STARTS JANUARY 1, 1975

Collection of the new one-cent city sales tax will go into effect on January 1, 1975. The city will receive their first money from the state on April 1, 1975.

New sales tax charts, for the use of local merchants in collecting the tax, will be available at city hall well in advance of the January 1 starting date.

On behalf of the city council, Mayor J. B. Pettit, Jr. today expressed his thanks and appreciation to the voters for their approval of the tax and said that every effort will be made to hold the line on operational costs at the city in hopes that no further increases will be needed at this time.



Once again it is time to roll out the welcome mat for ex-RHS graduates and homecoming visi-


tors in general—and, as usual, on behalf of those of us who are still holding the fort, all homecomers can consider themselves welcomed with all due and proper ceremony.



NOT SO HARD-

Not so hard to say a lot about, and all of it good, is the Rankin Red Devils. They're "Rrrred Hot." Whether or not they can maintain this pitch and attitude, only time will tell but things are looking good right now. Perhaps, if we fans don't get to looking too far ahead— and the attitude of fans can affect any ball club—and take them one at a time, the Red Devils may be able to hang in there.

There is one little matter about the attitude of fans that, it seems to me, needs discussing. It's being said that Rankin is playing too easy a schedule and that when they meet some toughies on down the line, it will cause them trouble. Even 4th & 10 has had this thought in mind—until I went back and done some checking.

For starters, take last year. With the exception of Robert Lee's replacing Stanton, it is the same schedule that took Rankin past Regional and into the quarter finals last year. And if anything, this year's slate is a bit tougher than last year on the district level. Replacing Stanton was not done with any idea of looking for an easier game. After all, in their last six games, Stanton had won only two the Red Devils had scored 102 points and Stanton had only 55; so they were not all that tough.

And another thing, it's not all that easy to get up a schedule in these parts. For example, ole Sonora had had about all of Rankin they wanted and were "unable to work us in" on their schedule. Some others have had this same problem.

But let's look back to when Rankin did, perhaps, play a bit tougher schedule, if not in district, then in non-conference. The year is 1961. In district, it was Rankin, Van Horn, Sanderson, Iraan, Wink and Fabensnot all that much different than this year's district. On the nonconference schedule we had Big Lake, Crane, Eldorado, Ozona and Sonora.

For ball players—and Rankin's enrollment was more then than it is now—we had on the roster names like Jimmy Linthicum, Roy Winters, Sam Bean, Fred Moore, Tom Aguilar, Jerry Mc-Donald, Larry Braden, Robert Browning, Ronnie Thorn, Richard Abalos—and others. These chaps were pretty fair ball players, as you will recall.

The opener was with Big Lake and Rankin played them to an 8-8 standoff. Next came Crane and a 26-16 loss-not bad, when you consider that Crane was a real toughie in those days. Eldorado downed Rankin 14-6 and then the Red Devils hammered Ozona 34-16 and any time you put it on Ozona that bad, you've done a big number. In the Sonora game, the score is not recorded for some reason but the Devils lost-it's assumed- since Rankin never beat them on the scoreboards.

Then came district play and Rankin opened big with a 22-0 shelling of Van Horn. Next, the Devils trounced Sanderson 30-6 and then met Wink. They just shouldn't have done it for it was Wink 58, Rankin 14. The Devils closed out the season with a 36-14 win over Iraan and a 26-8 route of Fabens. For the season, they were 5-4-1 and didn't get out of district—and vou've got to win district before you start fretting about who you play in bi-district, regional, etc.

So what's the conclusion? Well, for one thing, it could be that the 1974 Red Devils are not exactly playing any easier or harder schedule: they just make it look easier. I'll buy that.

THIS WEEK -

Ther's not a whole lot to say about the Rankin-Robert Lee tilt Friday night. It's been a long time since the two teams have met and I'd have to read back through about 25 year's of Rankin News copies to see the two have met more than once. Perhaps they have; perhaps not.
