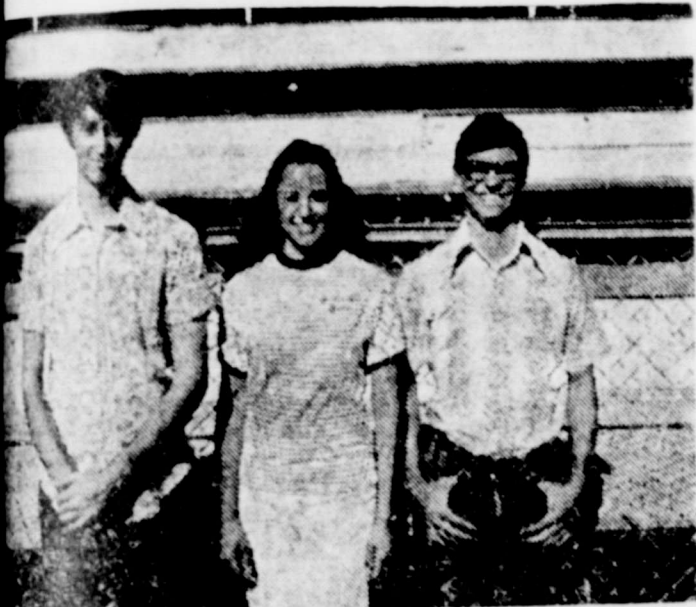

## Defending Red Devils vs. Undefeated Bears

# District Crown to Winner of Friday Game

Friday night will be a "go for broke" situation for both teams when the District 6A defending champion Red Devils host the undefeated Balmorhea Bears. To the winner will go the right to advance into the first rounds of the state playoffs. To the losers, it will be a second-place finish in district and an "also ran" status.

Although both teams reportedly want the game badly, for the Red Devils, it will be their first opportunity in some 20 years to win back-to-back titles and go into the big ones.

Balmorhea, playing only their second year in Class A, has a 9-0 record for the season—their last defeat being at the hands of the Red Devils a year ago when they lost 27-6. Last year at this time the Bears of Balmorhea had a 6-3 record while it was the Red Devils at 9-0. This time, Rankin has lost three games — but only one to a Class A team; that being the opener to Eldor-

ado. They also lost to the AA McCamey Badgers and Stanton Buffaloes.

Balmorhea returned most of their 1972 team and have shown that they are a hard-nosed ball club that doesn't panic easily. In two of their games this season, they have had to come from behind to take the win. One of their strong points is defense and one report quoted their coach as saying, "Our boys just don't think they can be scored on."

And they have the statistics to go a long way toward backing up that statement as they have allowed only 31 points to their opposition all year while putting a hefty 262 marks of their own on the scoreboard. In district play, they have the best defensive record, having allowed only 13 marks in five games and posting 103 for their cause.

For the Red Devils, who had lots of places to fill following graduation, it was a slow start; however, they have shown marked improvement each week and have more or less won in a walk in their five district wins. For the season, they have allowed a total of 57 points to their opposition while chalking up 279 on offense. In district play, it has been 219-21 in the point department.

In most areas — Rankin and

Midkiff being an exception — the game is expected to be rated as a "toss-up." In last week's Harris Power Rating System, the Red Devils were given only a 5 point edge over the Bears. Both units are expected to be at full force for the game—Balmorhea is reported to have had some injury problems in the last couple of weeks but are now ready. Coach Turner reports all his "hands" in good condition with the exception of Gehrig Feuge who was lost for the season in a scrimmage at Big Lake, and Tom Lindsey who

## Trans-Pecos Pecan Show will be Next Monday

All the small details already worked out and a goodly number of entries in hand, about 100, remained to be done was the only thing left to be done before the curtain on the annual Trans-Pecos Pecan Show. This will be done next week when McCamey will host the annual event, to be held at the Park Building.

Extension Agents this year reported that from all indications the 1973 show would be a good one with those held in the past showing good interest and wide participation. Agent Dub Day is primarily in charge of the preparation of the exhibit and reports that some good pecans have already been received. In addition, entries have turned in a wide portion of West

Burkett, Agent primarily in charge of the foods exhibit for the Pecan Pageant that go into the show, has also reported a good response and participation. The queen contestants, there is a total of 20 from Rankin and McCamey

High Schools, have appeared on area television stations in promotion of the entire program of the show.

Divided into divisions of pecans and foods, Savings Bonds go to various winners and the winner of the queen contest advances to regional competition and eventually to state. In 1971, Upton County had the Pecan Queen of Texas. In addition, the Upton growers have won numerous regional and state titles in the various pecan categories.

A schedule of events calls for the pecan judging to begin at 9 a.m., the food judging at 10 a.m. and the Queen's Pageant at 8 p.m. Starting at 1 p.m. will be the sale of foods that did not place in the show and some real bargains will be available to the public at that time. Following the Queen Pageant, an auction will be held at which the prize-winning foods will be sold. Though somewhat more costly since this portion of the affair is held as a fund-raising project, buyers will have the opportunity to purchase real prize winners while financi-

ally helping promote pecans and pecan growing in Upton County, which is the overriding purpose of the show.

public about Watergate.

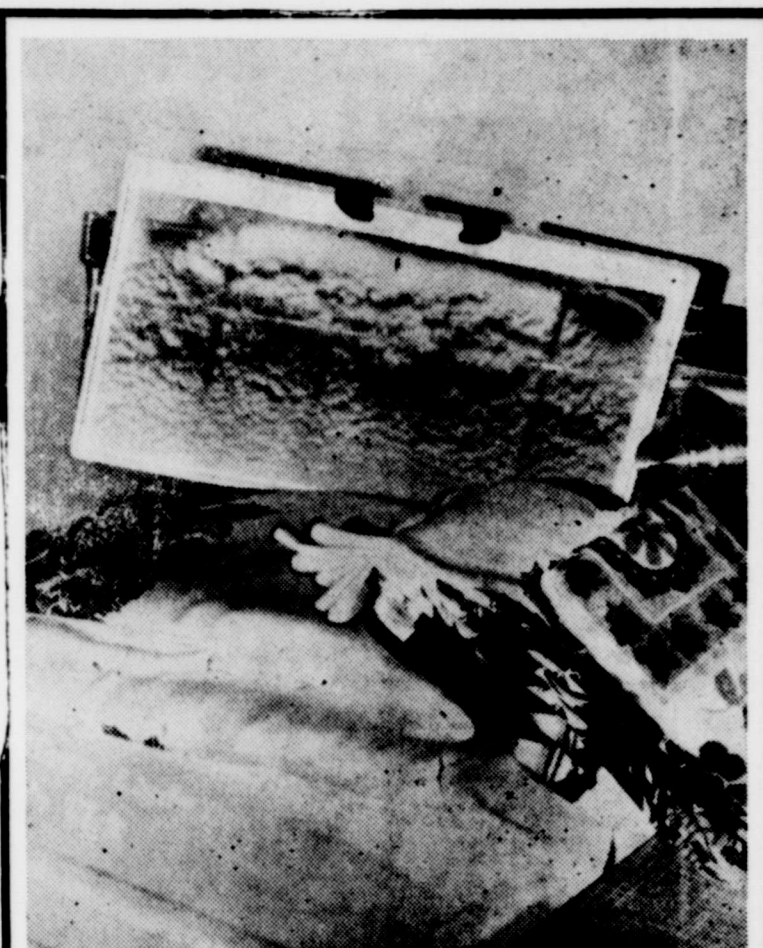
But at least it ought to be a

Practically since they teed up the football for the start of practice last August, fans and sports-writers have been saying that Rankin and Balmorhea would meet on November 16 to decide the District 6A championship. I was not among this group of astute forecasters for I was never really convinced that the Bears of Balmorhea were real.

So as it usually turns out. I was wrong and just about everybody else was right. The Bears are, indeed, real and they do a good job in all departments. In fact, they could probably be called the Grizzly Bears for they seem to have plenty of fight and a short temper.

At any rate, Friday night is it. For either the Bears or the Red Devils it's going to be end-time with the loser turning out to be an "also ran." Somehow I don't feel the title fits the Red Devils. They just don't like to come this far and then lose it all in one ball game — despite the record and the considerable talents of their opponent of the night.

Another sidelight of the game, of which I'm sure the Red Devils are quite aware, is the feeling among some that the Bears made the Devils look bad last year despite the outcome of the game. It might be that there is some truth to the statement; however, a team must be doing a few things right when they put up a 27-6 win—last year's effort for Rankin — and it also must be remembered that the Bears were a pretty fair ball club at that particular time also. They will have about the same people here for Friday night's affair — having lost very few to graduation.

So we come to the classic encounter, the one game that will determine it all. To the winner will go the crown and if a team wants to be district champions, then they have to win. It's pretty simple.

And, although it probably won't be easy, the Red Devils will — barring some bad misfortune—again advance into the playoffs. They simply have more "stuff" than the Bears can handle.

As it turned out, Rankin root-

ers, the ball team and the coaching staff all had a most enjoyable trip to Iraan on Friday night and a game that had figured to be reasonably close turned out to be one of letting the second string see what they could do—which was considerable. There's no doubt about it; after a slow start on offense, the Red Devils are coming on like gang busters and there seems to be no end to the things they can do when it comes to putting the marks on the scoreboard. Each week both the offense and defense seem to be improving and I don't think it's stretching it a bit to say that they are more exciting every Friday than they were the week before. It wouldn't be too hard to believe that they have not yet reached their full potential.

And it's, I think, appropriate to say that the reserves, who have played most of the last half in the last two ball games, are an impressive group. Naturally, by the time they get to take the field the first stringers have tak-

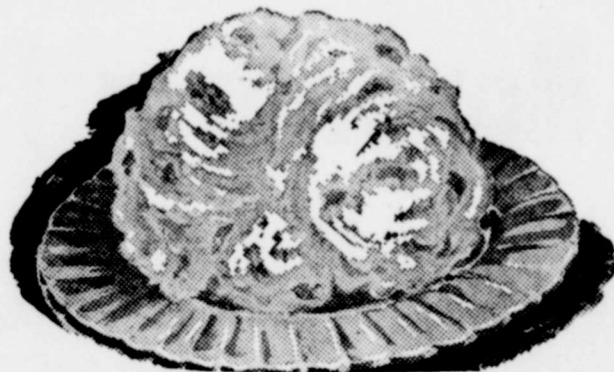
