Red Devils to Meet Cowboys in Bi-District Game

Both teams will have the same names, probably wear the same colors and have mostly the same fans as last year when the Red Devils of Rankin plays host to the Cowboys of Plains in Andrews at 7:30 p.m. Friday. But that is about as far as the similarity between the two teams will go. Gone through graduation from both units are many of the players who participated a year ago in the game won 13-0 by Plains.

Also, for this year's encounter,

season records for both teams are somewhat different — in their last outing, Rankin was at 10-0 and the favorite while the Cowboys were 8-1-1. This time it will be Rankin with a 7-3 mark and Plains at 9-1—which will put them in the favorite's role in some quarters. Rankin scouting reports rate them better on defense than last year but possibly not as good on offense. Their tailback has a-

massed almost 1400 yards rushing in ten games this season.

"Actually, we're not too interested in what they have done or can do," said Coach Turner this week. "We just want to play them and we think we can put some points on the boards. We know what we can do and we'll try to give it our best shot."

Friday Pep Rally to be at 3:30 at Ball Field

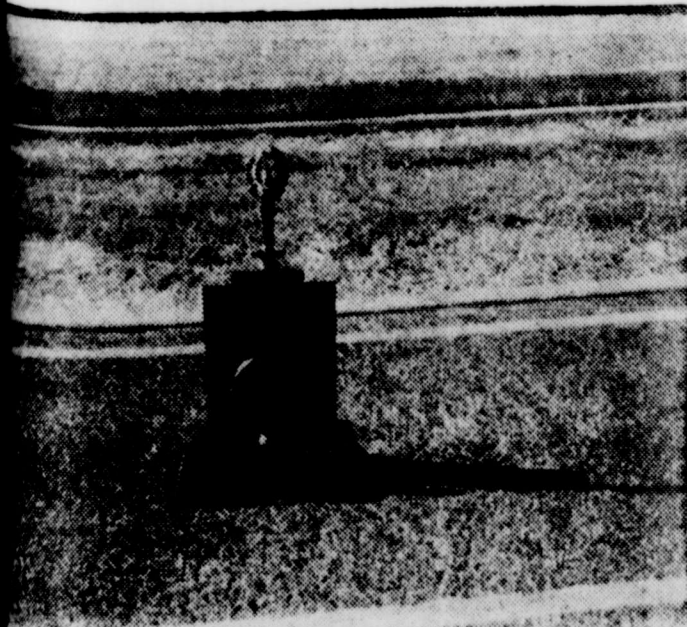

LITTLE HELPERS —

As will be noted elsewhere in this issue, local PM Jess Perritt is asking the cooperation of the public in mailing their Christmas loot a week or two early in order to cut down on the use of fuel. He points out that almost fifteen percent of all the fuel used by the Post Office in a year's time goes into moving the December mail.

I guess it's necessary that we have all this extra hoopla around Christmas time — good for business and the economy, you know — but you can easily see why the Post Office is asking for a little cooperation by getting all of us to mail early. Naturally, I'm hoping that mail early bit does not extend to those people who send out the envelopes with the little windows in them each month.

Anyway, at least in Rankin, I will wager that the public will cooperate and that if mailing a

package or card to Aunt Tillie a bit early will help the situation, then they will do it.

One other word about the local Post Office. The question has been raised — and it's certainly one that ought to be answered — as to why Food Stamps are not handed out here; that people in Rankin have to go to McCamey to get their stamps. It seems the answer is that somewhere "up the line" it was decided that not enough people had qualified for stamps in Rankin. The local postmaster says the order came down to him from Midland. He also says he's been trying to get it changed so that Rankin folk can get their food stamps here.

It's a typical case of beaurecratic handling of a situation—the decision not to allow the Rankin Post Office to serve its own customers. The fact that there are not many—the exact figure, like some of the tapes in Washington, seems to be missing—is a poor excuse for the situation. If a person is eligible for food stamps, it would seem reasonable to assume that he or she would not need the added expense of having to go to McCamey to get them. And after all, we are all supposed to be doing our bit to save gasoline these days. Add to that the fact that some food stamp recipients are quite elderly and either don't have a car or would have no business driving one on the highway and the decision to not give out stamps at the local post office gets even wilder.

It's cockeyed; but it does go a long way in explaining why a lot of us have lost faith in our public institutions. When some nut, probably between Midland and Memphis, Tenn., can decide that people in Rankin, Texas—be they nine or nineteen in number, are not important enough to get a service offered almost everywhere else in the U. S., then you have to wonder a bit. In fact, you have the tendency to get downright disgusted.

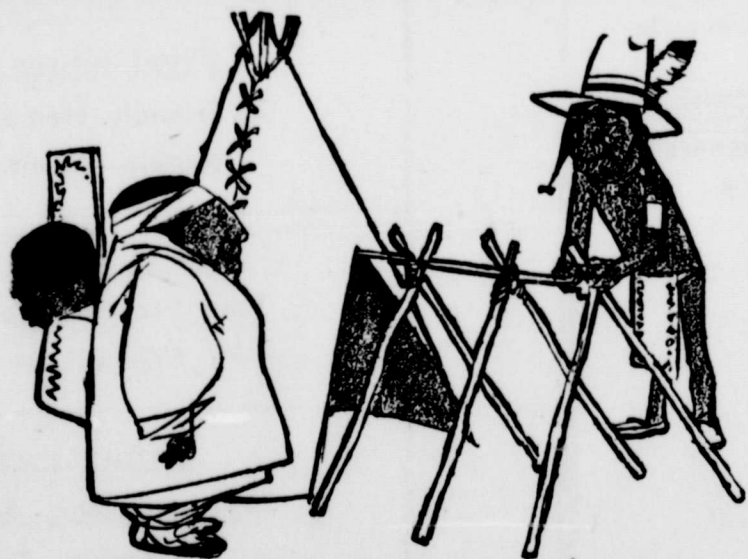

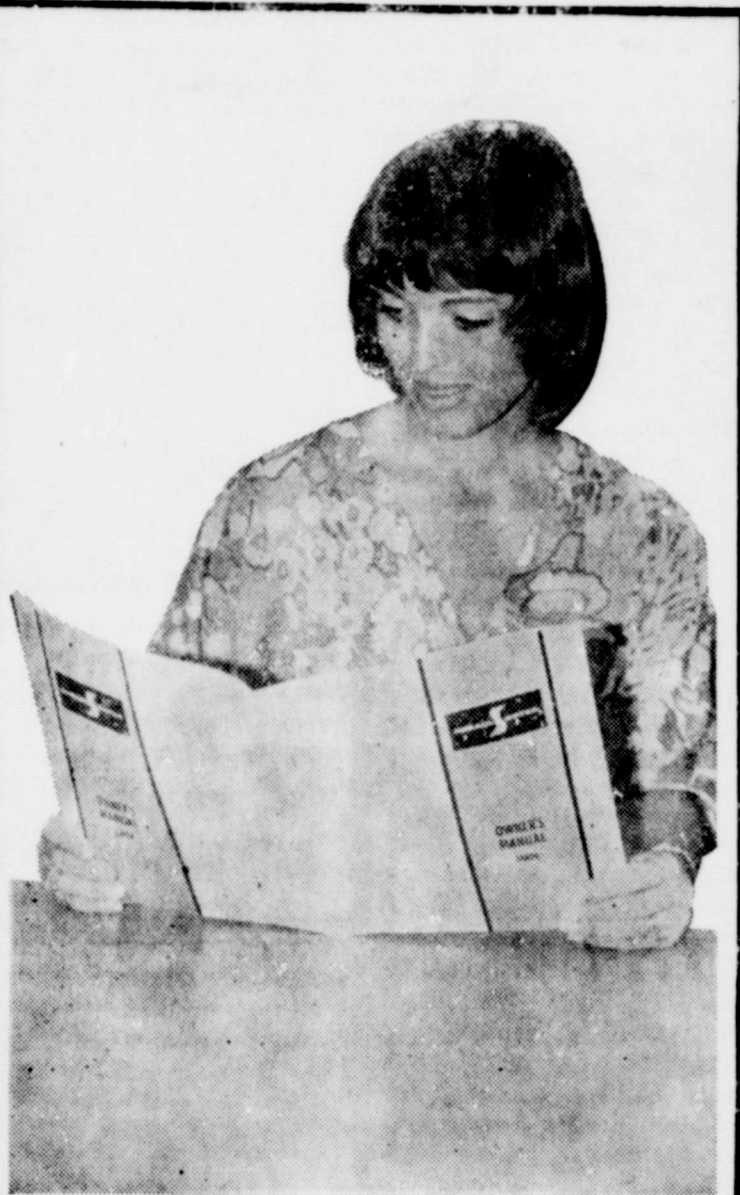

SMASH ! —

Whoeee, you could almost hear the hide rip as the Red Devils literally skinned the Bears last week for the District 6-A title. One might even have been led to believe that Rankin was mad at Balmorhea over something but I don't think that was the case at all. The Red Devils just wanted the Bears to enjoy the experience of a little body contact — and possibly to learn better than to go around putting up signs in other district member teams' dressing rooms urging them to whip-up on Rankin.

All and all, it was just a little friendly get-together and ought to pretty well satisfy everyone as to who the champions are in the district and what they can do when they get their feathers a little ruffled. It will take a week to pick andd that bear fur out of the fence down at the football stadium.

To the Red Devils and their coaching staff goes — once again—the cheers, bouquets and plaudits of their schoolmates and their fans. Regardless of what follows now, they don't have to prove to anyone that they are football players — and the much admired type at that. The better the opponent, the rougher the play, the better they like it.

True, they have lost three of their first four games but despite the fact that they were almost an entirely new ball team being put together during that period, no opponent beat them physically and no opponent made them look bad. The rough edges that stuck out—and possibly cost them the losses — were mostly of their own doing and it's much to their credit that they were willing to put out the work and effort needed to correct these deficiencies.

I think the record will back up these statements and I also believe that practically every fan will agree that this has been one of the most improved teams, week by week, that they have ever seen play the game.

AND NOW —

And now we have a new ball game. From here on it, they are all a win or else situation. That is the way it should be if you're going to choose a true champion

in Class A football, The Number 1 Team in Texas — with no dependence on polls, power ratings or what have you. If you're going to wear the crown, you ought to be willing to face all comers. And for the Red Devils, their first test will again be the Plains Cowboys and I get the feeling that that's the way the Devils want it. They were not satisfied with last year's little tilt with the Cowboys — and a 13-0 loss is not exactly a route— and this year's squad is more than willing to see what they can do with the lads from Plains.

Truthfully, last year the feeling was that the Red Devils would polish off the Cowboys with little trouble. After all, when you are 10-0 and have beaten some good AA teams, you don't expect to have any great deal of trouble with a team that was not supposed to be much bueno. All of us probably learned a little lesson from that one. When you get to the state play-offs, they're all pretty good or they wouldn't

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be there.

This year it's the Cowboys who have the best team on paper. They have lost only one game and that was to a strong Lubbock team that has gone on to win their district. They are well coached, have good fan support and have lost only 3 of their last 23 games, and have had one tie. They will not be taken lightly this time by the Red Devils and

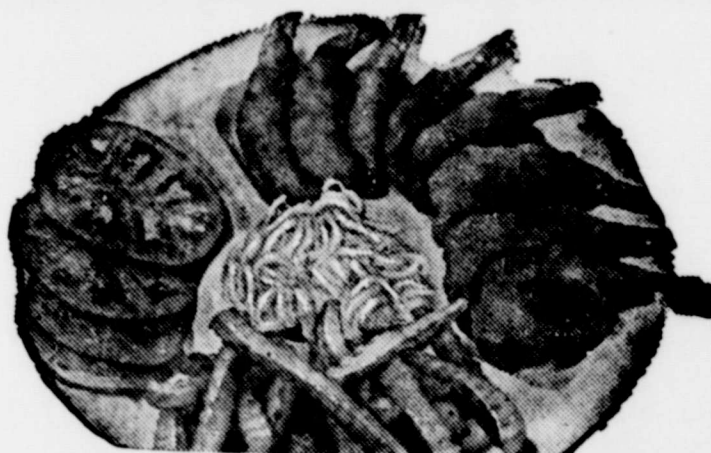

Earlier Mail Dates Requested by Local Postmaster Perritt

Postmaster Perritt

Postmaster Jesse Perritt today joined Postmaster General E. T. Klassen in urging the residents of Rankin to post their domestic and foreign mail one to two weeks earlier than the Postal Service originally recommended, so that the energy shortage will not interfere with on-time deliveries.

"The urgency of the fuel energy crisis compels us to request a

one-week advancement of suggested dates we gave for domestic mail and a two-week advancement for foreign mail." Postmaster Perritt said.

The new deadline for posting domestic first-class Christmas mail is December 8 rather than December 15, as previously announced. Domestic surface parcels, except those for Alaska and Hawaii, should be mailed by December 3, instead of December 10. To Alaska and Hawaii, mail by November 23 instead of November 30.

"The seriousness of the fuel shortage to the Postal Service is underlined," Perritt said, "by the fact that in addition to the fuel consumed by commercial carriers, we require approximately 350 million gallons of fuel to travel 2.25 billion miles delivering the 90 billion pieces of mail that flows through the system each year. Our requirement for the month of December alone is 45 million gallons."

Postmaster Perritt said that the public cooperation on meeting the new, advance mail early dates is needed to help us complete all Christmas deliveries.

Board Minutes tell of Actions Taken

Rankin Board of Education met on November 13 with all members present except Lloyd Helms. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as read and bills for October were approved for payment as presented.

- In other matters, the Board:
- Approved the employment of Hector Ledesma as a custodian at a salary of \$120 per week.
 - The Superintendent reported to the Board on results of inquiries relative to the electrical situation at the stadium and repairs to the popcorn machine.
 - The Board discussed the factors involved in improving Knob Hill and directed the Superintendent to contact companies installing drip irrigation systems and ask them to draw up a plan suitable to the school's needs.

- Approved the 1973-74 Textbook Committee as recommended by the Superintendent.
- Approved the purchase of bulletin boards and black boards for the new field house, installation to be done by the maintenance crew.

No other business appearing, the meeting adjourned.

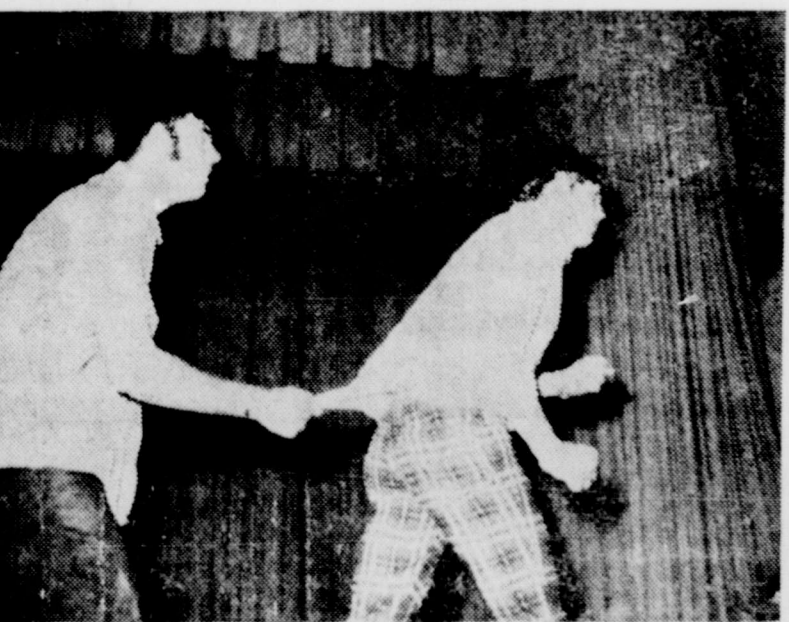
