Balmorhea Leads in 6-A Basketball

With only three more games remaining on the regular schedule, Balmorhea, with a 6-1 mark having lost only to Clint, appears to be headed for the 6-A championship and a slot in bi-district basketball playoffs.

All blood donated will be credited to his personal account. Up through about a week ago, he had been given some thirty pints of blood and much more has been used since then.



Over the last weekend I had the opportunity to study at first hand the space program and was astonished and proud once more at the amazing achievement of American technology in sending man to the moon. This extraordinary achievement required a strong leadership, a firm national committment and the cooperative efforts of American business and labor.

The undertaking took less than ten years, and achieved what few of us at the start thought possible

I believe that it is now time for America to launch a similar effort to provide for the energy we need to allow us to continue to improve our standard of living and to maintain our position of world leadership. I will be writing more about how your government is working to assist in meeting our future energy needs, as I have been appointed to those committees in the Congress most concerned with meeting America's energy requirements. At this time, I would make only these few observations. (1) America today consumes 21/2 times the energy it did in 1950. (2) Our energy consumpeion has been increasing much faster than either our poullation or our discovery of additional reserves. (3) Whereas we spent \$3 billion on foreign oil in 1970, we spent \$24 billion on

The 64th Texas Legislature officially got down to business with the election of Rep. Bill Clayton from Springlake as the Speaker of the House. Speaker Clayton has promised to provide strong yet impartial leadership in facing the many important issues this session. Lt. Governor

foreign oil in 1974. (4) It takes several years from planning to completion to provide for new additional sources of energy. That means that in the next few years, we are likely to run short in energy supplies.

The newspapers may be talking of possible tax cuts and short-term moves to stimulate the economy, but the real task for Americans over the years ahead will be to find the means of fueling the economy of this great nation, and of maintaining a strong competitive, innovative economic system. That will require cooperation and ingenuity of all Americans. But I am convinced that if we could put a man on the moon in ten years, we can solve the energy needs of this nation.

ED. NOTE: Mr. Congressman, I was not aware of the fact that newspapers initiated tax cuts or economy stimulating plans. I've always labored under the apparent false assumption that those were among the duties of the Congress and the Administration. Just what is that you are supposed to do aside from writing pep talks?

Bill Hobby will again preside over the Senate. It was good to have my wife, Nadine, Christi, Tommy and my parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Craddick, with me at the swearing-in ceremony.

One of the first actions taken by the House was the adoption of the Rules under which the House will function. The new rules increase the number of committees and limit members to service on only two. This will serve to spread legislative powers more evenly among members. The abolition of the daily oral roll call is seen as a move of trust in members to be honest about their attendance.

Covernor Briscoe and Lt. Governor Hobby were sworn into office January 21 in a ceremony reflecting the general mood of all Texans in these days of economic instability. Lavish inaugural balls and parades of the past were cut in favor of economy. Also, for the first time since 1876 the executive officers of the State will be serving four year terms.

Last week, I was fortunate enough to be sent by Speaker Clayton to Washington to attend a White House briefing on economic and energy aspects of

President Ford's State of the Union message. In addition to President Ford, we met with Vice-President Rockefeller, Secretary of the Interior Rogers Morton and William Simon, Secretary of the Treasury. It was truly a valuable and rewarding experience.

Speaker Clayton announced his choices for House Committee Chairmen and has also assigned each Representative to serve on two committees. I have been chosen as chairman of the Natural Resources Committee which will have jurisdiction over matters pertaining to the conservation of the natural resources of Texas. The committee will also deal with the development of land and water, irrigation and forest development and preservation. I will also serve on the Energy Committee which will be concerned with oil, gas and enenergy-related matters.

The legislature faces a heavy work load this session as bills are steadily being introduced. Public school financing, the possible establishment of a State Utilities Commission, and what to do about our Texas Constitution following the ill-fated Constitutional Convention of last year are all issues we need to have resolved.

employees was a passed last week and is expected a scorn in the House.

The Department further reports that only one bald eagle was known to have been hatched in Texas last year, "although biologists report one other possible fledging."
