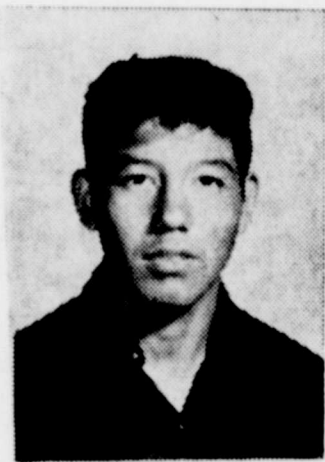

## Eagles will be first real tester in district --

## Rankin to Sanderson for Friday District Game

Back in September before the Red Devils had played their first game of the season, the coaching staff had expressed the opinion that their offense was ahead of their defense in readiness. And then the season started and the defense was rock hard against all comers, especially on the ground, while the offense sputtered and had trouble putting points on the board.

Apparently all that has changed now—except that the defense is getting meaner, if anything. Offensively, the Big Maroon has tacked up 126 points in the last

two games, admittedly against weaker teams, but still, they have been able to move the ball by land (sea, when it has rained) and air—even to the point that the defense has gotten into the act with linebackers running in scores, cornerbacks throwing passes and just about everyone who can get their hands on the ball moving into the scoring column.

Friday night, when the Devils renew one of their oldest rivalries when they go to Sanderson, the fun and games are expected to continue—not that the Eagles are any powder puffs, but after playing

a tough non-conference schedule, the RHS team has turned into something of a wrecking crew. Despite injuries in key slots, they have been able to reach back into the reserve ranks and come up with replacements who appear about as good as those who were sidelined.

One of the possible secrets to their success has been conditioning with a number of track men on the squad. Using these players to the fullest advantage, the Red Devils have more or less "ran the legs off" their opposition and probably will continue to keep the pressure on as they drive toward a possible two-in-a-row district crown. In the Sanderson Eagles, they will meet their toughest test thus far in district.

Sanderson has played only one district game, taking a 35-8 win over Clint, and have had a week off to prepare for the Red Devils. They have an impressive season record of 4 wins and only 1 loss, that to the tough McCamey Badgers, a team that also won out over RHS. Sanderson also owns the second best season record of any team in District 6A, bested only by the Balmorhea Bears at this time.

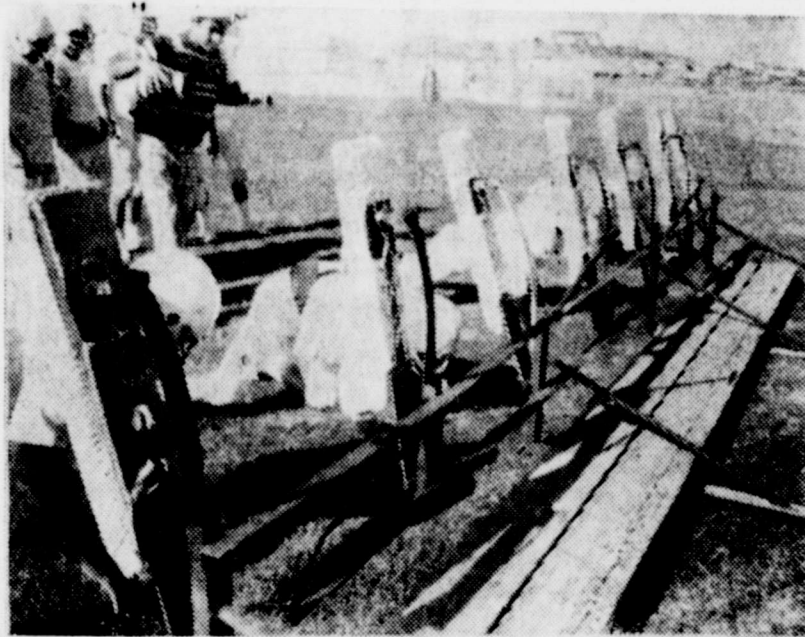
Rankin has district wins of 40-0 over Wink and the big shoot-out of 86-6 over Clint. For the season they have played .500 ball, being 3 and 3.

Rankin and Sanderson will be meeting for their 20th time Friday—they did not play in 1954-55. Rankin has won 16 of the previous games and Sanderson has 3 wins to their credit; however, there have been some barn burners and the Eagles are no longer a "pud" team. During one four-year span the Birds did not score on Rankin.

were English language.

The Moscow News copies were  
drab looking things, not very well  
printed, and containing mostly a  
lot of propaganda. Reading one  
was not too much unlike a press  
release from some Washington  
beaucratic office. And they were  
not too hard on the U. S. and

even had a little five-picture car-  
toon section. We've tried to re-  
produce one. It's the man and  
dog bit on Page 2.

The New Nation is more of a  
classic-type newspaper and is a  
pretty good printing job. They  
had plenty of advertisements —  
only one in the Moscow News—and  
had a comic section, mostly the  
same ones we see daily, plus a  
"Letters to the Editor" and even  
grocery ads.

The Bangkok Post was a beau-  
tiful piece of work, excellent in  
print and lay-out and you would  
have thought you were reading  
any American newspaper — even  
to the comics, sports—all about  
American pro football and the  
baseball playoffs, plus results on  
the golf tour. They even have the  
same movie ads, except some are  
three or four years old to us.

But let's get back to the grocery  
ad. It was for Fitzpatrick's Super

Market and had these little good-  
ies "on special":

Instant coffee, Maxwell House,  
6-oz., \$4.80;

Batter Cake Mix, Pillsbury 17-  
oz., \$1.70 pkg.;

Quick Frozen Cauliflower, Lib-  
by's 10-oz., \$1.05 pkg.;

Freshly Ground Minced Beef,  
per lb., \$1.95.

### SOME WEEK —

Ho, de dum. dum. dum, yeah! Now if Notre Dame had got clobbered my week-end of football would have been near perfect — would you believe I even had the LA Rams and 3 points over Dallas? You know, it just well may be that those lads are really cut out to be cowboys. They sure as heck don't look much like football players.

Oh, they're ok when it comes to the touch football games but they've never been able to win the real tough ones — often they "almost" win but never seem to quite make it. When the going really get rough, they start turning up with sore toes, charlie-horses, hangnails and some bad cases of Landryitis.

In golf we call it "taking the gas", "getting rope burn" or just plain choke. You sorta cave in when the chips are down. I know the felling for I've done it many, many times in golf.

The most common question one hears is "what's wrong with the Cowboys; they have some of the best talent in pro football"—and they do have. So to find the answer, about all you have to do is check up and see which person, with the power to make any decision, has been the longest with the team. Then the answer is not so elusive.

But this is not a column about the Dallas Cowboys; it's about a bunch of winners — the Rankin Red Devils. Last Friday afternoon at the downtown pep rally, Coach Turner made the statement that the 1973 Red Devils might well be the best team he has coached since coming to Rankin.

Naturally a statement of that nature could be somewhat suspect since he was talking to a homecoming crowd — plus the fact that almost all coaches are a lot like new mothers—the latest "child" always being the best of the brood. On the other hand,

after Friday night's game, you have to get the feeling that the coach may, indeed, have his most talented squad—if not on hand — at least in the makings.

They are one of the few teams that I can recall in Rankin that seems to improve every week in almost every department. It may well be that even they don't know what they can really do as yet. It's true that Clint didn't have much to offer but when you use everything you've got in trying to hold down the score—even to putting the defense on offense, and one bunch looks about as good as the other, then you do have a little depth and some boys who know the workings of the game pretty well.

As for running up the score, a lot of that was Clint's fault for insisting on keeping the ball in the air. About 21 points went on the boards directly as a result of intercepted pass runbacks—to say nothing of others that gave the

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Red Devils field position. And I can't think of anything that is more humiliating to a team than to start having the big winners punt on first down or fall down just to keep from scoring. As for Clint's passing attack, it's much to their credit that they kept trying to get some points on the boards via the airways since they knew they couldn't run against the Rankin defense.

Like all teams from the "West Coast", the El Paso schools do not take the game very serious and never make much of a showing in our area. Hopefully, this will be the last year that any of them will be in our district since it's said Clint will move to AA.

The closing ritual was sited by members and refreshments were served. The door prize was won by Jalyn Burkett.

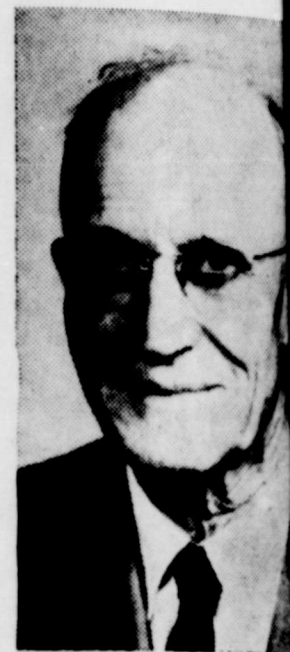
## Fred Welling honored for 25 Years Service
