potts, manager of Worley Grain Company in Farwell, said indications were pointing to a better year this year. "Only one farmer that I know of has harvested an entire field, and his maize averaged 7,400 pounds per acre," he said. Johnny Williams, manager of Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator in Farwell, said he thought his area should produce about the same amount of milo as last year. About the current rain's effect on the crop, Williams said "Most of the

grain is too wet to harvest now anyway, so these showers shouldn't hurt it much."

Another Farwell grain man, Pat Patrick of Kelly Green Seeds, said, "This year's crop looks better to me than it did last year."

Preach Cranfill, manager of Friona's Continental Elevator, said that L. R. Hand, who farms east of town, had harvested 24 acres and it harvested 7200 pounds per acre.

"It looks like we're going to have a good year," said Arthur Drake of Farmer's Elevator in Friona. "I wouldn't be surprised if we came up with some of the best yields we've ever had," he continued.

Drake added that the rain hadn't hurt anything yet, and unless it continued for an indefinite period, the Friona area should be in for quite a harvest.

Why Do Shoe Salesmen Always Look Into Old Shoes?

Shoe salesmen look at the size of the old shoes so they won't have to take the time and trouble to measure the child's feet. The fast way to sell shoes is to leave the measuring device on the hook.

Shoe fitters look in the old shoe to see the footprint. If the width of the old shoe was ample he will see five toe prints. If the shoe was narrow or the last of the shoe swung in too sharply he will see the print of only four toes. The little toe is crowded off the base of the shoe.

If a child measures between one size and the next half size, the shoefitter can know from the footprint which size to recommend. A child, may measure just over size 7, for instance, but the footprint shows that his old 6 1/2's were very full of feet so the shoefitter can recommend 7 1/2 even though they seem a little too big at the time.

Special workshops were held for each of the delegates in civil defense, recreation, citizenship, family life, health and safety, and 4-H. The training from these workshops will be used in programs in the home

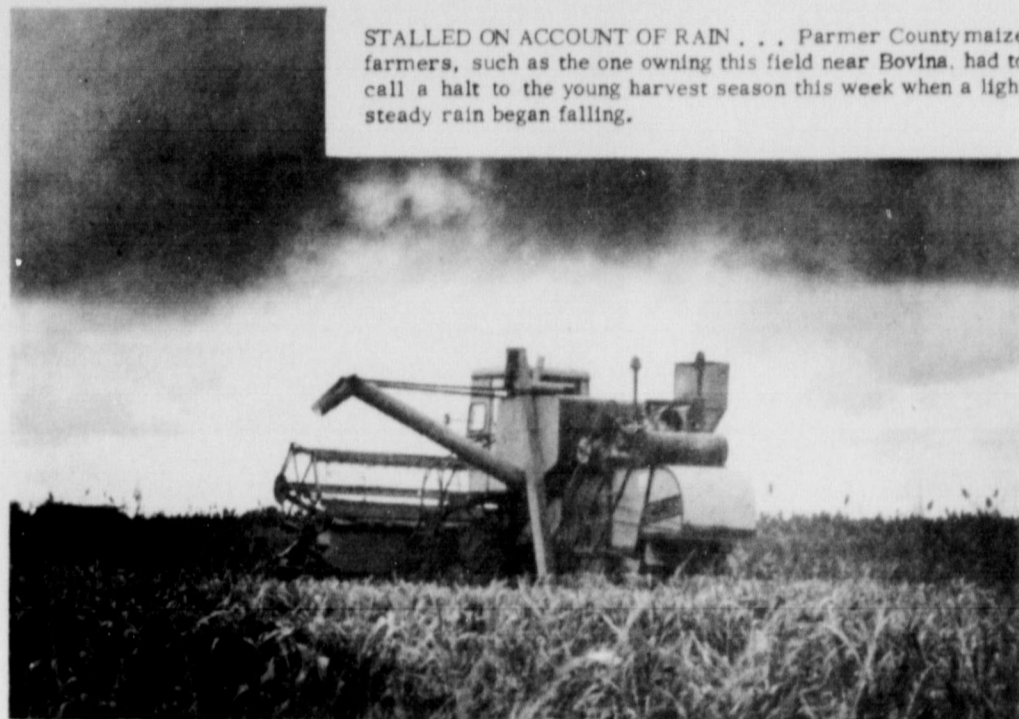
demonstration clubs during the year.

meeting is to get on record the beliefs and desires of the farmer members regarding the future of agriculture. Those who are interested enough will be there to let themselves be heard where it counts.

These people know that action taken will be considered by representatives of over 82,000 Texas Farm Bureau members and more than a million and a half members of American Farm Bureau. They also know that these considered decisions of farmers are given serious consideration in state and national legislation.

Farm Bureau does not claim to be popular in state and national legislative circles, but it is well known that Farm Bureau is highly respected because its policies, which originate with locals like Parmer County's represent a majority opinion. Rarely, if ever, is the precise opinion of any individual carried

even as far as the state convention. However, the basic idea of that individual will, if it is in accord with most other farmers of his area, have a good chance of becoming state, and even national policy.

There is very little criticism of Farm Bureau's activities within the state of Texas. There is criticism heard of its activities in the national legislature because of the highly diversified agricultural situations from coast to coast. The criticism heard is directed to what the organization has got done, or kept from being done in Washington, which is admission of the Farm Bureau's ability to influence legislation.

The critic, therefore, should make himself known at policy making time in the county convention. There, he can determine whether or not his idea is generally accepted or not. If it is, his fellow farmers will

support and make a resolution for action on it. If it is not, it will be rejected by the membership.

Resolutions proposed by the committee Monday night will have come from the community meetings held last week. If someone has one to present that is not already proposed, it will be given the same consideration as those proposed by the committee.

Your organization leaders urge you to come out and bring your family and friends to participate in the policy development meeting of Farm Bureau Monday night in Bovina.

Prayer gives true perspective to life. Be sure, therefore, to take it seriously.

In subdivision one, Dean McCallum of Bovina has resigned as supervisor. McCallum says he has too many outside interests, and feels it best that he resign.


The subdivision covers Rhea as well as Bovina school district. Ballot boxes will be in Steve Messenger's office in the First National Bank Building at Bovina.
